Transport Action Group

Of the three action groups formed as a result of the questionnaires, the Transport Action Group (TAG) was considered to be the most difficult to make any impact on the issues raised as changes to the highways in relation to changes to the speed restrictions need the support of the **local councils and the police**. The role was initially perceived as one of lobbying various parties in the interests of the villages.

The Parish Council has submitted a **Local Highways Initiative**, the result of which will be known later this year, for a mobile traffic monitoring device which will provide data (quantity & speed but not vehicle registration details) to support traffic safety issues.

With the pending significant housing developments in Cottenham and the A14 improvements there will be an increase in traffic through the village. A particular concern is the volume and speed of through traffic past the school in Water Lane and the rat run traffic down the Longstanton Road (officially a No Through Road). In the longer term it is expected that Longstanton Road will be finally closed across the airfield, due to the Northstowe southern access road. If we are to make any progress in getting a satisfactory result the data from the monitoring device will be critical to enlist police and highways department support. The transport team will support the PC in using this equipment.

There are **three sensors**, that record traffic volume, that are embedded in the roads that converge in to the villages, the one in Cambridge Road is situated near Millfield Lodge, there is another in Dry Drayton Road near the entrance to the Business Park and, finally, in Longstanton Road just beyond the junction with Lowbury Crescent. Curiously there is no sensor in the Cottenham Road.

The TAG will be lobbying for a **parking and bus turning** circle at the Oakington and Westwick Guided Busway stop. This will assist those who find the guided busway too far to walk and to enable the Citi 6 bus to link with the busway.

The TAG have been asked to look into where additional **cycle ways** can be positioned to link up with the proposed cycle ways being provided by both the Northstowe development (Southern Access Road) and also the cycle way that will run alongside the A14 upgrade. Although there is some funding available it is insufficient.

The **TAG meets once a month** usually on the 1st Saturday of the month over coffee at the Olive Tree café in the Garden Centre. So, if any of the issues above have fired your enthusiasm or you have a particular issue you would like to suggest the TAG looks at please let us know through the contact details below.

District Councillors' Report

This year began with announcement of two major pieces of government policy. The first was the **Industrial Strategy** green paper. This takes forward ideas of empowering local areas to boost their own economies, that were initiated and elaborated by Michael Heseltine, Peter Mandelson and Vince Cable in previous administrations. Cambridge and its surroundings are well placed to benefit both from an areabased approach – especially tying in with London and Oxford – and a sector deal concentrating on life sciences. One of the main objectives of the Industrial Strategy is sharing prosperity, both across the country and among all sections of society.

The second was the Housing White Paper. While there may have been some disappointment with the emphasis on requiring local authorities to get houses built, when landbanking by big housebuilders and controlling the release of houses to keep prices up are commonly cited as contributory factors limiting the number of new houses, two shifts were generally well received. The first is a set of measures to make it easier for small building firms to get back into the business of building houses, and the second is a greater willingness to allow local authorities to build houses again. (The public sector used to build half the houses the country needed.) Councillors and staff have already had meetings with Gavin Barwell, the Housing and Planning Minister, and more are expected as we put together a package of measures best suited to the circumstances of South Cambridgeshire.

At the meeting on 23 February the district council element of **council tax** was increased by five pounds a year on a Band D property. We are still one of the lowest-spending local authorities in the country. Remember that the bill you get from us includes the amounts being charged by the other councils and public services, in particular the county council, the parish council, police and fire.

As our grant from the government is steadily reduced to zero, we have been successfully substituting revenue from commercial activities so that we can maintain the high quality of our services. As well as continuing our core services such as emptying the bins, planning, housing and environmental health, our corporate plan for the coming year includes:

- Enhancing our Rates Relief system to give more help to our local shops and businesses.
- Making plots available for people to build their own homes.
- Setting aside extra money to help with Neighbourhood Plans.
- Allocating £675,000 for renewable energy schemes.

Recruitment of a **new chief executive** is well under way – and it is possible that an appointment may have been made by the time this issue comes out.

Major progress was made over Christmas at the site of the new **Cambridge North station**, which is now 80% complete, to get it ready for its opening in May this year. Work took place over the festive period to build platforms, install tracks for a new bay platform and to fit overhead wires. The footbridge, lift shafts, stairwells and main station building were all built over the course of last year. The new station, which is expected to handle 3,000 passenger journeys a day, will alleviate the pressure on the existing Cambridge station, where people currently leave the train in order to travel by other means to the science and business parks. An interchange between the northern leg of the Busway and the King's Cross to King's Lynn railway line has enormous potential, which is just as well because there is huge pressure growing on the A10 North corridor.

Urban&Civic plc is the development manager appointed by the Defence Infrastructure Organisation (the government agency charged with disposal of surplus MoD land) for Waterbeach Barracks and Airfield. South Cambs supports the principle of development of this large area of publiclyowned previously-developed land. A new town north of Waterbeach village is included in the Local Plan still going through examination. Opportunities for broadening the range of new housing are welcomed, as well as innovative approaches to construction. The outline planning application for 6,500 houses, however, raises many questions relating to comprehensive delivery of a whole new settlement, in particular integration with the land held by the other promoters (RLW Estates). It is on their land that a new railway station could be built. We also need to be clear how transport improvements, especially the A10, will go hand-in-hand with occupation of more houses. These issues are fundamental to understand fully before any decision is made.

The county council, City, South Cambs, East Cambs, and private sector interests north and south of the A14 junction have all contributed towards funding a study from transport consultants examining options for a **major upgrade of the A10**, as well as the contribution that other modes of travel can make to easing congestion. Funding would come from a combination of developer contributions, the City Deal, the Devolution infrastructure grant, Growth Deal money channelled through the Local Enterprise Partnership, and Department for Transport major scheme funding.

Cambridge finds itself the centre of attention from all four cardinal points of the compass. From the **south** we have the London Stansted Cambridge Consortium, which has set itself the goal of joining the ranks of the top five global knowledge-intensive business clusters. From the **east**, a newly formed Cambridge-Norwich Tech Corridor seems keen to further the agri-tech and clean-tech interests we have in common. To the **north**, Peterborough is enlisting our support for the establishment of a university there. And the National Infrastructure Commission is very keen to facilitate

links with the other place and points in between. East-**West** Rail is working out how to bring back a rail link between Bedford and Cambridge, and the next stage of the Oxford to Cambridge expressway is the dualling of the A428 from the Black Cat to Caxton Gibbet, scheduled to start in spring 2020. Three route options were published on 6 March. The public consultation runs for



six weeks until 23 April. More information can be found at http://roads.highways.gov.uk/projects/a428-black-cat-to-caxton-gibbet/

Nature notes for January

'Spring is when a young man's fancy turns to thoughts of love.' Wild animals are also stirred by the arrival of spring and there are no more obvious signs than the boxing of brown hares (March hares). Males chase and stand on their hind legs and box but recent research suggests that males also box with females. You are probably aware that female hares nest in forms. These are shallow holes that they dig in the soil. A female often produces 4-6 leverets and she distributes them around, one infant per form, to decrease the chances of a predator killing them all in one visit. She visits each form to provide each infant with milk.

Brown hare numbers have almost halved in the last thirty years. This is mainly because of changes in farming practice but hare coursing has also contributed. Hares are grass grazers. While cereal crops are green they can graze happily but as the crops brown off near harvest, hares need grass. In East Anglia, the shortage of mixed farming means little grass but hares survive in Oakington thanks to grass margins around arable crops. They are amazing beasts in that they can travel at up to 35mph and in a zig-zag route to get away from foxes.

Other amazing mammals that show up in spring include stoats and weasels. They are both carnivores that can outwit prey bigger than themselves. I have witnessed a stoat encircle a large rabbit until the prey was giddy and paralysed with fear. The kill quickly followed.

The difference between stoats and weasels? The stoat is the one with the black end of tail and is bigger. Weasels tend to eat mice and voles. You may prefer the very helpful and traditional distinction; the weasel is weasely distinguished, and the stoat is stoatly different. Or you may not.
