We started 2017 with very little in the way of reserves, and at the time of the AGM, there was an overall balance of £2069. The Village Day was very successful and generated an eventual surplus of £1,837.22. The Journal produced a surplus of £465. The Association has taken out annual Public Liability Insurance at a cost of £991.76. We are still building a sound level of reserves, but soon hope to be able to invest in community projects such as the Environmental Action Group's Planters.

Our next event is the **Spring Market** that will be held from 2-5 pm on Saturday 24 March, at the White Horse. We have a great variety of stalls selling local produce and crafts, including a cake stall run by the WI. The pub will be selling hot snacks as well as their usual range of food and drink. The Village Shop is supporting the Market, and we hope that customers will go from the market to the Village Shop to buy the rest of their shopping.

From the Parish Council Chair

I was reading a short history of Oakington this morning and apparently, in the mid 19th century, whole families moved out of Oakington and emigrated to Adelaide, Australia to escape the terrible poverty here. In fact, over three years, the population declined by one third.

How times change! Today, the parishes of Oakington and Longstanton are undergoing massive expansion as families seek to move here, drawn by the possibility of work in the

Cambridge region. So far, expansion in Oakington has been limited and gradual, but the big bang is arriving; **Northstowe** phases 2 and 3 are about to impact massively upon us and we need to start, as a community, thinking about the impact and responding positively to it.

As you probably all know, Northstowe will eventually consist of approximately ten thousand homes, new schools, a town centre and a range of social amenities. It is being built in three 'phases'; the first phase is already being built around Longstanton and will pick up in pace over the next

"Phases 2 and 3... will change Oakington forever." few months. Phase 1 largely impacted on Longstanton. Well, now it is the turn of Phase 2 to start, which, apart from thousands of homes, will include the town centre and a new secondary school. Planning permission has already been granted and work will

begin very soon. Within ten years this will be our nearest town and social centre. The first 'concrete' sign of the work on Phase 2 will be the new access road running from Bar Hill interchange across Longstanton Rd into the old airfield site. This will initially be used for heavy vehicles involved in major structural work and then become one of the main routes out of Northstowe to the A14.

But it is now the turn of phase 3 to go through planning and this is the phase of the town that will come within 200 metres of Oakington.

I don't think it an exaggeration to say that Phases 2 and 3 of Northstowe, and the seven thousand homes which will be

"We have a choice" built there, will change Oakington for ever. We have a choice, we can shrug our shoulders and let them get on with construction, or we can recognise that this is

going to happen and try to make Northstowe Phases 2 and 3 parts of a great town for people to live in and a pleasant place for us to visit.

The Parish Council will be active in scrutinizing the plans for Phase 3 and expressing its opinions on your behalf. But I would also urge you all to attend any Northstowe events, such as the Northstowe Parish Forums in order to know what is happening and let the planners, politicians and builders know your views on how Northstowe can be built to the highest standards.

On the same theme of change, I wrote about the proposed **Rural Travel Hub**, in the last edition of the journal. The

travel hub idea was first proposed by The Greater Cambridge Partnership and the Parish Council expressed interest in the idea, if it brought demonstrable benefits to Oakington.

In order for everyone in the village to have a chance to see the plans and discuss them, representatives from the Greater Cambridge Partnership will be attending the Annual Parish Meeting on Monday April 23rd to give a presentation. Please do come along.

On a very different topic, many of you will have noticed the rather dramatic cutting back of the **tall leylandii trees on Dry Drayton Road** as one enters/exits Oakington village. There is a long and complicated story regarding these trees, which would involve a whole edition of the Journal if I were to recount it in full. In short, we would like these trees cut down to hedge level, but there are legal issues involved I am unable to go into. Let me just say that our District Councillors, Simon Edwards and Lynda Harford and our County Councillor, Peter Hudson have battled on our behalf to get these trees both cut back and reduced in height. They continue to argue on our behalf for a reduction in height.

Finally, as I wrote earlier, The **Annual Parish Meeting** takes place on **Monday April 23rd in the Pavilion**, starting at **7.30pm**. This is the annual event when clubs and societies in the village give a report of their activities, including the Parish Council. *"A fabulous* This year we also have the presentation by **social** The Greater Cambridge Partnership **event!"** regarding the Rural Travel Hub. From the District Council

Community Energy Grant. The council is building on its commitment to supporting local communities through the popular Community Chest scheme by introducing a new Community Energy Grant Fund. Community groups can bid for funding. From March, parish councils, charities, voluntary groups, sports and social clubs and not-for-profit organisations can bid for up to £3,000 per organisation per year towards energy-saving and green initiatives such as insulation, lighting and heating controls for community buildings and installation of electric vehicle charging points.

Recycling. Extra recycling (no glass, please, for safety reasons) left next to the blue bin will be collected *only* if it is contained in one transparent sack (available from supermarkets or online), or one bundle of cardboard of a size which will fit inside the bin. The crew will empty your blue bin first, then place the extra recycling in the bin and empty it again. For safety reasons extra recycling from returnable containers or cardboard boxes is no longer collected. If you regularly have extra recycling you can order an extra blue bin. These are now free of charge.

Community Plan Groups

Environment Action Group

Our **Flood Mitigation Group** continues with its prime objective of controlling water in the brook before it enters the village. Flood attenuation ponds would divert flood flows into storage before being released back into the brook when water levels have abated. Much still needs to be done before we see any work on site but so far we are encouraged by responses. In the meantime, we have discussed with the Environment Agency the maintenance of the brook through the village so that flows pass downstream as efficiently as possible.

They have started regular maintenance work to trim vegetation from the banks, and we have agreed with them a larger scheme to take out bushes etc on sections of the brook where they potentially hold up flows. Funding permitting, this scheme will be undertaken within the next 12 months.

The **restoration of the village pond** is going ahead following the successful application to the Wildlife Enhancement Scheme to supplement the Parish Council's earlier contribution. Final approval in January meant that we



had a short time in which to carry out the work before the bird nesting season and the return of aquatic wildlife following hibernation. The contractor was able to carry out the tree work during February by removing overhanging branches and brambles and the de-silting operation is scheduled for early March. Many thanks to Dave Pegg and Mr. Wynn at the Crossways Garage for their cooperation and tolerance.

The ongoing work of keeping our **paths and walkways** clear and safe has continued, with enthusiastic teams sweeping pavements and 'siding out' encroaching vegetation in late January and early February. We are always looking for volunteers: contact James Youd on C 233639, *jamesyoud51@icloud.com*.

We have been working with the Parish Council on proposals for a **notice board and bench, and waste bin**, on the grass verge between Mead View and the shop. Consultation of

Transport Action Group

Preliminary consultations have started with the county council regarding the initial spend of Northstowe phase 1 section "106" monies for **"Oakington to Girton cycleway improvements".**



Initially £35k is being made available to fund the studies into how/what the remaining £415k (not yet released) should be spent on, and discussions will be taking place with affected parties (mostly Oakington and Girton).

Although this sounds like a lot, it actually isn't much for any scheme to make any serious improvements to the route. Consider how much land or a junction modification would cost! However, with considerations of Greenways and other projects it is hoped that a proposal can be found that provides useful route improvement for Oakington residents and others. TAG have provided the parties involved with copies of our proposals and ideas developed with input from the village over the last few years and will continue to work alongside our parish council to try and ensure some improvements are made. Getting To Know You

Liz Davis

Liz has been a committed villager and inspiration to people in the village as someone who is willing to give their time to others. She has led a varied and interesting life! In this interview series, we get to know a villager – just a little bit better!



Liz first came to Oakington as a new bride 53 years ago at the age of 19. When her two daughters were small she started a small childminding circle with friends Mary and Marian. This then grew into what was to become the Humpty Dumpty Playgroup! In 1971 her academic husband was on sabbatical in Australia and their son was born there. When they returned, her daughters went to school, and the playgroup continued in other peoples' houses. Liz has always been an active member of the community and was PTA secretary at the village school and eventually all three of her children went to IVC. (Years later two stepchildren joined the extended family and Liz's parents also moved to "Midfield Lodge" when they became old and frail.)

After another sabbatical, this time in California, her goddaughter joined the family permanently after her mother died. Liz had spent her teens in Italy and this led to her subsequent profession as a Public Service Interpreter in Italian. Life was busy, and as a single mother of four young ones ranging from 10 - 15, she also had a variety of day jobs, from bookseller at Heffers to bi-lingual tour-guiding amongst others.

Liz was involved in forming CINTRA (Cambridge Interpreting and Translation) a not-for-profit company set up for public services in legal, medical and local government fields. When she retired as voluntary Chairman of Directors a few years ago, they had grown to 700 interpreters and translators on their books who were working in almost every known language! Alongside this, Liz also worked for 27 years as the only Staff Interpreter at Addenbrookes working with Italians who came to the UK for liver transplants.

Liz has always given her commitment to a host of voluntary positions, from Parish Councillor, the Methodist Chapel in Oakington, where she acted as Senior Steward, the Salvation Army shop and CAMSIGHT. She now attends the Histon Methodist Chapel since the Oakington one closed.

About 25 years ago Liz started voluntary work with CAMSIGHT (the Cambridge Society for the Blind and Partially Sighted), and is still volunteering to this day for what she calls "an amazing charity!"

After the Methodist Chapel closed, the Monday Café and many small groups moved to St Andrew's new Church Hall. Liz still helps to organise this and so the Monday Café has been able to stay open after more than 10 years as a community facility.

Nowadays her only other "civic duty" is to keep the Telephone Box Library tidy and to make sure that the books are recycled as speedily as possible between that and the other three bookstalls with which she is involved

Liz says that she sees Oakington as her "forever home" and even planned to be buried here. Settled now in the village, Liz and Peter, her second husband and an ever increasing family of 11 grandchildren and two great grandchildren, are happy to have their roots firmly planted in a hopefully flood free Oakington at Apryl House.

Reporting non-emergencies to police online

Non-emergency situations can now be reported to the police online if people would rather do so than call 101.



Cambridgeshire Constabulary's website enables this via specially designed forms, or using a live webchat.

The live webchat option enables people to communicate directly with a member of staff in the control room, just as would be the case when calling 101. Online forms are processed in the same way as a call and the person reporting can expect a response within 24 hours.

Due to the high level of demand there are often queues when calling 101. Reporting online is quick, easy and free of charge.

Nature Notes



How do you fancy squid and chips instead of cod? Because the UK seas are warming up, cod seem to be moving north in the search for cooler water. What other changes can we expect from wildlife with Climate Change?

In January we saw aconites, snowdrops

and willow catkins in flower; in February daffodils and primroses. Migrating birds such as blackcaps are arriving earlier and brimstone butterflies have been spotted in February. Is spring happening earlier because of climate change?



Records from the Met Office's National Climate Information Centre suggest that spring temperatures are 1° C higher than the average during the period 1961 to 1990 and the number of days with frost is 15% lower. This is extending the growing season of plants. Most of us recognise this increase in temperature is linked to more carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. In 1750, the figure was 280 parts per million (ppm), by 1960 the figure was 315ppm and by 2016, the number reached 400 ppm. As you know, carbon dioxide is the main greenhouse gas that stops the sun's energy reflecting back into space.

The predicted weather patterns suggest warmer springs and summers, more droughts, more storm events, and more flooding bringing difficulties for us all. More soil erosion will result, but one of the biggest concerns is melting ice near the poles and rising sea levels. New pests and diseases are arriving, particularly with warmer conditions. We all have a responsibility to take this threat seriously and reduce fossil fuel use where we can.

Wildlife can suffer with the changes. Habitats can be destroyed and animal species can find themselves out of sync with plant development, and predator prey relationships disrupted. But wildlife but can also adapt to the new conditions over time, or migrate.

You may have seen **little egrets** in Oakington. Two or three are often to be seen around the brooks near Mansell Wood. They are about half the size of herons. Twentyfive years ago they were very rare but our warmer conditions have attracted them from mainland Europe to East Anglia and the South East.

So, let's still celebrate the arrival of spring, having come through another winter.


Chess Café
