As you know, I will be producing an annual report prior to your annual meetings in April. In the meantime, I hope this immediately relevant information is useful for April meetings.

In particular, this report may seem early to Longstanton PC as your meeting is later this month, but I am sending it early due to the inclusion of bin dates for both April and May.

### **Local Building Control service wins national award**

The shared Local Authority Building Control (LABC) service for Cambridge City Council, Huntingdonshire District Council and South Cambridgeshire District Council is celebrating its role in securing a top national award. 3C Building Control, which checks that new buildings are designed and constructed safely and are in line with environmental standards, was jointly awarded with local firm JPT Design Consultants Ltd for 'Best Partnership with a Local Authority Building Control Team' at the LABC Building Excellence Awards Grand Finals in London. Judges described JPT Design's relationship with 3C Building Control as 'a clear exemplar of how to work well collaboratively to deliver successful, quality projects.'

The LABC Building Excellence Awards focus on the very best in technical innovation and construction quality, helping to raise the level of construction quality across England and Wales, by celebrating the way in which council building control teams work closely with architects and builders to ensure building projects are successfully completed.

The building control team helps householders ensure they are complying with all building regulations, and that work is carried out safely and in line with all environmental requirements. The team also offers ongoing advice and support throughout a project and charge at cost, meaning that getting advice at an early stage can help keep costs of a building project down.

# Action taken on fly tipping and planning breaches

Reducing fly tipping in South Cambridgeshire is one of the council's goals for 2023/24. Fines of £400 have been issued where waste has been illegally dumped, including two recent cases in Impington and Cottenham. In both cases, the house owners had handed waste to someone offering waste collection, but had not checked that it would be properly disposed of. The illegal fly tips were reported to the District Council and officers visited the sites where they found evidence linking the waste to its owner.

# Bank Holiday bin collection changes

The addition of the Coronation to the usual schedule of Bank Holidays for Easter and the two May holidays means that over half the bin collections in April and May will be delayed by one or two days (see table below).

Bin collection dates can be checked for any postcode in the district at https://www.scambs.gov.uk/binday, which also provides links to add bin calendars to your mobile phone.

The cardboard, plastic and aluminium foil from Easter eggs can all be placed in the blue bin. The council is also reminding residents that in the UK, around £140 million worth of used but still wearable clothing goes to landfill every year. Please try to keep your unwanted items out of landfill by passing them on to someone who needs them. This can be done through neighbourhood Facebook groups, Gumtree ads, charity shops – some of which offer collections for large items – and even phone apps, like Olio.

# New Government funding to decarbonise Council homes

South Cambridgeshire District Council has successfully bid for £1.7 million Government funding, to continue work to decarbonise Council homes. This will be added to the projects the Council has already started to improve the fabric of its Council homes. It will also support other measures being put in place to help the Council achieve its own and the Government's Net Zero targets.

The money is coming from the Government's Social Housing Decarbonisation Fund. The Fund is designed to upgrade a significant amount of the social housing stock across the country, that is currently below Energy Performance Certificate C, up to that standard.

The District Council owns and maintains around 5,600 Council homes in South Cambridgeshire. The new funding will go towards energy efficiency upgrades within these homes.

Energy saving measures such as exterior wall insulation, cavity wall insulation, loft insulation, new windows and doors, draft proofing measures, as well as heat pumps and solar panel installation can be provided with the funding. These measures could save tenants between £220 and £400 a year on energy bills. More than £2 million had already been allocated to continue work to retrofit the Council's existing housing stock over the next two years, as part of ongoing carbon reduction efforts.

Solar panels have already been installed on almost 2,200 South Cambs Council homes to help tenants generate their own electricity. Nearly 870 solid wall homes have been fitted with external wall insulation.

### **By-election in Cottenham Ward**

A by-election for the role of South Cambridgeshire District Councillor for Cottenham and Rampton took place on 16 March. This followed the sad loss of Dr John Loveluck, who had served as one of the two District Councillors for Cottenham ward.

Eileen Wilson, the Liberal Democrat candidate and former District Councillor for Cottenham, was elected and will represent the ward until May 2026, when all the seats on South Cambridgeshire District Council will be up for election again.

### **English classes for Ukrainians**

More than 100 Ukrainian guests have learned English to help them settle into life in a new country thanks to classes funded by South Cambridgeshire District Council. The classes have transformed life for the children and adults of all ages

and are part of a wider package of support from the Council since families began arriving from war-torn Ukraine almost a year ago.

Guests have received free lessons as part of the Homes for Ukraine scheme and have praised the Council for helping them find the confidence to settle into their new communities.

In feedback, one guest said, "People who were forced to flee from the war in our country feel sincere support. This is important for each of us. It is difficult to find the words that can express the gratitude we feel. You are doing difficult, important and very good work – the work of humanity. As we say to good friends, thank you to the sun and back!"

# Coronation lunches and public encouraged to add Coronation events to digital map

Throughout the UK, Coronation Big Lunches will bring communities together on 7 May. The weekend of celebrations will end with the Big Help Out on 8 May, which will highlight the impact of volunteering. This will encourage people to get involved with activities run by local community groups, organisations and charities.

The Ministry of Justice is promoting its housing disrepair online signposting tool. This has been developed for private rented sector tenants with housing disrepair issues. The tool gives users the information and guidance they need to resolve their housing disrepair issues before they worsen. It asks users a series of targeted questions before providing them with tailored information, guidance, and signposting to relevant advice and support.

# **Community Safety Partnerships review and Antisocial behaviour powers consultation**

On 27 March the government launched a consultation on the relationship between community safety partnerships (CSPs) and police and crime commissioners, and the expansion of antisocial behaviour powers. This consultation forms part of the government's Anti-Social Behaviour Action Plan, which was also launched yesterday. This consultation form's part one of the CSP review, which was

announced in 2022 following the conclusion of part two of the police and crime commissioner (PCC) review. The purpose of the consultation is to:

- seek views on the relationship between CSPs and PCCs, with the aim of enhancing the accountability model of CSPs
- consider how CSPs and PCCs work together to tackle antisocial behaviour, with the aim of strengthening this co-operative working

This consultation also considers the expansion of antisocial behaviour powers, and whether amendments are required to ensure they are being used effectively. It is targeted to those with experience working in or with CSPs, as well as those with interest in antisocial behaviour powers. The consultation will run for 8 weeks and will close at 11:59pm on 22 May 2023.

### **County Council**

Responsibilities: Education, Transport, Highways, Heritage, Social care, Libraries, Trading standards, - Waste management, Maintaining their estate.

Some of these services are shared between Peterborough City Council and Cambridgeshire County Council but any concerns should be directed to the county council.

### **District Council**

Responsibilities: Council tax payments and benefits, Household bin collections, Housing and housing benefits, Council leisure facilities, Environmental health, Residential planning.

#### Parish/ Town Council

Responsibilities: Looking after community buildings, Open spaces, Allotments, Play Areas, Bus shelters.

#### Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP)

'The local delivery body for a City Deal with central Government worth up to £500 million over 15 years, to vital improvements in infrastructure (decarbonising transport), supporting and accelerating the creation of 44,000 new jobs, 33,500 new homes and 420 additional apprenticeships.'

Partnership between Cambridge City Council, Cambridgeshire County Council, South Cambridgeshire District Council, University of Cambridge.

### The Combined Authority, Cambridge and Peterborough, our elected Mayor

'A combined authority (CA) is a legal body set up using national legislation that enables a group of two or more councils to collaborate and take collective decisions across council boundaries.'

What our mayor does – Business support, skills, housing, transport, environment, international, digital connectivity, resilience, research, and strategy. New homes.

### Police and Crime Commissioner, Cambridge and Peterborough

To support and challenge the Chief Constable to provide effective and efficient policing services for the area.

### Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Fire Authority

The Fire Authority is the governing body responsible for delivering a fire and rescue service to Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. It is made up of Cambridgeshire County Councillors and Peterborough City Councillors.

# Thirty new electric buses

The zero-emission, double decker buses, which are due to come into service in May 2023, will see the Cambridge Park and Ride network and Citi 2 service become fully electrified and carbon-free. All 30 buses will be in operation in May 2023, signifying a major milestone in the commitment to a rolling bus replacement programme, to replace 30 vehicles a year across the Combined Authority area. There is an ambition to convert the entire bus fleet from diesel buses to zero emission vehicles within the region by 2030 to hit carbon emission targets and help tackle climate change. The announcement represents a significant investment in green travel for the region, with the new vehicles costing close to £500,000 each. The new fleet is being funded by the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority, Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP), Department for Transport and Stagecoach East.

The new buses will take Stagecoach East's total zero-emission fleet up to 32, joining their current two electric vehicles which have been in service since February 2020 as part of a jointly funded partnership with the Greater Cambridge Partnership. Since their launch three years ago, the two ULEB (Ultra Low Emission Buses) vehicles have covered over 124,000 miles between them, saving over 215 tonnes of CO2 and have carried over 200,000 passengers in 2022 alone.

# Consultation on the Infrastructure Levy launched

On 17 March DLUHC published a consultation on the design of a new infrastructure levy to be paid by developers to fund affordable housing and local infrastructure such as GP surgeries, transport links and schools. The levy is a reform to the existing system of developer contributions – Section 106 planning obligations and the Community Infrastructure Levy – in England. The consultation will inform the design of the levy and of regulations that will set out its operation in detail. A further consultation on the drafting of those regulations will be published in due course. Alongside this publication is a report on an earlier design of the levy, commissioned by DLUHC.

# Motion for a referendum before introducing a congestion charge

I have been campaigning consistently against a congestion charge being introduced in Cambridge for more than 14 years, having first proposed a motion at the District Council against it in February 2009. That motion was successful, but the policy was reversed in July 2018 after the Liberal Democrat group took control of the Council in May of that year, and supporting a Congestion Charge has been District Council policy since then.

A petition, since closed, on the Cambridgeshire County Council website to hold a referendum before introducing a Congestion Charge attracted 15,241 signatures, more than enough to trigger a debate at the County Council. However the Labour, Liberal Democrat and Independent groups who have a majority at the County Council voted not to hold a referendum at the local elections this May.

At the District Council meeting on March 30<sup>th</sup>, I was pleased to support the following motion put forward by my colleague Cllr Heather Williams:

This council notes the outcome of the County Council's vote on Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> March 2023 in regard to a referendum on Congestion Charging. While disappointed by the outcome it does not alter our view that there still should indeed be a referendum. This council will write to the Leader of Cambridgeshire County Council expressing this Council's support for a referendum on the introduction of a "sustainable travel charge" otherwise known as the "Cambridge Congestion Charge".

Many people feel that they were not made aware that congestion charging was on the table at the last local elections. There was a robust debate on this in the chamber at SCDC and this motion was voted down by the Liberal Democrat group who have a clear majority.

# Launch of life-saving public emergency alerts

In the early evening of Sunday 23 April, a siren-like alert is scheduled be sent to smartphone users across the UK to test a new government public warning system. A message will appear on the home screens of 4G and 5G compatible smartphone devices during the test, with vibration and a loud warning sound that will ring for about 10 seconds, even if the phone is set to silent.

Please be aware and ready for this test when it happens, as the alert can be quite startling the first time you hear it.

Working with mobile broadcasting technology, the Emergency Alerts system will help improve the UK's public warning capability, providing a means to get urgent messages quickly to nearly 90 percent of mobile phones in a defined area, with clear instructions about how best to respond.

The system is now ready to be tested across the country following successful tests in East Suffolk and Reading, as the Government continues to strengthen its resilience capability, making sure it offers the best possible protection against an ever-evolving range of threats.

Messages would only ever come from the government or emergency services and will initially focus on the most serious weather-related events. They will only be sent where there is an immediate risk to life, and many people may not receive an alert for months or years. Terror alerts could be added at some point in the future to the list of potential events that would trigger a notification.

The system is being modelled on similar ones used in the US, Canada, Japan and The Netherlands.
