From the Parish Council

Firstly, I would like to wish a very happy and successful New Year to all readers of the Journal and their families.

Northstowe

It is going to be an interesting year in a number of ways. We have Northstowe continuing to develop – the first inhabitants should be moving in around May, and work starts on the main Access Road across Longstanton Road just outside Oakington later in the year. We may late this year also see the outline plans for Phase 3, which comes down to the edge of Oakington village and which we hope provides an adequate green separation from us.

A14

Work on the A14 upgrade will accelerate, and will impact initially on traffic on Dry Drayton Road in particular, as earthworks for the Bar Hill and Girton junction improvements are fed from gravel extraction pits to the south of Dry Drayton Road, and as the initial stages of the local road alongside the A14 get under way.

Neither of these developments should lead to construction traffic passing through the village – there are already signs in place on routes leading from the A14. Please report any transgressions to the contractors, contact details should be published shortly.

Flooding

Work is also progressing on plans for attenuation ponds just off Dry Drayton Road, which should significantly reduce the risk of future flooding to the village from Oakington Brook.

Community Plan

We have one more engagement in January, our annual concert at Gretton Court in Girton; do join us there on **Tuesday 24 January** at 7.30 pm.



District Councillors' Report

All district councils in Cambridgeshire, as well as the county council and Peterborough City Council, have signed up for the most generous **devolution** deal in the country. (In addition, in the Autumn Statement the Chancellor signalled a shift towards directing government spending where it is likely to generate the highest return, not least for the Exchequer.)

Cambridgeshire and Peterborough will set up a combined authority, reinforcing the close joint working established over the past decades, enabling the councils to work together ever more efficiently. The leaders of the councils and the Local Enterprise Partnership are meeting regularly so that they will be ready to work with their new chairman as soon as the mayor is elected, on the same day as the county council elections this May. The role has already attracted a lot of interest!

A new £20m annual fund over the next 30 years (£600m in total) will support economic growth, infrastructure and jobs. Road improvements will include things like dualling the A10. Rail investment will unblock Ely North Junction, provide new rolling stock, and strengthen the case for a new station at Addenbrooke's.

Cambridge City Council will get a specific £70m housing grant. Another £100m for "affordable housing", homes for rent and part-ownership provided by the council and housing associations, will be targeted in South Cambridgeshire. We think we can make close to 2,000 of these houses available over the coming five years. These are not extra houses to those in the Local Plan, but we will be bringing them forward earlier than otherwise and within reach of more people.

Local control of the **skills and apprenticeship budget** will offer opportunities for our young people. The next stages in the handover of powers from Whitehall to town hall will extend to community safety (including police and fire services) and integrating local health and social care.

UK Power Networks supplies electricity to London, the East and South East, and it's their job to make sure that the lights stay on. Since 2010 they have reduced the frequency of power cuts by 42%. However, when power cuts do occur they can be very worrying, especially for older people, people with chronic medical conditions and parents of very young children. That's why UKPN have set up a 'Priority Services Register' to identify people quickly and get them the help they need.

This winter they are keen to get more people registered. Do you or someone you know need extra (free) support during a power cut? You can find more details and register by visiting www.ukpowernetworks.co.uk/prioritysupport or calling 0800 169 9970.

The National Institute for Health and Clinical Excellence is reviewing the way it involves the public, especially those with knowledge and experience of particular conditions and services, in drawing up its guidelines and standards. They are holding a consultation, aimed especially towards "people with a care or support need, condition or disability; family and friends who provide unpaid care; people who work for voluntary and community sector organisations; and people who have an advocacy role."

I have to admit that "Arnstein's Ladder of Participation" was a new concept to me, even though he first published the notion in the Journal of the American Institute of Planners

in 1969. (That gives you a flavour of the document, but I think they mean well.) One revealing paragraph comes towards the end: "Evidence-based medicine relies on objective data, whereas involving lay people means using the subjective experiences of individual people. The tension between these two concepts creates complicated challenges for guidance developers, making it difficult to design processes that help lay people to get involved meaningfully and effectively." Never a day goes by without some attempt to prey on vulnerable people. **Online fraud** is perhaps receiving the most attention, but we are also at risk from telephone and postal scams.

Lloyds customers should be on the lookout for a new sophisticated fraud that involves fake bank letters, using a replica template with their logo, address and a signature.

The letter asks recipients to call a number highlighted in bold to confirm whether some "unusual transactions" on their personal account are genuine. Callers hear an automated welcome message asking them to enter their card number, account number and sort code followed by their date of birth. Victims are then instructed to enter the first and last digit of their security number. Don't!

2016 saw several milestones passed at **Northstowe**: widening the B1050, excavating balancing ponds to reduce flood risk to Longstanton, opening the first primary school, constructing the first houses; and ending with completion of the legal agreement for phase 2. The first half of the town, 5,000 houses, will be accompanied by financial contributions more than £100m towards education and community facilities, as well as transport improvements

including funding for more links in the Cambridgeshire cycleway network. Over 2,000 houses will be offered at prices and/or rents below market rates.

The shared **waste service** means that bin lorries can take the shortest routes across both Cambridge city and South Cambridgeshire. Don't forget this means that collection days and times are likely to change from 27 February.

Nature notes for January

As you put your Christmas tree into the garden for replanting or recycling, you may give some thought to evergreen trees but also those trees without leaves at this time of the year (broadleaves). As you know, broadleaves shed their leaves in autumn to get rid of toxins and because winter light levels are too low for much growth.

We in Oakington are lucky enough to have two woods to enjoy, both planted by local people on Cambridgeshire County Estates land, farmed by Peter Freeman. The first is Mansell Wood, planted in 1995, and the second, Centenary Wood, planted to celebrate 100 years since the County Estates were established.

Cambridgeshire is the county with the least area of trees in the U.K (4%). The U.K. figure is over twice this, but our county boasts a higher % of food crops than others.

12,000 years ago, most of the UK was covered in trees. These natural forests followed the retreat of glaciers at the end of the Ice Age and are called 'wildwoods'. The first farmers started to remove these, freeing up areas of tillable land and probably half the wildwood had disappeared by the early Iron Age (500 years BC). Doomsday Records (11th century) suggest a wooded area of about 15% in the U.K.

We therefore have a long history of trees and maybe that is why they arouse strong feelings in us. Indeed, some people feel that planting trees is the essence of conservation. Our two woods attract deer and other mammals, birds, and invertebrates. Do take a walk through and enjoy the wonderful silhouettes of oak, ash, field maple, alder and cherry against wild winter skies. Paths (rides) through the woods allow easy walking and can help you reconnect with nature, whether you are old or young.
