My Volunteering

Carole and Hugh have been volunteering at Wicken Fen National Nature reserve for over 14 years.



We love being out on the Fen, whatever the weather! Watching the seasons change, seeing new arrivals of breeding birds, winter foragers and the amazing variety of seasonal flowers and plants that grow in this precious landscape. Spring is a particularly exciting and rewarding time as new-born calves and foals appear. Winter days can be beautiful when the frost and mist appear early in the morning across the Fen.





Hugh's role is a Volunteer Ranger, helping weekly with the upkeep of the Fen and Public areas. Carole's role is as a Volunteer Grazing Ranger. This involves checking the Konik ponies and Highland cattle on various parts of the Fen for any injuries or problems that may have occurred. Sometimes this can take many hours as the animals seek shelter within areas of dense scrub. It is fascinating to observe these real characters as the dynamics of the groups evolve.

The reserve has been in the care of the National Trust since 1899, and details of 'The Wicken Fen Vision' are on their website.

From our Parish Council Chair

Would you like to become a **Parish Councillor**? We are looking for people to join us, to help represent the views of villagers to our District and County Councillors and play an active role in maintaining a vibrant village, and looking after and improving our facilities. Parish Councillors receive no payment for their activities and are bound by government regulations which lay down their powers and responsibilities. Villages with active Parish Councils are much more likely to be listened to by the District and County Councils who provide the majority of our services. Interested? Please contact the village clerk – see contact details opposite.

At our last Parish Council meeting I was very pleased to see around 30 residents attend to express their opinion about the range of proposals for **Stocks Green**. Currently, it is in a poor state and we wish to make it a pleasant place in the village. The Parish Council has been exploring all options for renewing the Green for some months now. We discovered that the roots of the London Plane tree are possibly impacting upon the Chapel, and are certainly causing the footpath to become unstable and potentially dangerous for those with mobility issues. The footpath is the responsibility of the County Council and we have made our concerns known to them, but the rest of the Green is owned by the Parish Council.

We had contacted an arboricultural company in November to provide a quote for an examination of the **plane tree** and its possible impact. However, it was important for us to tell people as soon as possible that one of the options, if the tree is causing damage, is to replace the tree with a mature-as-possible native tree. The other options consist of reducing the roots or combining this with the construction of an underground barrier to contain them. It was clear from the meeting that there was strong opposition to replacing the tree, and the Parish Council has confirmed the proposed arboricultural survey and will pay for a survey of the Chapel. The meeting was conducted in an excellent atmosphere and a number of residents kindly offered to join a group to help advise the Parish Council. The aim is to have clear plans to publicise to villagers in good time for the Parish Council to have the works undertaken the winter of 2024. We have been monitoring the 20 mph **speed limits** on Cambridge Road and Water Lane/Station Road, and the results are encouraging, with an 8–10 mph average drop in the speed. However, a high proportion of traffic appears to be ignoring the 40 mph limit between Girton and Oakington. This results in vehicles failing to slow down in the first hundred yards or so after the 20 mph sign. Girton Parish Council are experiencing the same issues at their end. We raised this with County Highways and asked for a 30 mph buffer zone on entering Oakington, but after discussions with them and Girton, both villages have now submitted a joint bid to the Local Highways Initiative Fund for the whole of Cambridge Road up to the 20 mph zones to become 30 mph. Unfortunately, as we never see a police officer checking speed limits and we cannot have a speed camera, Cambridge Road will have traffic calming measures introduced. The funding comes from the Northstowe Development and the County.

We have not forgotten about Westwick and we are working, as fast as possible, on plans for further speed restriction measures there.

Finally, I have some sad news. Since the last Journal, two longstanding councillors, **Peter Harradine and Derek Chapman** have passed away. Our condolences to their families. The village benefited greatly from their contributions over the years.

Making Connections consultation

The Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) *Making Connections* 2022 consultation closed on Friday 23 December. Around 23,000 responses have been received; the GCP expects to publish a final report on the outcomes and next steps, for consideration by its Board in June 2023.

The consultation is about proposals for public transport improvements, better cycling and walking options, as well as the element which has been most talked about, a congestion charge.

Any decision on a charge for driving on roads in Cambridge or anywhere else in the county would be a matter for Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC). We do not yet know whether a proposal for a congestion charge will progress beyond the consultation, or if it does, what it might look like after the public responses to the consultation have been considered. We would expect the proposals in the consultation, including the proposal for a congestion charge, to be significantly changed by the public response. And I would want and need to know what the public – *all* the public responding to the consultation, thought before casting a vote.

Tom Bygott writes: I am delighted to serve as your District Councillor, and will work hard to represent your interests at District Level. I would like to congratulate Cllr Natalie Warren-Green and to thank the retiring Councillors. During the many doorstep conversations that I had with residents of the ward, three issues emerged:

- Ensuring that the District Council (SCDC) takes action to resolve the problems with the groundwater and underground aquifer that have led to the ponds in Longstanton and Northstowe drying up
- Holding the developers and the District Council to account for the delivery of community facilities in Northstowe, and
- Campaigning to stop the imposition of a Congestion Charge in Cambridge.

consultcambs.uk.engagementhq.com/making-connections-2022. There is also a petition asking for Cambridgeshire County Council to hold a referendum before implementing this new tax:

The £5 daily charge would cover the whole city, including Addenbrookes and Royal Papworth hospitals. Hospitals are usually sited at the edges of cities so that city residents can easily access them via the convenient public transport that operates within cities, but where residents of outlying villages can also access them. In most villages, development is too sparse to support viable public transport, We need to have had severe effects on our roads. This is a national issue; we are dealing with the most urgent and dangerous potholes and surfacing issues first throughout the county.

Household Recycling Centre planned at Northstowe

In the original plans for Northstowe Phase 1, a Household Recycling Centre (HRC) was planned to comply with the size of the town. Following CCC Planning Committee on 16 November 2022, permission was granted for the Milton HRC to be redeveloped and expanded, therefore a site will no longer be required in Northstowe but S106 funds will still be required. Following this permission CCC planning officers consulted with the Planning Casework Unit for the Department for Levelling Up, Housing & Communities (DLUHC) on behalf of the Secretary of State, who confirmed that they are not calling in this planning application and are content for CCC to proceed.

CCC waste officers will now look to use the funds secured in the Northstowe Phase 1 S106 to help implement this

permission for Milton HRC and, as part of that discussion, a deed of variation to allow consideration of an alternative land use for the current proposed HRC site in Northstowe Phase 1.

Oakington and Westwick Traffic Calming – still too fast

The introduction of the 20 mph zone throughout Oakington along with physical traffic calming is almost complete, with one remaining speed cushion near the school to be installed. As mentioned in the last issue of the Journal, the "speed camera" or Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign (MVAS) that has been situated in Cambridge Road has shown that the new traffic calming measures have significantly slowed vehicle speeds from an average of 34 mph to 24 mph. The MVAS has been located opposite the entrance to Cherry Orchard for four weeks and has given an average speed 25 mph in what was previously a 30 mph zone. However, the percentage of drivers exceeding the 20 mph limit is running between 55% and 60% and is

disappointingly high. A typical set of data is given below.

moved to Westwick to measure the impact of the traffic calming installed there.

East West Rail – Update

In the autumn budget statement, it was announced that the building of the proposed East West Railway from Oxford to Cambridge would be accelerated. Whilst it remains a concern that there are objections from vocal pressure groups along the preferred southern route, they are now calling for the whole project to be abandoned with their call for a northern approach given much less prominence. At the time of writing, the results of a consultation on the preferred southern routes have not been published. In the unlikely event of a northern approach being proposed, there will have to be a public consultation and discussion which will cause a further significant delay to the project. Both TAG and the Parish Council are continuing to closely monitor any

Environment Action Group

There has been little progress to report on **flood mitigation**, although our Flood Mitigation Group understands that South Cambridgeshire District Council is seeking access permissions to clear out the ditch that runs between Longstanton Road and Water Lane. Silt in this ditch is currently restricting water flow through the tunnel that carries water under Longstanton Road by the shop.

Work on the Parish Council Open Spaces project, supported by the EAG, to develop the recreation ground area is proceeding apace. Twenty-two hornbeam trees, 12,000 bulbs and 2 kg of wildflower seeds were put in before Christmas. The area near the pavilion has oxeye daisy seeds only (no bulbs). The three bulb areas have also been seeded with annual wildflowers, which will likely self-seed at least a second year. These will give a good display of colour after the bulbs have finished flowering this summer. Meanwhile, work has begun on the two seating areas. One of these will be based around the theme of Anglo-Saxon Oakington, reflecting the likely founding of Oakington by an Anglo-Saxon named Hoc who would have arrived by boat with his family at some point in the 5th century, and the fact that the recreation ground was once the site of a significant Anglo-Saxon cemetery. The second seating area will be on the

theme of RAF Oakington, commemorating the role played by Oakington Airfield during the second world

war when it was home to several squadrons of RAF Bomber Command. We have been working with the History Society on designing information boards for these two areas.



We are continuing to monitor the **village pond**. There has been a reduction in the amount of green duckweed covering the pond over the winter, probably because it dies back in the colder months. We expect it to return when temperatures rise, and continue to investigate ways to keep it in check.

We have also been monitoring the **old airfield road**, which is currently supporting a lot of wildlife that we hope can be nurtured and developed. Removing the grass cuttings when the verge is cut, for example, would encourage wild flowers rather than rank grass, and piling it up into heaps would provide nesting sites for grass snakes.

someone to fetch the defibrillator – open box, take out defibrillator, shut box (alarm goes off), open defibrillator and it talks to tell you what to do. returning around 11.30am, and it's free!

OWN/CONNECT 2 is partnering with Sustainable

Oakington and Westwick (SOW) to plan another plant swap in May. Last year's was very successful and much appreciated. Although it seems a long way off we're mentioning it now so





Community Association (CA) Annual Report



The CA had another good year and it was gratifying to see an excellent bounce back after the tribulations of the last few years.

Any success of the CA is down to the enthusiasm and efforts of all the volunteers at events and during the year.

The two main fundraisers for the year, Village Day and Bonfire Night, went extremely well and were thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended. Village Day after expenses made a surplus of £1,822 and Bonfire Night £573. We successfully applied for a Community Chest grant of £650. This was for a Platinum Jubilee Commemorative Bench now placed by the Pavilion.

A great effort by the Journal team produced an as ever quality product six times during the year and contributions by advertisers covered the production costs. Over 60 volunteers are involved in writing articles, production and delivery.

Overheads for the year totalled £1,809, the largest part of which was for the Liability insurance.

There was a net surplus for the year of $\pounds1,503$ which, added to the reserves from previous years, makes the Reserves carried forward of $\pounds5,247$. It must be noted that reserves are essential to cover any up-front costs of events. For instance, there was an outlay of $\pounds2,300$ in advance of Bonfire Night for the purchase of fireworks and for floats etc. It is also prudent to have a contingency fund to cover any unexpected occurrence such as bad weather washing out Village Day or Bonfire Night.

Many, many thanks to all the volunteers who give up their time and make such an effort to support our lovely community.

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
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

Voter Identification

(Requirements from 4 May, 2023 for local elections and October 2023 for General Elections)

If you don't currently have approved photo ID, you can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate (VAC).

Approved photo ID includes: Passport, Driving Licence, Blue Badge, OAP or Disabled Bus Pass, Freedom Pass, PASS card or National Identity card issued by an EEA state. However if you have none of these you can apply for a VAC from the end of January, either online or through South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC). There will be no elections in our area in May, so registration is not urgent. To get a VAC you will need to have already registered to vote and will have to provide your National Insurance number and a passport style photo. A good way to get the photo is to use Max Spielmann at Tesco as they may be able to upload the photo for you (they provide this service for passports). You can register to vote online at *gov.uk/register-to-vote* or download a registration form, which is also available from SCDC.

Nature Notes

Citizen Science – your New Year's resolution

I have lived in Oakington for 11 years and have been interested in wildlife for most of my life. Many of the subjects of 'Nature Notes', expertly written by John Terry (who, by the way, hasn't retired – don't worry) concern the

changes in our wildlife, both as the seasons come and go, but also over the longer term. We personally observe many of these things – the autumn coming of migrant thrushes such as Redwing and Fieldfare, to the now regular Little Egret in our ditches and fields.



You and I might know these things, but how do *we all really know* that these changes are occurring? One of the primary vehicles that enable a conversion of 'anecdote' to 'observation' is through biological recording and the "citizen science project". These projects range from those which are "highly structured and need a high level of identification skill" to "submit a record of anything from anywhere, no matter who you are". If you love observing wildlife and already like sharing your observations with your friends, perhaps on social media, why not go one step further and make a more formal record of that?

Biological recording can take many forms; traditionally you might send in a paper record to the 'County Recorder' for your species group. But, nowadays of course, there are Apps that you can use on your phone or tablet. Below are two that I think are excellent and if you are starting out on your recording journey, are really worthwhile looking into.

iRecord: *irecord.org.uk/* Run by the Biological Record Centre (BRC), it is almost a one-stop-shop for recording. You can attach photos to your record to make the verification easier.

BirdTrack: *bto.org/our-science/projects/birdtrack* Run by the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO), it is primarily focussed on recording birds and was originally set up to record bird migration (those Redwings again). But, it has evolved into a multi-taxa recording method for spatial conservation planning and is very simple to use indeed.

Bus Fares Go Up - and Down

With costs going up everywhere it's unsurprising that bus ticket prices have also increased – but back up to around the level they were at in 2021. The Flexirider (carnet of five or ten tickets available on the Stagecoach app) has only increased slightly for adults, somewhat more for youth tickets. Megariders are better value for those who travel every day.

However, most single journeys are currently capped at £2. The Bus Fare Cap scheme is a Government initiative running until 31 March, during .which time most single fares will cost £2 or less.

If you want to go another step further, maybe you would like to sign up to what are called 'structured' surveys?

Perhaps the most familiar to us will be the RSPB's 'Big Garden Birdwatch'.

But there are many others out there, catering for many levels of expertise. Below is a list of just a handful of surveys that you might like to consider taking part in and is certainly not exhaustive..

The RSPBGarden Birdwatch:

rspb.org.uk/get-involved/activities/birdwatch/ An annual count of birds in your garden at the end of Jan.

The BTO Garden Birdwatch: *bto.org/our-science/projects/gbw* A year round version of the RSPB's survey.

The National Plant Monitoring Scheme: *npms.org.uk/* Perhaps for the more dedicated botanist, but incredibly worthwhile and rewarding.

The Wider Countryside Butterfly Survey: *butterfly-conservation.org/our-work/recording-andmonitoring/wider-countryside-butterfly-survey* Butterflies are one of our best indicators of the health of the countryside.

So, if you haven't made your New Year's resolution yet, why not consider making your observations count towards our national science and conservation efforts. But, if you

still don't think this is for you, but still would like to share your observations with people from the village and would be interested in setting up a 'WhatsApp' group or similar, I'd like to hear from you.

Barking Mad?



Our furry friends have been very busy this year; winter snow and frozen ground has been a particular problem for rabbits. Without grass to eat they have found that the bark on the apple trees in the Recreation Ground Orchard is a good fallback. Sadly the trees were unguarded and the picture (left) clearly shows the damage. If it encircles the trunk and takes off both the bark and underlying tissue, it can kill the tree.

The picture (right) shows Muntjac damage from earlier in the year in the Mill Road Orchard, most likely caused by the deer rubbing their horns to remove the velvet. Of course we know Muntjac love to come into our gardens to eat our flowers and vegetables and they are commonly seen on that side of the village. Sadly Leo's Cider Orchard also suffered from "bark ringing" by voles over the summer. They need longish grass or similar, to provide cover from birds of prey, so to keep them away the grass needs to be close cut around the base of trees.

If you live on the perimeter of the village and have fruit trees you should protect them or have a secure garden fence to keep out the wildlife; although rabbits will burrow under a fence, if the plants on the other side are sufficiently attractive!

Besom in Histon & Impington

Imagine the life of a coffee table. It begins shortly after WWII after the subsequent owner carefully squirrelled away enough for this object of her desire. It saw countless scenes of teacups, of laughter, of crying, young children, nappy changes and pets. But



eventually an impending move meant it had to go. The local **Besom** was summoned to collect it and some time was spent in a dark unheated garage in Cottenham until a homeless person, re-housed locally, was pleased to accept it into their new home. And the round of cups (now coffee), laughter etc. began again. The collection, storage in local garages, and free delivery was all carried out by **the Besom in Histon and Impington** through volunteers from local churches.

The Besom is a national organisation of autonomous groups whose aim is to provide the means for local churches to help provide household goods for those in need. We don't advertise nor ask for funds but collect donations of preloved items in good condition ranging from kitchen items, white goods, to duvets and beds.

At the request of social services and other professionals we deliver items in a range of up to ten miles to those in need of them. Sometimes we will furnish a complete property. We don't do house clearances but when necessary will dispose of some items. This Christmas we delivered over 80 well filled hampers to all our recipients in 2022.

This is all done simply because Jesus showed us how to love our neighbour and asked us to do likewise.

This Tardis (see picture) contains a single divan with drawers, heavy mattress, kitchen welcome pack, cutlery and

china pack, towel pack, dishes, three pans, 2xbedding pack, duvet, pillow, microwave, TV, kettle, toaster, toilet brush, standard lamp, hanging unit, vacuum, recliner armchair,

extending circular table, two dining chairs, fridge-freezer, bedside unit and lamp, coffee table, hamper with Coop gift voucher and Christmas card plus stepladders to reach the roof rack. Round trip 73 miles – don't ask!



And the trick question? How do you get a bulky recliner chair through a narrow doorway? Answer – you fully recline the chair, turn it on its side and 'arrow' it in. Easy.



We are all made of Stars by Rowan Coleman.

Generally I read about death and dying in the context of the crime novels that I enjoy so this book was a complete change for me. I knew nothing about the author, but her writing nineteen books whilst raising five young children intrigued me.



The story revolves around a nurse who works the night shift in a hospice and her reason for doing that is a story in itself. Having time to sit and chat with patients leads her to begin writing letters for them. Some of the letters are heartbreaking, some are very funny, but she takes their dictation seriously and promises to send them to the desired recipient, when the appropriate time comes. In spite of the potentially morbid setting the book is full of hope and even joy. It mirrors my own limited experience of hospices. She writes very well and her characters are so believable that I became quite involved in their situations. My test of a good book is being reluctant to turn to the last page and that was certainly the case with this one.

Podcast Review



The Curious Cases of Rutherford and Fry has

just started series 21. Listeners write in and ask **PODCAST** for an explanation of science mysteries in everyday language. A recent episode was on Aphantasis. Did you know that for some people it is impossible to conjure up a visual image of a loved one in their "mind's-eye". They can describe them in words, but do not see a "photographic" type image in their head. They have what is now known as Aphantasis. 
