From our Parish Council chair

Happy New Year!

The Parish Council has its first meeting of 2019 on 14 January when we will be discussing **our budget** for the coming financial year.

In our plan, we have prioritised spending on flood attenuation, traffic control measures and making the village more physically attractive. Trying to prevent any future **flooding** in the village has been a goal of many of my predecessors, but with the A14 and Northstowe being built around us, finally there does appear to be some light on the horizon. I hope that at some time this year we might be able to get some definite movement on this important issue. I would just like to thank Andrew Dennis for all the amazing work he is doing on this.

There has been a noticeable **increase in traffic**, and increasing numbers of speeding drivers too. We are very concerned about these issues. Speeding is a policing matter, but we see police officers in the village as often as Father Christmas.

Traffic calming measures are the responsibility of the County Council, but the cuts imposed by the government on local councils mean they struggle to fulfil their obligations. We have already co-purchased a traffic camera which is currently installed in Cambridge Road and we are exploring what additional powers Parish Councils have to tackle speeding. However, any measures to combat speeding and to prevent flooding may involve additional spending and therefore a possible increase in the level of the precept.

Finally, you have all had the chance of commenting on the **proposed Rural Travel Hub**. The Parish Council has made a formal response which can be read on our website. In essence, we oppose a Hub with

parking provision, as this will simply attract more cars through the village. However, we do not object to a rural public transport hub in which the route of the C6 bus will extended to the Hub. We have added a list of conditions which include a new dedicated cycleway/footpath and enforced parking controls in the nearby streets. Looks like a busy New Year!

We are looking forward to working for you as your District Councillors in 2019.

Issues with local transport. Since out last Journal update, we met with Andy Campbell, MD for Stagecoach East, to discuss problems with local bus services. He acknowledged there have been issues in the last few months with reliability of services on the Busway. They have had staffing issues, but they have started apprenticeships, are now fully staffed and things should improve. They have also requested 20 additional buses to come online for Spring of 2019. A more detailed report from this meeting can be found on our Facebook page.

We recommend residents continue to feedback issues and requests to Stagecoach directly, either via Twitter @stagecoach_east or email

cambridge.enquiries@stagecoachbus.com. Complaints are all collated and make a difference to their understanding of the issues.

We were also pleased to support a motion before South Cambs Full Council calling on the Combined Authority to bring forward the outcome of the strategic review of commercial, subsidised and community transport. The

Primary School. I have been working with the School Improvement Team on our Primary School after the very worrying OFSTED report. This culminated with a visit to the school on the 4th December, meeting Nathan Clark, the Acting Head, and Edmund Buss, the Chair of Governors. I have to say that I left with a spring in my step after seeing the changes and future direction that Nathan is leading our school in. OFSTED recently returned and are very pleased with the many improvements and changes put in place. Nathan is a very impressive young man who will move our school forward and progress with the procedural and safeguarding issues highlighted by OFSTED. This all bodes well for our children's education and futures.

Cycle paths. Jason Tyrell and Susan Rooke from the County Council Cycle Design Team continue to work on the new upgrade to Girton. Strutt and Parker have been appointed Land Agents for the Cottenham Path re the acquisition of private land.

Library Services. The County Council has approved an expenditure of £275k for two replacement mobile libraries. This secures the future of this valuable rural service and provides an opportunity for other outreach services.

New-look Child and Family Centres get seal of approval. Last April, against great opposition, the County Council transformed the way Children's Centre services were delivered. The County Council moved out of expensive Council called on them to ensure that the review makes provision to ensure that the residents of our villages could, at last, look forward to having the integrated, streamlined public transport provision that will make car use the less favourable option. The motion passed with unanimous support.

Councillor updates and surgeries. We are keen to meet residents at our regular surgeries, especially those who might find contacting us via email or social media difficult. At our final surgery of 2018 we were happy to meet Oakington residents and we are working with Council teams on issues they raised, including street-sweeping and the clearing of drains in the village, particularly on Water Lane.

buildings and into community buildings, getting the services iunto the heart of our communities, concentrating on where the need is greater.

In the recent survey, 93% of the people who shared their views online and at activity sessions agreed that the new provision was really helpful.

One respondent said they valued "being able to socialise and make new friends." Another said the Centres provided "somewhere to learn parenting skills for both new parents and parents who were experiencing difficulties." Another respondent said it was "useful to get advice and support from Family Workers and other staff."

The new model delivers services for families with children aged 0-19, and allows buildings to be used more flexibly, bringing services closer to the communities which need them via an improved outreach offer.

One of the changes put in place was to run events and activities from a wider range of venues in new locations. Of

those surveyed more than a third (36.67%) said they have attended a session delivered by their Child and Family Centre in an outreach venue such as a sports centre or village hall.




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Not Just a Smiley Face

After waiting for nearly a year the Parish Council (PC) received the speed camera equipment that it had successfully applied for through a joint Local Highways Initiative (LHI) and to be shared with Longstanton.

Many of you may well have seen that the equipment has been installed on Cambridge Road and has been operating since 22nd December with the "smiley face" greeting drivers coming into the village from the Girton direction. However, the equipment does record data for both inbound and outbound traffic. The equipment is also movable so that it can be easily repositioned throughout the village. This will enable a better understanding of the traffic flow through the village so that we can argue for improvements to be made to



keep everybody safer. The chart above shows the number of vehicles travelling along the Cambridge Road for the last 10 days of December and the first three days of the new year.

This copy of the Journal includes a brand **new leaflet** about OWN and what we do. Friendly contact and support is given to all members of the scheme whether they are helping or being helped.


Volunteers have assisted with computing and form filling, shopping, car lifts, and fetching prescriptions or will simply pop in for a cup of tea and a chat. Whoever and wherever support is needed in the village, we aim to provide it.

Not only that, but OWN organises community social events during the year to encourage all ages to mix and mingle, and the next will be on **Saturday 9 February**, **2.30-4.30pm** in



the Pavilion.

This year we'll be playing Bingo not Beetle, but it will be just as much fun and inclusive (although no cash prizes), and of course there will be tea and plenty of cake! The chart below shows the average speed for all vehicles entering and leaving the village along Cambridge Road. The range of speeds extends from 5mph to a scarily excessive 67mph!



An initial review of the data shows that just around 40% of the vehicle movements along Cambridge Road exceeded the speed limit.

It is still early days in getting to grips with all the data that is available from the equipment, but TAG will continue to analyse the information and there have been several volunteers offering to carry out this activity, but we would appreciate volunteers to help relocate the equipment probably on a two-monthly basis.

Environment Action Group

Our **Flood Mitigation Group** (FMG) has been working hard behind the scenes to reduce the risk of flooding in the village. Andrew Dennis attended the Northstowe Phase 3 Interactive Workshop in November to find out about drainage from the edge of Phase 3 and to scrutinise the plans for an attenuation pond by Longstanton Road which should control any water flowing towards Oakington. Meanwhile the FMG continues to push for the planned attenuation ponds on Oakington Brook upstream of the village. We have also been successful in persuading Anglian Water to remove their "witches' hat" pipe protection measures that were installed at the Dry Drayton Road bridge, which we believed posed an added flood risk by their capacity to snag debris.

Our **footpath sweeping** work continued in December, with small but enthusiastic teams of volunteers clearing leaves from our footpaths to make them safer and easier to use. We are very grateful to the fourteen volunteers who took part in the December clear-up: "never on the paths and verges of a village has so much been owed by so many to so few". We do this work under Cambridgeshire County Council's Highways





Volunteering Scheme, which provides insurance cover and allows us to work on County Council and District Council property, but not on private property. We urgently need more volunteers to help with this work: if you would be able to spare an occasional few hours please contact James Youd (01223 233639 - *jamesyoud51@icloud.com*).

James Youd and John Whittington **met with our district councillors** Sarah Cheung-Johnson and Alex Malyon at the end of November to discuss several issues, including the appearance of large puddles and localized flooding during periods of heavy rain. We believe that many of the roadside and in-kerb drains are badly blocked and inadequate for the volumes of water involved. Cambridgeshire County Council is responsible for clearing the drains but has limited resources; we have also requested that South Cambridgeshire District Council sweep the gutters more regularly in order to avoid drains getting blocked. We are unable to do this work ourselves as the Highways Volunteering Scheme under which we operate does not allow us to work in roads.

Finally, our **Oakington and Westwick in Bloom** initiative expanded in December to include three additional flower tubs, paid for by the Community Association. Like 16 other tubs in the village these are owned by the Parish Council and looked after by volunteers. We are very grateful to the Community Association for funding these additional tubs, to Philip and his team at the Garden Centre for planting them up, and to all the Oakington and Westwick in Bloom volunteers who care for the new and existing tubs.



21 Feb: "Digging Up a Spitfire"



In October 2015 Oxford Archaeology East were asked to excavate the site of a Spitfire which crashed during a training flight at Holme Lode Farm near Holme on 22 Nov 1940. Hedgehogs & Badgers

During the clearing of vegetation from pavements by the Environment Action Group, some suggestions have been made about helping hedgehogs by piling leaves and other vegetation to help their survival. There is no doubt that hedgehogs need our help. Their UK numbers have dropped from 30 million in the 1950's to under one million today.

Why such a drastic reduction? Probably loss of hedgerows in the countryside through increases in field size, ploughing up of permanent grass and pesticide use which has helped reduce invertebrate numbers in the countryside. About 150,000 hedgehogs are killed on roads every year. Ironically, road kill is an effective way of measuring changes in their populations. There are some indications that hedgehog numbers in urban areas are being maintained, but not so in the countryside.



What do hedgehogs eat? Beetles, grubs, earthworms

and slugs (a good reason to encourage them in gardens), but they also eat birds' eggs. Hedgehogs are nocturnal. They range over 1.2 km.

Any predators? Badgers, who use their massively powerful claws to pull hedgehogs apart. However, they seem to co-exist in some areas. What about hibernation? They try to eat well in August and September to put on fat reserves. They hibernate from September guided by temperature, so in 2018 it was much later. They hibernate in leaf piles, wood piles, compost heaps or other warm, dry places. It is clearly a good idea to check for the presence of hedgehogs under bonfires before lighting them.

What can we do in our gardens to help hedgehogs?

- Construct hog houses e.g. leaf and woodpiles, flower pots laid over with dried grass inside
- 5 inch holes in fences to allow hedgehogs to range more widely
- Build escape routes from pond water
- Reduce pesticide use slug pellets harm hedgehogs
- Feed dog food. Do not feed bread and milk, as recommended years ago but not easily digested

Badgers live underground, in setts usually with a series of entrances. Their latrines are usually a few yards away from the main sett. Like hedgehogs, they are nocturnal but unlike hedgehogs they do not hibernate, hunting for earthworms, insects, young mammals, plant bulbs and roots throughout the year and they even raid wild bee nests for 'honey'.

We have a few setts in the village; they tend to favour lighter soils for ease of digging. They share the same paths as deer and other mammals. Because of some evidence of spreading bovine tuberculosis (cattle TB) they are the subject of Government culling and research in the West Country.

Parish Council FINANCE

In the first of a series of articles on the workings of the Oakington & Westwick Parish Council (PC) we aim to shed some light on its finances as it seems to cause a deal of confusion.

First of all, let's be clear: parish councillors ARE NOT paid. Being a councillor is an entirely voluntary role, with not even expenses reimbursed, except for the chairman who gets £100 pa. The PC employs a part-time paid Clerk. Her role is to provide advice, administrative/ finance support and to implement the PC's decisions.

Parish Councils do not receive any direct funding from central government, therefore are reliant on the local tax (precept) they set and any other income they generate from the services or facilities they provide, such as cemetery fees. This precept is a small part of the rates which the District Council collects from householders, which they then pass to our parish council.

The current precept is $\pounds 35,350$ which is approximately $\pounds 60$ per household, roughly $\pounds 1.15$ per week. This is amongst the lowest in South Cambridgeshire!

The precept is based on the budget the PC sets in January for the coming financial year, which for this year (2019) will be spent in approximately these proportions:

clerk costs	25%
grounds maintenance/play area	18%
youth support: Connections Bus	16%
general admin	16%
pavilion & MUGA	10%
highways	4%
miscellaneous community support	11%

The PC owns the recreation ground including the children's play area, cemetery, pavilion, MUGA and Stocks Green and is therefore responsible for their maintenance. The PC also has a duty to spend on things that benefit residents, according to rules set in statutes.

The money cannot be spent on services that other authorities have a legal duty to provide such as road maintenance, policing,



schooling, etc. For example, the Highways costs above are minor contributions: the PC has limited powers in respect of Highways, footpaths, lighting, drains etc.
