Hardship Fund

Over the summer, the Hardship Team has helped four people to buy food and school clothes. We have given grants from $\pounds 30 - \pounds 150$, and made decisions quickly. We always consult as a team before agreeing any grant, and then payments are usually made within 24 hours. We either answer the phone or return messages as quickly as possible, and also respond to emails, WhatsApp messages or texts. Usually we are approached directly, but sometimes the school has made contact.

We treat all information as confidential and also explore options for further help.

The Hardship Fund was set up during COVID, and we have found an ongoing need due to cost of living pressures and the impact of sudden expenses, changes to benefits or the impact of long-term illness or disability.

The Hardship Fund is overseen by O&W Neighbours, and its accounts are reviewed by the Parish Council, Community Association Treasurer and OWN Treasurer.

The Hardship Team consists of Adrienne Chaplin, Jo Mills and Ben Philips.

From our Parish Council Chair

A short history lesson to start with... The **Parish Council** is a civil council, and is not connected in any way to the religious parish. They were separated in 1894 by Act of Parliament; hitherto going back to ancient times they were one and the same. I was confused about this when I first heard the term 'parish council' many years ago, so I thought it might be helpful to explain the difference.

A recent difficulty has come to light, thanks to a resident pointing out at the September Parish Council meeting that Homes England has padlocked the **gate at the end of The Drift** and screwed a 'no entry' sign on the gate. Village residents have walked over the fields for many years, probably generations. I enjoyed tramping right round the borders of what were Mr Chapman's fields for at least thirty years, and latterly Mr Pearson's, and found remnants of WWII aircraft in some remote spots. Mr Pearson used to close the gate when there were crops at certain stages of growth, and leave it open at all other times. It seemed to be a very friendly arrangement, at the heart of village life.

It seems that twenty years of unchallenged access is the amount of time it takes for a right of way to be established, in common law, and a change of ownership does not extinguish that right. I'm trying to establish that as a fact too, so if you have definite information please get in touch. Some websites say one thing, other sites the opposite.

I'm waiting for a response from Homes England on this matter. They have promised a response to my letter within ten days, and so the matter may be resolved quickly. In the meantime, the Parish Council would like to hear from you if you have been affected by this stopping off of the end of The Drift.

The **Environment Action Group** (EAG) has been in existence for quite a number of years now and has been very effective and successful in the parish, keeping the environment tidy and safe. You can't help but notice a small group of volunteers working for the parish benefit. Do read their Journal entry for an up to date account of their activities, not to mention pathway clearance and litter picking. However... although there are one or two younger members of the group, it needs more help! If ten people gave an hour of their time say, every fortnight, so much could be achieved. For example, a small team of six volunteers has kept the entirety of the new trees and bushes on the Rec watered during the summer. Get in touch with the Parish Council if you'd like to be part of the group, no matter how small the amount of time you may have available. Thanks as always, to the members of EAG, past and present, who give freely of their time.

Sustainable Oakington & Westwick (SOW) applied for and received a grant from the Parish Council of £150 for **hedgehog gateways**. Good news for hedgehogs! There is money available each year from the Parish Council for community activities. Contact the Clerk for details (contact information opposite).

The lease for the **Community Orchard** in Mill Road has been renewed recently. It is secured by a peppercorn rent. Apples will hopefully abound for another five years.

Flooding is a recurring subject of discussion and planning in Oakington and Westwick. National Highways have delivered hydrology modelling to the Environment Agency, they have promised their modelling of Beck Brook to Homes England, who will arrive at a design for a pond. Not complicated at all... Watch this space!

From our County Councillor

Early Years providers

Earlier this year, I presented a motion to County Council's Full Council, 'Childcare in Domestic Premises', prompted by my experiences during the Phase 1 Northstowe



development. The motion gained unanimous approval from the Council. Follow-up motions were taken by LibDem Councillors Natalie Warren-Green to South Cambs District Council and Ingrid Flaubert to Cambridge City Council, both of which were also unanimously supported.

These motions tackled the issue of house builders imposing restrictive covenants on their properties, which prohibited residents from running home-based businesses, including childcare services. Our innovative approach led to a round table discussion with the County Education Officer, the Minister of Children and various house builders. The Telegraph recognised our efforts as pioneering, and soon after, the government took action. On 21 August, the children's minister wrote to developers, social landlords, and housing associations, urging them to allow childminders to operate from their properties. This marks a significant local achievement, with our influence extending to national policy.

I remain committed to advancing this cause to increase the number of childminders. Accessible childcare in our community is vital. Unfortunately, Northstowe recently lost its only childminder, Hanna Lumley, who closed her business after 17 years of service mostly in Oakington. I extend my heartfelt thanks to Hanna for her dedication to our community.

If you are considering becoming a childminder, please reach out. There is a £600 grant available to assist with setup costs, and you won't have to repay it. *tinyurl.com/49y5fxcb* Little Flames is the new preschool provision beside Oakington Primary School: please see page 21 for the full details.

Highways

It is great to share with you that we have a new Local Highways Officer and Manager. They have been out and about with inspectors and different parts of the Highways teams to get to know their patch and issues. The next Highways Quarterly meeting with all my Ward's clerks is on Friday 6 October.

Please can we ask all landowners to ensure that they cut all their hedges/trees that block footpaths, as this becomes dangerous for residents who use these footpaths.

One of the hot topics this summer has been that of weeds. Cambridgeshire County are reviewing their current position on weed spraying policy and will be engaging with District/Parish/Town Councils to obtain their feedback, before any decisions are reached.

Wilson's Road Bridleway

On August 31st I visited the Wilson's Road Bridleway in Longstanton with representatives of local interest groups and Councillors. Wilson's Road Bridleway connects the end of



Wilson's Road in Longstanton with the bridleway along the south side of the rebuilt A14, crossing over the access road to Northstowe using a new cable-stayed bridge, with a connection to Bar Hill and its Tesco store using a second new cable-stayed bridge over the A14. There was a proposal to install a new hard surface along the route to reflect the increased usage, once the southern part of Northstowe is complete.

Representatives of the users' groups unanimously agreed that the decision on the hard surface should be reversed and the funding used instead to complete the bridleway along the B1050 from the main part of Longstanton and the northern end of Northstowe. A meeting will be arranged for the users' groups to present their case.

I currently use this route to cycle from Oakington to Tesco in Bar Hill; the current grassed surface is sufficient for this purpose and provides a pleasant journey for leisure cyclists. Paving over a very ancient and beautiful grassed route would be a form of urbanisation of the countryside. Naming of the Northstowe Southern Access Road West (SARW)

There are a number of proposals for naming SARW which connects the Northstowe Town Centre with the B1050 south of Longstanton. The road partly follows the route of the old runway, but will extend outside the perimeter of the old airfield and contains addresses for houses, shops, etc.

The first name suggested was 'Vickers Varsity Way', named after the Vickers Varsity, a type of aircraft manufactured by the Vickers company that had been operated on the airfield. It was first flown in 1949 and had been operated by the Royal Air Force from 1951 to 1976. An objection was received for that name.

The next suggested names were 'Farmland Road' or 'Wheatsheaf Way'. I objected to these two names on the grounds that they are "geographically anonymous". I also think that they are innocuous and feeble, and fail to convey the importance that this road will be the main entrance to Northstowe.

A resident of Longstanton has suggested the names 'Queen Elizabeth II Avenue' or 'King Charles III Avenue'. I fully support both these suggestions. The Royal Family has had a long connection with the airbase. His Majesty learnt to fly at 5FTS Oakington, was based at RAF Oakington and had his 21st birthday photographs taken there in 1969.

Environment Action Group

Progress on **flood mitigation** continues to be frustratingly slow. We understand that National Highways have at last delivered their A14 hydrology modelling to the Environment Agency who have promised their modelling on Oakington Brook in September/October this year. Homes England (Northstowe developers) are waiting for the results of this modelling so that they can design our promised attenuation pond.

This is also holding up plans for combining the attenuation pond with a **retirement community** in the village, as it is not possible to begin work on designing the retirement community until it is known how big the pond will be.

The EAG has continued to assist the Parish Council with watering of the new trees and shrubs that were planted at the recreation ground as part of the **Open Spaces Project**. This work is being coordinated by David Reeves (Parish Council Chair). An issue with the timber of the seating benches is being chased by the Parish Council.

We have also been monitoring the **village pond**. The pond has been clear of duckweed for several periods this year but keeping it in check remains a challenge. We have had some success with the use of Byofix (a preparation of enzymes and bacteria extracted from barley straw that uses up excess nutrients in the pond) and we hope to continue its use. We are also investigating removing the bulrushes from the front area of the pond, as they are obstructing the view of drivers coming out of the adjacent driveway as well as blocking the view of the pond from the footpath opposite. These plants are very aggressive and will quickly take over the shallow areas of the pond to the exclusion of other species if not

managed. We also plan to introduce some additional plants.

Our joint project with Sustainable Oakington and Westwick (SOW) to take part in the Cambridgeshire

Nature Recovery initiative is now underway, with the first session recording wildlife in the village on 9 September. See page 17.

Finally, we are continuing to monitor the **condition of footways** around the village to ensure that they are safe for users. We are aware of some issues where **hedges** need to be trimmed back. Generally, this is the responsibility of the property owners, and can be enforced by Cambridgeshire Highways if footways are being obstructed. We encourage anyone who is concerned about any potential hazard on a footway or road to report it to Cambridgeshire Highways via their website *highwaysreporting.cambridgeshire.gov.uk*.

Christmas Trees – £15

Community Confused?

You don't have to be a newcomer to find village group names a bit confusing. What is the Community Association and how does it differ from the Community Action groups?

The Community Association was founded decades ago when existing groups who used the school – then the main meeting facility in the village – banded together to negotiate a cheaper hire rate. Money had been raised after the First and Second World Wars for a village memorial hall, but proved insufficient for a new building. The Parish Council gave half the money to the Tennis Club, and half to the school to add the little servery so that visiting groups could make refreshments. For many years the various groups who were CA members took it in turns to clean the servery.

These days the CA continues to enhance community life as an umbrella association of village clubs and groups. It helps communication and co-operation between different groups, and manages the finances and oversees the organisation of the Village Day, Bonfire Night and the Journal.

The three Community Action groups (Environment, Transport and Neighbours) were formed in 2015 as the result of a parish-wide Community Plan survey.

An important announcement about your Landline Telephone

Around the world, the old system of using copper wires for landlines is being upgraded to digital. This is because those networks are old, hard to maintain, and cannot meet the demands of the modern world.

BT and EE in our region are upgrading right now; other landline providers will be expected to follow suit, before the copper system is shut down in 2025. Some houses in Oakington have already been digitalised and you may receive a notification through your door soon.

The changeover should be relatively straightforward. If you already have a Broadband Router, your telephone will be plugged into the back of that instead of directly into the wall socket. If you don't have a Broadband Router, your telephone service provider should give you a different box



to go in between your phone and the wall socket. This should be free of charge and you should not need to take out a Broadband contract. community afternoon with hands-on activities for the whole family. If you still have a rotary-dial (stick your finger in and spin the dial) phone, and I bet somebody out there does, these will no longer work, but any phone purchased since 1982 should be OK.

The router needs to be powered on for the phone to work, so in the event of a powercut it WILL NOT work. If you are in a mobile phone dead spot or do not use a mobile you need to raise this issue with your phone provider.

IMPORTANT. Some security alarms, elderly care alarms and medical equipment such as heart monitors that are linked to the hospital might not work. The providers of the equipment are aware that these landline changes are taking place and should have appropriate solutions.

If you have questions about this you can contact OWN. But your phone provider can help you with the transition and ensure you are not left without a service.

Manor Farm Close

Manor Farm Close, or to perhaps give it an older title Ash Close, was previously part of the Manor Farm Estate. The land incorporates the earlier Ash Close, and part of an allotment which was owned by



the Free School which was then on the other side of the High Street. Prior to 1959 the land was operated by Manor Farm Piggeries (I have signs of pigsties under my front lawn), and then was used as a builder's yard. In 1966 an application to convert the site to housing was rejected due to unsympathetic design and, typically for Oakington, drainage issues. In 1971 an improved application by Robinson and Gimbert to build 25 dwellings was approved (subject to space for 2.5 cars per plot!), and building started soon after. The developer went out of business building the site, which was then acquired and finished by T & E Homes. Several of the completed properties were acquired initially by Marshalls of Cambridge to provide accommodation for their increasing staff. I bought my own property as new from Marshalls, not the developer. As the last resident to move onto the site initially, I seem to have been graced with much of the legal site history in my deeds pack.

There are still a fair number of the original residents living in the Close, though of course many of the properties have been extended since as families and their needs grew over time. Residents have been active in village life, supporting the School, Churches and the Parish Council for example. At one point there were three Parish Councillors (myself, Roger Everton, and Simon Edwards) and one District Councillor (Simon again) living in the street.

An archaeological test pit in a resident's garden some years ago showed signs of a possible medieval inn, with pots and a floor level. Sadly no longer.

The field behind Manor Farm Close provides valuable green

space adjacent to the village. In 1884 it was divided into a Low Bury and a High Bury. "Bury" is an old English word with various meanings, the most likely to my mind is a "mound"



indicating higher ground, possibly fortified.

Given the Anglo-Saxon presence in the village in olden times, and the start of the fens not far away, this might suggest firstly a drier area perhaps for grazing, and possibly a defence against invasion from the fens. Some archaeology in the field might produce interesting results. Occasional attempts by speculative developers to build on this field have thankfully so far been refused by the local Councils.

My Volunteering

The renowned collection of snowdrops in February, the woodland walks through swathes of daffodils in March and April, the glorious colours of the dahlia border in August and September, as well as the Woodland Play Area and trails for children to explore, mean that there is something to see whenever you go. Not to mention the stunning Winter Lights in December, and the collections of art, antiques and books in the house itself.

Jim and Jo Bryant have volunteered at Anglesey Abbey for about five years, although Covid called a halt for nearly two years. Jim is a member of the Outdoor Team, which involves cleaning the considerable collection of statues in the grounds, erecting fencing, maintaining benches, moving shrubs and being general dogsbodies around the site. Most



recently the team have created a workshop in one of the barns, known as The Bothy, to enable more efficient working and provide organised storage for tools. Each week there are new tasks to complete, alternating

between supporting the work of the gardeners and assisting with facilities management, and the work of the team is very much appreciated.

Jo's role is less regular. She is known as a Set Dresser, which includes helping to get the house ready for Christmas. Last year it involved decorating three Christmas Trees, which is fun but also



surprisingly tiring as the trees are large and stepladders are needed. She has also been involved in several craft sessions including creating autumn décor for the second-hand bookshop; delivering a craft session making felt flower brooches on 'Time to Talk' Day, part of the National Trust's initiative in Mental Health Week supporting staff and volunteers; creating papier maché creatures for World Book Day; and creating paper dahlias and giant snowdrops!

SOW and EAG get hot spotting wildlife

You may remember that Sustainable Oakington and Westwick (SOW) and the Environment Action Group (EAG) got together on Village Day to launch our local Nature Recovery Project, part of Cambridge Nature Recovery. Cambridgeshire is one of the poorest counties for biodiversity in the UK and so is committed to doubling its nature by 2050. To measure how our nature is changing we have to learn how to recognize species and to record them, so we made our start on Saturday 9 September.

Cambridge has some special areas including chalk grassland centred on Wandlebury and the Gogs, wetlands including Wicken Fen and the River Cam Corridor. Oakington and Westwick are in what's known as an Opportunity Area, with fen edge orchards and droves, based on fragments of traditional orchards and fen ditches.

So, we chose the community orchard near the Pavilion to begin the task of spotting and recording. In planning any outdoor activity in the East of England, we have to consider the weather. What we didn't expect was that the 9th



September would be the hottest day of the year. So, we brought water, sunscreen and kept in the shade of the trees. In spite of 30°C, 16 people plus 3 children attended. It was lovely to include children. It is after all the next generations who hopefully will benefit from this project which is not only about biodiversity, but also about storing carbon and reducing the effects of climate change. Young ears are also apparently better at hearing the sonic sounds of bats.

Graham Tregonning introduced the ten year-old orchard with traditional varieties of apples, pears, plums, gages and cherries. I added that the orchard would become better for wildlife as it got older, and because it not sprayed, it already attracts invertebrates and other wildlife. The group discussed the five habitats that orchards provide: well-spaced trees with lots of light beneath; rotting timber with lichens, moss and nest holes; unimproved (no fertilizer) grassland; pollen and nectar for pollinators; and hedges.

The group paired up to explore the orchard in search of plants and animals. Plants recorded included mallow, cranesbills, hogweed, orache and hawkweeds. We even



found some yellow rattle, which is a parasite of grass, and holds back its growth to allow wild flowers to flourish. We found cocksfoot, known in the US as 'orchard grass'. We spotted some tracks in the long grass (the uncut bit) which are probably shared by muntjac, badgers and rabbits and found aphid, dock bugs and large white butterflies. We came together to discuss our findings and then Kay Prince demonstrated the use of the app iRecord. Those who are less able to handle apps agreed to record wildlife by emailing SustainableOW@gmail.com

Do make contact if you would like to join us. Research has clearly indicated that being outside with nature is really good for our well-being.

Making a five-inch (13 cm) hole in a boundary fence enables hedgehogs to forage safely in gardens. We



will have a number of hedgehog gap "surrounds" to give to people who can add a hedgehog highway to their boundary.

Other activities are under discussion, including a repair cafe and a community meal. Please get in touch or come to a

We have survived Covid and all the challenges that faced us over that terrible time. We have a wonderful building, for the use of this village and surrounding villages too, but it is very expensive to run, and this is where we are going to need ongoing village support.

We have an amazing multifunction building. It is run by a management committee of volunteers – we do these roles because we care about the Community we live in!

We need new faces on the committee. We need to rethink advertising, and promotion and usage of the building – especially our amazing function room/small business room.

We now have the addition of beautiful outdoor space and playground to go with our building so let's use it to its full potential. This building is for everyone in the village!


