Pilot Rural Travel Hub in Oakington

Rural Travel Hubs are a new concept to create bespoke rural transport interchanges to connect residents in South Cambridgeshire with public transport, cycling and walking routes. They aim to reduce the levels of private car journeys into Cambridge from the surrounding villages by providing sustainable transport options and also provide connections

between neighbouring villages and towns.

The Greater Cambridge Partnership has put forward some initial ideas for pilot Rural Travel Hubs in Oakington and Sawston. We carried out initial engagement with local communities this summer to find out their needs and gather feedback on the initial ideas. This included attending a number of local events, hosting an exhibition at Oakington Pavilion and a stakeholder workshop at Cottenham Pavilion.

A preliminary feasibility study discussed a possible hub in Oakington near Station Road and adjacent to the Guided Busway route. Potential facilities of an Oakington Rural Travel Hub could include:

- Drop-off/pick-up facility
- Car parking spaces (around 40, with disabled bays)
- More secure cycle parking, including cycle lockers
- Bus turn around/stop, including a shelter and raised

kerbs for level boarding

 Widening of the footpath between Oakington village and the Busway

The project could include extending the Citi 6 bus route to serve the rural travel hub, thereby providing motorists with more opportunities to change to sustainable transport

resulting in less congestion.

We are currently analysing the feedback from the engagement and aim to publish the results in the autumn. Initial analysis indicates mixed views on whether to include parking spaces, with some residents concerned about overspill parking in residential streets and increased traffic levels. Other residents noted that those with limited mobility would benefit from the parking spaces, as it would improve access to the Busway services.



Elisabeth has just retired after volunteering for 24 years at Oakington School, listening to Class 2 children's reading. She has fond memories going back to Mrs Livingston's time here.

Who knows or remembers that from 1997 Elisabeth was

Newsletter', the Community Association's forerunner of the Journal? Initially it consisted only of notices of what was happening in the village. CA members would post information through her letterbox and these Elisabeth would type up on two A4 sheets. She and Andrew then made 550 double-sided copies on their home office copier, before counting them up into bundles and distributing these to the team of deliverers. Elisabeth remembers that, amongst others, Di Wisbey was one of the deliverers even back then! When advertisers asked for space, Elisabeth had to hand cut

out the adverts and stick them on to the page to be copied. The CA paid for paper and copying costs. Volume of material soon doubled to four A4 pages, increasing the time it took to produce each Newsletter. At one stage the Dennis' were stapling two A4 sheets together, then later folding 550+ copies of A3 sheets. They estimate they spent a good eight hours on each issue, eleven times a year!!

In 2008 Elisabeth stepped down. Technology had advanced and the new editor could produce the Newsletter on a computer before it was professionally printed. Much as Elisabeth and Andrew had enjoyed producing the Newsletter, they no longer needed to fit their holidays around the monthly deadlines!

Andrew has a farming background and studied agricultural engineering at the now Cranfield University before becoming a consultant. But it was not all work! He has a passion for Bar Billiards and has been secretary of the local league for 40 years!

Elisabeth grew up in Hull. She early on discovered a love of singing, both in choirs and as a soloist. She has a book full of cuttings and programmes from her years of contesting and performing - and being on the radio. In 1951 the Festival of Britain took place, which included a competition for Britain's Best Junior Choir. 'The Hallean Singers', of which Elisabeth was a member, won first the Yorkshire heat and then the national finals in London! Elisabeth still loves choral music, the King's Singers being her favourite group.

After a fall two years ago her mobility is reduced, but Elisabeth still does all the typing for Andrew, she is an avid reader and there is always a home made cake in the house! Iréne Butlin



What to do if you find a dog

If you can safely restrain the dog but there is no ID or you cannot get a response from the contact details, ring South Cambs District Council dog warden services, 03450 450063 (8 am - 5.30 pm Mon-Fri.) You can then either call Wood Green Animal Charity on 0300 303 9333 to arrange to take it to their shelter or, if you are happy to do so, keep it until the council can collect it. A vet can also scan the dog for a microchip. You must inform the dog warden about any dog found straying whose owner cannot be contacted, otherwise you may cause a delay returning the dog to its rightful owner.

If you are not confident around dogs please ask for help from others around, or even a local house. While you should obviously not take any risks with a dog you feel might be dangerous, dogs that growl, snarl or bare their teeth are often doing this out of fear. These are warning signs that you are likely to get bitten if you come any closer, or you may cause the dog to run away. Throwing appetising food towards the dog (not offering from your hand at first) or gently encouraging the dog towards you verbally are better tactics for a fearful dog. If you feel the dog may bite, stay at a distance but note where the dog is and report as soon as you can on the village Facebook group or to someone who has access so others can keep a look out.


If you find a dog without ID outside of office hours but cannot keep the dog until the next working day then you can ring the council on 03450 450063 to make arrangements to take it to 'Out of Hours' kennels. Although there are no formal agreements for anyone else to take the dog to look after it, you may find someone willing to help at a local vets or on the village facebook group (including myself if I can).

Please whatever you do don't leave a vulnerable dog for someone else to deal with - remember the dog is most likely a very much loved family member to someone.

Wood Green Animal Charity run regular FREE Family Dog Workshops which teach dog body language and safety around dogs. So if you're not sure you'd recognise a friendly dog from a scared or angry one or if you'd just like to learn more about safely interacting with dogs, give them a call on 0300 303 9333.

Your dog must always wear an identity tag or collar with

your name and address on in public. If your dog roams on walks or from your garden, take them to a reward-based training class to teach them how to come back when called - and build a dogproof fence!





From our Parish Council Chair

Life is returning to normal for most people now after the August holidays with school and work back in full swing. The yearly pattern of Parish Council work reflects the summer break, with few new things happening and the Council not meeting in August.

Orchards

You may remember that the village has two Community Orchards; one at the rear of the recreation ground, the other on Mill Road. They are yours and so is any fruit grown on them. Please feel free to go along and help yourselves! Of course, don't pick too much, so we can all get some delicious fresh fruit.

Over the last year, the Mill Road orchard, in particular, has got rather overgrown, but the Parish Council has put new arrangements in place for the grass between the trees to be cut regularly and to give the orchard a more 'looked after' feel.

We are also looking for someone who might consider pruning our fruit trees and maybe keeping an eye on their welfare over the year. It would be a great contribution to the village and I am sure it would be a pleasant activity in itself. Please let me know if you are interested.

Recreation Ground

We have a little money to spend and are looking for good

ideas. We are thinking of having a path to run around the outside of the recreation ground; a 'rough play' area for older children; and finally some benches and shrubs to the front of the Pavilion so that people can sit there and chat in pleasant surroundings. Please throw in your suggestions.

Traffic

A constant issue in the village is the amount and speed of traffic. Unfortunately we have few powers to limit it or slow it down. We are co-purchasing an interactive traffic sign (the sort that smiles or frowns, depending upon your speed) with another Parish Council, but are considering buying another one just for our use. This will be debated at the September meeting. Do you think they are useful? Do you have any other suggestions for slowing down the traffic? And no, before you say it, there is absolutely no chance of getting the police to enforce the speed limits.

We can, however run a Speed Watch group of our own and if anyone is interested in becoming involved, please, please let me know and we will arrange for training and support.

The physical barrier to traffic movement on Longstanton Road has had a huge impact on that side of the village. Indeed, we now have a new park, for that is what the central section of Longstanton Road between Oakington and Longstanton has become. Each evening there are dog walkers and cyclists, as well as families out for a stroll at the weekends. There has been some misunderstanding over the status of the first part of Longstanton Road, which is open up to the point where the houses finish. Apparently some

people walking along the road have been upset by vehicles driving along here – not realising that they are simply accessing the stables.

The saga of the proposed (in)famous Travel Hub at the guided busway stop crawls on. Some parish councillors attended a workshop earlier in the summer and we are still unclear exactly what benefits are meant to accrue from this development. Certainly, the organisers of the workshop had no clear ideas!

You may notice a considerable number of heavy lorries rolling through the village on their way to the new development in Cottenham. We are rather unhappy about this, but discovered that when planning permission was first given, well over a year ago now, it was agreed (not by us!), that the lorries should not disturb the peace of the people of Cottenham, but would come through Oakington instead. My apologies, we were not included in the discussions regarding this and now it is too late.

To finish...

... on two good things. Very soon, there will be a bench put up on the small green by the village shop, so you can have a sit down and chat to people going to the shop. Special thanks to Arthur Sillet for this.

And finally, don't the flower tubs around the village look great!

We are very grateful to all involved, and we plan to install a further three tubs in October, with funding from the Community Association.



It now looks like we will not have access to the **Traffic Monitor** until December at the earliest. Some preliminary work has been done to identify suitable places for the monitor to be located around the village.

A workshop/consultation was held in July in Cottenham on the proposed Oakington **Travel Hub**. Notes on this meeting have not been circulated yet but there was agreement that it should be a hub for public transport with perhaps only

limited disabled parking being available. It was felt that unless the Citi 6 is extended to the busway it could hardly be called a hub; there has been no clear commitment by Stagecoach to extend the Citi 6. Some of the messages coming out from the Greater Cambridge Partnership and Stagecoach are confusing to say the least.

Excessive speeding along the length of **Dry Drayton Road** has long been a problem for villagers, and with the addition of the Olive Tree café at the Garden Centre and the re-opening of

the farm shop, entry and exit to them has become a higher risk. In order to try and moderate the speeding the Parish Council and Transport Action Group has put in a joint Local Highways Initiative application to extend the 30MPH zone down to the Business Park (with a chicane) and 40MPH down to the parish boundary (effectively the A14). The outcome of this will not be known until early in 2019.

Planning for **Phase 3 of Northstowe** is currently underway and there have been a number of opportunities for parish residents to make an input into the process, the latest being held at the Communitea Café. Of particular interest is the opportunity to open up new footpaths and the need to keep a green belt between us and the new developments at Northstowe which will come right down to the edge of the airfield bordering the village. There is also talk of another access road into Northstowe that will start near the Business Park and then potentially join on to the one being currently built somewhere near the

livery stable along the airfield road.

Proposals for a **rail link between Oxford and Cambridge** are being developed by an organisation called East West Rail. Details can be found on their website

(www.eastwestrail.org.uk). However there are counter proposals being developed by CamBed railroad

(www.geag.org.uk/files/cambedrailroad-booklet-v6.pdf) which provides some reasoned arguments for linking in Cambourne and Bourne future developments. The proposal also suggests that Northstowe should have a railway station that appears to be located in Oakington! These are just proposals

at the moment but residents need to be watchful of all developments that could impact the parish.

It was always going to be a hard sell - a show about caring for someone with dementia, but "Holding Hands" was well worth seeing. Oakington Pavilion was transformed into a

mini-theatre with a professional sound and light set-up which enhanced and gave breadth to a one-woman performance with light, sound and video montage. Oakington is clearly ahead of the curve as sketches about personal experiences were a feature of this year's Edinburgh Festival, but this was an hour-long drama which was, by turns, funny and shocking, wacky and

concerning. It raises questions about personal independence and human rights, making decisions, and the vulnerability created by legal restrictions and overstretched public services when police are unable, sometimes unwilling, to act and when social workers assigned to your case change frequently without notice. "Threadbare" is how public services were described, and together with businesses so concerned with making money to survive that they do not query unusual or inappropriate activity, the door is open for unsavoury and, not to put too fine a point upon it, evil people to take advantage of an elderly person with delusions

about having won the Second World War singlehandedly with the help of movie heroes. It's a scenario you would not believe to be possible, except that, for the actor (who was also the writer), it was all too real. The play highlighted the impact of dementia beyond the individual affected, and the

weakness and failure, for various reasons, of those, like GPs, whom we traditionally assume will assist. The denouement involved removing the sufferer to a place of safety by pretending to take him on holiday, but the drama shows how we all need to be aware how best to support family members who have dementia – something which looks set to increase significantly with an

ageing population. This was one, and it must be said bizarre, set of circumstances but similar situations are probably more common than we realise. Big thanks to the Field Theatre Group for a simultaneously entertaining and disturbing production.

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

From our District Councillors

We hope that all residents have had a good summer since our last journal update. While there are slightly fewer council meetings to attend over the summer there has still been lots to keep us busy.

Northstowe Noise - One of the main issues we are working hard to resolve is problems with Northstowe construction work outside of permitted time. We are encouraging Oakington residents affected, particularly as Phase 2 progresses, to report issues to us with dates, times, locations and what you think the activity was. Permitted hours of work are Mon-Fri 0800-1800, Sat 0800-1300, with deliveries and removal of spoil allowed between 0700-1900. We are working with the Planning Enforcement team at SCDC to tackle this.

Rural Travel Hubs - Following a meeting set up by the Greater Cambridge Partnership on the Rural Transport Hub for community groups from Oakington and Cottenham it was clear there was much divergence in residents' views on what would make a successful Travel Hub. The project team have gone back to incorporate concerns raised but we have not had another update over the summer.

Food Bank Campaign - Over the summer we have set up food bank donation points in the village at the Communitea



Café and village shop. Families who rely on free school meals can need to find an extra £30-40 per week to feed their children over the holidays and may have to turn to foodbanks for emergency help. You could also support the local shop at the same time by popping in to buy

your donations there!

Northstowe Road – Together with the Parish Council we have raised concerns on future plans for Northstowe Southern Access Road (East) which would come from Northstowe and meet Dry Drayton Road potential traffic flows. Homes England confirm no concrete plans have been made and they are currently monitoring traffic flows to allow them to better analyse the proposals.

Signs for Village Amenities. These have now been agreed and will point towards Longstanton Road from the Crossroads.

The **speed table** at the entrance to the village from Dry Drayton Road has at last been repaired. The delay was due to having to get agreement with the A14 developers (Highways England) as to when we could close Dry Drayton Road for the short amount of time needed to complete repairs.

Division Highways meeting. The second of these meetings has taken place and included Parish Clerks/Chairs from Longstanton, Over, Oakington and Westwick, along with representatives from Highways. This was a great success and highway issues were reported and discussed by each Parish. The next meeting has been scheduled for Friday 9th November.

Cycle path to Cottenham. The funding for this was hard won from the Greater Cambridge Partnership. This funding can only be spent on cycling infrastructure. To win this, we had to go against several other parishes who argued and presented very well for their parishes. Fortunately, we were able to come out on top.

County's **war on pot holes** increases as two new 'dragons' fly in! Cambridgeshire has become the 'mother' of three fiery 'dragons' as the campaign against potholes continues. This month, Cambridgeshire County Council has been firing

up two new specialist machines, known as 'dragon patchers', to complete their pothole repairs.

They will join the county's first dragon patcher which since January has made almost 7,000 repairs to potholes and larger patches across Cambridgeshire. The machine can repair up to 150 potholes a day. It is nicknamed the 'dragon' because it fires out flames to dry out the road surface, which is then cleaned with compressed air and sealed with a stone mix and hot bitumen. This is much quicker and simpler than traditional methods.

The County Council has been working hard to restore our roads following the damage done by the Beast from the East and the severe weather we had earlier this year, and are really pleased to have these two new dragon patchers. Highways have made changes to the way they repair the potholes so they are ready for this winter! These dragons are around five times faster than traditional methods. They are also mobile, which is particularly good for rural areas and they can do more work for the money.

With five crews on the ground, plus two dedicated dragon patchers, the County Council is currently filling more than 1,000 potholes a week.

Nature Notes

'We're having a heatwave'

UK temperatures were 2.2 degrees above average in July, sunshine hours were 138% of average and rainfall was 71%. In Oakington, we had 16mm rain on 29th July following 57 days of drought (Andrew Dennis). One indicator was the absence of the noise of grass mowing. Most mowers took a two-month holiday because grass stopped growing and went into survival mode. It only started to look green again after the rains of 9th and 10th of August.

Butterflies enjoyed the hot weather and numbers on the wing were well up. Some feared that a continuation of the heat wave would stunt vegetation growth so that caterpillars would fail to find food, but the August rains allayed some of those concerns.

September is the time to see **spider webs** dew-laden in the early morning. The garden spider is one of our 40 species which spin disc shaped webs. The female spins her web once, attaching tension lines to nearby plants. She then goes over the outer web again, this time spinning a sticky web and eating the original material. Perfect recycling? She waits in the middle of the web, to scuttle out when her prey gets caught in the outer spiral.



Some web makers invade houses at this time of year. They include house spiders and daddy long-legs spiders (which have eight legs whereas true daddy long legs, or crane flies, have six and can fly).

A few spiders do not make webs. This group includes wolf spiders, which lead a nomadic lifestyle. Females carry egg sacs under their bodies and then carry their young on their backs. They hunt and inject venom into their prey.

Harvestmen are related to spiders. They have eight legs, two of which are longer than the rest, and they use them to feel their way about. They are often found on bare earth in harvested fields.

Harvest. As expected, wheat and barley yields were way down this summer because of the heatwave. 30% reductions were not uncommon. Happily, from the farmers' perspective, drying costs were almost zero and low yields have eased up prices.

Climate change. According to the UK Meteorological Office's Hadley Centre, extreme summer temperature events in Europe are now 10 times more likely than they were in the early 2000's. What was the message in the Baz Luhrmann song of 1997? 'Always wear sunscreen'? Also, don't forget the water and shade.
