# From our Parish Council Chair

id you know that the Parish Council is an elected body which represents the people of Oakington and Westwick? It seems that few people do if I ask them. Well, our period of office runs out in May and two of our councillors are standing down. If anybody would like to contribute to the community and wishes to stand to be a councillor, then please contact our clerk, Laura Lawrence (see panel for her details). If there are more candidates than there are councillor positions (eight in all), we will have a local election. Could be exciting!

I would like to thank the two councillors who are standing down, both of whom will be a real loss to the Parish Council and to the village.

Geoffrey Butlin has been a councillor for 11 years. He has been a dynamic and forward thinking councillor. He played an active role in starting the Community Planning process which led to our three Action Groups; OWN, EAG and TAG. We can also thank him for initiating and driving forward the proposals for additional facilities at the recreation ground which has involved a huge amount of work.

The second councillor leaving us is Lis Warboys. Lis has been an absolutely excellent colleague notable for her clear and positive contributions in our debates and her complete reliability to carry out the projects she has volunteered to take responsibility for. The marvellous upgrading of the cemetery is entirely due to her. Thank you Lis and Geoffrey.

We have received two pieces of good news concerning the roads in the village. The traffic calming measures have been fully approved and we are now waiting for the dates when the work will begin. Secondly the resurfacing of the pavement in Westwick has finally been agreed and is in the 2022/23 County Council budget.

Thank you, County Councillor Firouz Thompson.

Less welcome news is that a new housing development in Cottenham, which was approved a number of years ago, is soon to be started. At the time the Planning Permission was granted, no conditions were made regarding a route for the lorries to access the site. These lorries may well be coming through Oakington! TAG, the PC and our District Councillors are all vigorously opposing this.

The other less welcome news is that the construction of the Cambridge Road combined cycle path/footpath has been delayed.

Previously I mentioned our concern regarding the lack of plans for the old **Playgroup building** next to the school. I am pleased to say that the school will be using the building on a temporary basis, which may become permanent. It is quite possible that it will become available for community use in the evening.

Platinum Jubilee. As older residents of the village know, it is traditional for the Parish Council to mark royal jubilees with a present of a mug for the children of the village. We decided to continue the tradition. Separately, we are applying for a grant to plant a commemorative tree on the Recreation ground.

Ukraine. Finally, I think all of us are appalled at the events in Ukraine. I know there is a real desire amongst villagers to offer help to the refugees.

There are various initiatives taking place and the Parish Council will be fully involved in shaping and supporting the final plan. Information will be put on Oaky Folk and on the Parish Council website.

I think that an organised approach at a local level would be preferable to action by individual families. Please feel free to contact me if you wish to be involved.

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#### From our District Councillors

Northstowe Phase 3A and 3B Outline Planning

Plans for Northstowe Phase 3A (the phase nearest to Oakington) including 4,000 new homes, two primary schools, green spaces, sports pitches, shops, and employment areas were approved by South Cambridgeshire District Council's (SCDC) Planning Committee.

As District Councillors we raised objections to the application and we are pleased that we were able to secure conditions as part of the planning approval, including restrictions and monitoring of construction working hours, noise and dust, and ongoing monitoring of groundwater on site. As a condition, a reduction in building heights to two storeys on part of the Oakington edge was also agreed. We were disappointed that we were not able to secure any conditions on the routeing of the Southern Access Road East away from the village.

The Phase 3B planning application was also approved at another special planning meeting at the end of February. Phase 3B includes 1,000 homes.

Northstowe 3A will include 1,600 new affordable homes in a mixture of affordable rent, shared ownership, discounted market sale and rent to buy. 400 homes will be affordable in Phase 3B.

A series of more detailed planning applications will follow for each parcel of land in Phase 3, which will agree the details of what the homes and facilities will look like.

#### **Civil Parking Enforcement**

Introducing civil parking enforcement in South Cambridgeshire will see responsibilities for illegal parking shift from Cambridgeshire Police to Cambridgeshire County Council. This will mean drivers parking illegally could be issued a penalty charge by Civil Enforcement Officers.

#### Help for Refugees from Ukraine

We know that residents and the Parish are already offering to provide support for those forced to flee through the refugee sponsorship scheme. We have set up a Facebook group -Homes for Ukraine Longstanton, Oakington and Westwick and Northstowe – to connect people involved in this response and to provide up to date information on sources of support: www.facebook.com/groups/949660319048515

SCDC has also committed to support people from Ukraine seeking refuge.

#### From our County Councillor

#### Highways

The following works should have been completed by the end of March in Oakington: Dropped kerb in Orchard Way; footway slurry sealing on Church View; repairs to vehicle strike damaged masonry parapet wall and repointing of parapet, Dry Drayton Road; tree works on Cambridge Road; road surfacing - plane out and relay on Queens Way, Meadow Farm Close and Coles Lane. This budget was put through from certain pockets of funds for unclassified roads.

**Preschool Building** next to Oakington Primary School The expression of interest in running the Early Years (EY) provision from this building went live on the Council's portal on Monday 28 Feb and will be open until 28 March 2022. It is CCC's obligation to deliver local EY services, therefore we must by law follow this procedure. Link to advert: *tinyurl.com/yckr4954* 

Providers need to create an account on the website in order to express an interest in the advert and see the document. The CCC team will take the decision as to whether or not to formally tender for a new EY provider. If we do tender then, realistically, we would not have a new provider in place before September .

In the meanwhile, we are leasing the building to Oakington Primary School to use the space to run SEND interventions, support groups, music lessons, as well as breakfast and afterschool clubs and generally have more space to run meetings. If the decision is not to re-tender, the Council would liaise with the school regarding the site's future use. Once we know who will occupy the space from September, discussions can take place on how other community groups could access the building in the evenings.

#### **Covid-19 Vaccinations**

The roll out of vaccinations for 5 to 11 year olds began in March. Advice at this point is that children will be vaccinated in pharmacies and mass vaccination centres rather than in primary schools. Mobile vaccination centres are still in operation – see the schedule at *www.thevaccinators.co.uk* 

#### Holiday Activities and Food in Cambridgeshire

The HAF programme offers free holiday scheme places or family experiences to primary and secondary school aged children and young people eligible for free school meals. During the Easter holidays, eligible children and young people may access up to 16 hours for free at a holiday scheme or family experience. The sessions will include a meal, a variety of exciting activities, sports and the opportunity for your child to socialise with others. More here: *tinyurl.com/2p8cjyxc* 

#### Household Recycling Centre

Booking requirements for all vehicles have been removed and the number of vehicles allowed on all sites is being increased to pre-Covid levels.

#### **Climate Change Strategy**

An action plan setting out how and by when the council (2030) and the whole of Cambridgeshire (2045) will reach net zero has been approved by the Full Council.

It outlines how the council will deliver on its commitments to reach net zero, including the need for the council and others to

engage, support and collaborate with communities, partners and businesses to make positive changes themselves. More here: *tinyurl.com/ad6we8v6*

# **Community Action Groups**

#### **Transport Action Group**

TAG and the Parish Council (PC) have been working together on a number of projects aimed at improving various aspects of transport within the villages.

**Traffic Calming.** The PC applied for funding from the A14 Legacy Fund and have been awarded a grant to improve the traffic calming on major roads into and out of the Parish. Essentially this was to replace existing concrete humps with

rubber ones which will result in quieter traffic.

In addition, there will be more room for cyclists to pass. Ideally, we would have liked to have seen more work, e.g. on the flat tables, but the grant would not cover that. The good news is that the plans have been approved and work is due to start in mid-April.



#### Speed Limit. TAG and the PC applied for a

Local Highways Initiative (LHI) whereby the speed limit within the villages would be reduced to 20mph throughout as we see in other villages such as Girton. This would be a major step towards greater safety for all road users. The news we have back from County Highways is encouraging and we

expect a decision within the coming weeks with implementation later in the year. The PC have supplied the financial support necessary for the application to be considered.



#### **Environment Action Group**

Our **Flood Mitigation Group** continues to work alongside the Parish Council to push for flood attenuation measures. Outline planning permission for Phase 3A at Northstowe has now been granted but it is understood that no further financial contributions to the promised attenuation pond were included in the planning conditions. A meeting is planned by the Parish Council in mid-May involving the District and County

Councillors, representatives of the Environment Agency and Homes England, and the Drainage Manager at CCC (the Lead Local Flood Authority) to discuss how the section 106 money from Phase 2 that was set aside for flood mitigation will be used.

Spring has arrived, and the daffodils and other flowers in our **village flower tubs** have been looking good. We are considering if these flowers can be left in place beyond May, when in previous years they have been replaced. The daffodils will need to be left for six weeks before being cut off. We plan to make a decision in May based on how they look. Once again, we are very grateful to the volunteers who have been looking after the tubs.

EAG volunteers joined with OWN on 19<sup>th</sup> March for a **village litter pick**. South Cambridgeshire District Council loaned litter grabbers, gloves and bags, and 20 sacks of rubbish were collected. We thank everyone who took part.

After months of negotiation and lobbying the **Open Spaces** project to develop the recreation ground has at last got planning permission, albeit with some onerous, but satisfiable conditions about ecology, traffic and lighting. This permission enabled submission of the application for funding from FCC (was WREN) for about £80,000. If it is successful, it should be possible to start the work by the end of July. **Southern Access Road East (SARE)**. Back in 2007, in the early days of planning for Northstowe, an access road was envisaged which would lead from the A1307 roundabout into Northstowe. Homes England have flatly refused to agree to this and instead plan to join Dry Drayton Road just south of the Business Park despite all of our councillors supporting the original plan. Our contention is that this will only exacerbate traffic problems at the Crossroads, and forecast traffic statistics confirm this. SARE has not yet been confirmed but our information is that it is very likely to go ahead. This

serves to illustrate that Homes England's only aim is to deliver housing irrespective of the detrimental effect on neighbouring villages.

**Construction Traffic**. Our SCDC councillors were successful in stopping construction traffic from the Cottenham Grove development coming through the villages. We now have a new problem

arising from the latest development in Cottenham, the Kings Park estate on Rampton Road, where work is due to start this year. The PC was not consulted by SCDC when the outline plan was published. As a result, construction traffic is not banned. TAG and the PC together with our district councillors are taking this up direct with the developers, Tilia Homes.

We continue to work on the issue of the green duckweed and water meal on the **village pond**. We dragged off most of the green covering on 21st March, along with several books, bottles and other





items of rubbish that

and water meal both contain high amounts (up to 40% dry weight) of protein as well as other nutrients, and have been identified as a promising source of sustainable plant protein for human food. Indeed, water meal is commonly consumed as a vegetable by humans in some parts of the world. However, we decided that we lacked the culinary skills required to turn the duckweed that we pulled out of the pond into a tasty soup (besides concerns about the cleanliness of the pond water) so plan to compost it instead.

#### Sustainable Oakington & Westwick

If you're worried about the environment, you're not alone. Eighteen people came along to the first meeting of Sustainable Oakington & Westwick in January, and it was an inspiring and moving experience to hear each person explain why. Some spoke



of their love for nature and their distress at the loss of biodiversity. Others were especially concerned about climate change, waste or food security. Many were parents trying to help their children feel optimistic for the future. Everyone wanted to do something. Ideas for the group came thick and fast.

The second meeting saw fresh faces and a talk by David Reeves about water supply in our area. Much of it comes from chalk streams, a unique and rare habitat – there are only about 225 in the world – being destroyed by overexploitation. An Amazon on our doorsteps. The only sustainable solution is to reduce demand from the current 140 litres per person a day.

SOW plans to organise its activities through subgroups: nature & biodiversity, climate crisis, transport, food & growing, waste & recycling, water. We hope to put on a monthly talk or workshop as well. With CONNECT 2 we are running a plant exchange in May (see page 11) to help us reduce our carbon footprints by growing our own food. Our March meeting focuses on Wildlife Gardening.

SOW activities are open to anyone. Meetings are at the church hall on the last Wednesday in the month, 7:30pm.

#### Which Council Does What?

The organisational structure of Cambridgeshire is complex, but if you have a problem or concern, the parish clerk or a councillor will point you in the right direction.

#### **County Council**

Responsibilities: Education, Transport, Highways, Heritage, Social care, Libraries, Trading standards, Waste management, Maintaining their estate.

Some of these services are shared between Peterborough City Council and Cambridgeshire County Council but any concerns should be directed to the County Council.

#### **District Council**

Responsibilities: Council tax payments and benefits, Household bin collections, Housing and housing benefits, Council leisure facilities, Environmental health, Residential planning.

#### Parish/ Town Council

Responsibilities: Looking after community buildings, Allotments, Play Areas, Bus shelters and many more depending on council.

Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP)

'The local delivery body for a City Deal with central Government worth up to £500 million over 15 years, to vital improvements in infrastructure (decarbonising transport), supporting and accelerating the creation of 44,000 new jobs, 33,500 new homes and 420 additional apprenticeships.'

Partnership between Cambridge City Council, Cambridgeshire County Council, South Cambridgeshire District Council, University of Cambridge.

The Combined Authority, Cambridge and Peterborough, our elected Mayor

'A combined authority (CA) is a legal body set up using national legislation that enables a group of two or more councils to collaborate and take collective decisions across council boundaries.'

What our Mayor does: Business support, skills, housing, transport, environment, international, digital connectivity, resilience, research, and strategy, new homes.

Police and Crime Commissioner, Cambridge, and Peterborough

To support and challenge the Chief Constable to provide effective and efficient policing services for the area.

Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Fire Authority

The Fire Authority is the governing body responsible for delivering a fire and rescue service to Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. It is made up of Cambridgeshire County Councillors and Peterborough City Councillors.

# Nature Notes & OCOP

#### Flowers and Fence Holes Needed

Spring is when a young man's fancy turns to thoughts of.... love.



Did you know a male **moth** can pick up the pheromones (scent) of a female moth seven miles away? The antennae of males are feathered so there's a greater surface area for smelling. Did you know there are 250 species of moth in the UK and over 160,000 on the planet, which puts the 18,500 known butterfly species in the shade?

If you want to boost moths and butterflies in your garden, you can replace bedding plants with

wild flowers, cosmos, sunflowers (annuals) and perennials like sea holly, hardy geraniums, lavender and sedum. Weeds like dandelions are invaluable sources of nectar for both butterflies and moths, so it's great to have a bit of unmown lawn.

Tree species which attract lepidoptera include willow, crab apple, hazel, birch and of course the butterfly bush (buddleia). As you know, most moths fly at night but a few are around in the day and usually have bright colours. They include burnet moths (black and red with red spots), garden tiger (brown and white), and cinnabar (black and red) whose caterpillars wear vellow and black striped rugby shirts and are specific to ragwort. Some moths fire a poisonous spray at predators like bats and birds and this mechanism gives them the confidence to fly slowly; others depend on speed to escape predation.

Moth and butterfly numbers are declining in the UK but not as dramatically as hedgehogs. The State of British Hedgehogs Report 2022 has just reported on a long historic decline. Oddly enough, urban hedgehog numbers are beginning to stabilize but a rural decline continues, especially in our region, the East of England. 'Industrial' farming is blamed, including lost habitat and pesticides.

Very few hedgehogs have been spotted in Oakington recently, so if you are keen to encourage them in your own garden you can connect your garden to neighbours' by cutting a hole (13cm x 13 cm) in your fence. (Best to talk to your neighbour first). This suggestion recognizes that these nocturnal

mammals can travel over one mile at night. They also benefit from wild corners where they can search for insects and slugs and snails. Ponds are safer if you have a shallow ramp to allow an escape route, because they can swim, but cannot get up steep sides.



They can easily get entangled by netting and litter and they suffer from pesticides, especially slug killers which both rob them of food and kill them. It's great to build homes for them out of wooden boxes or log piles, but their love of wood piles makes them vulnerable to bonfires. It's best to build and burn your fire immediately, so they don't creep into it while it's unlit. It's easier than combing through it before lighting your pile of wood.

Although they are capable of finding insects and slugs in a wild garden, supplementary feeding helps and the choice is between dog or cat food. Additionally, putting out a shallow bowl of water can be vital in the summer.

## **Oakington Community Orchards Project**



The Recreation Ground Community Orchard was planted by volunteers between 2012 and 14, to create an attractive resource for the village. The trees are mainly local heritage varieties, selected from the East of England Apples and Orchards Project Tree Catalogue.

In 2022 the Parish Council agreed

a revised maintenance plan for the orchard. The "west" side, adjacent to the cemetery, will be mowed regularly throughout the summer. This will provide shady picnic spots for family use. While the "east" side, adjacent to the brook, will be allowed to grow "naturally", with minimal management, to encourage a wider range of wild flowers and insects

The trees carry labels which indicate the type, variety and when the fruit is normally ripe.

As this is an asset shared for the whole community, we would ask you only to pick fruit for your own personal use.

# **Climate Crisis & Charities**

## What you're doing to fight climate change

SOW has surveyed residents to discover what people are doing to live sustainably. Most people who responded are aware of the issues and trying to reduce their carbon footprint. The full results can be found on *sustainableow.co.uk.* along with links to later surveys, but here are some highlights!

**Food.** 82% of respondents avoid food waste "a lot". Only 18% eat meat every day, and half of them plan to eat less. 33% eat meat no more often than once a week and 12% are



vegan. Diet affects our carbon footprint because a quarter of global greenhouse gas emissions come from food, and of that, 58% is from animal products.

**Waste & Recycling.** Everyone who answered uses their own shopping bags, and the great majority use a reusable water bottle (93%), avoid single-use plastics (72%), donate



to charity shops (86%) and buy second-hand (69%). Most people avoid unnecessary purchases by buying things that will last (83%) and repairing things (79%). Many of us would like to avoid packaging by using refills (52%), share tools (41%) and have a shopping-free month (34%).

Recycling helps to tackle climate change because it uses less energy than making new products, and because landfilled waste releases greenhouse gases into the atmosphere.

## **Local History**

# **Oakington Isolation Hospital**

In the first half of the 20th century, and many years before that, a number of infectious diseases (including polio, tuberculosis and smallpox) caused frequent epidemics throughout the United Kingdom. There were not vaccines for many of these illnesses and those vaccines that did exist were not widely distributed. As there was no NHS it fell to the local authorities to control these outbreaks. Many local authorities built separate isolation hospitals to house infected patients away from their general public hospital.

Whilst working on another project I discovered that an isolation hospital was built in Oakington.

At the start of the 1900s the local authority for Oakington was Chesterton Urban District Council (CUDC), who in 1905 opened the Chesterton Infectious Diseases Hospital (Oakington). The original source at the National Archives

says it was built at Midfield, Girton Road, Oakington. The 1947 Ordnance Survey map shows it on the site now occupied by Midfield Lodge Care Home.

The isolation hospital has also sometimes been referred to as the County Isolation Hospital or the Oakington Smallpox Hospital. For much of its career the hospital specialised in handling local outbreaks of scarlet fever and diphtheria.

Local historian Mike Petty has assembled an Oakington Scrapbook with summaries of many newspaper clippings; several mention the Oakington hospital. In 1909 there was a big outbreak of diphtheria in Stapleford. An old school was being used as a temporary isolation hospital for which Oakington hospital provided bedding. In May 1910 the Council reported there were 68 cases of scarlet fever across Chesterton in the previous year. Of these cases 50 were transferred to the Oakington hospital.



By the 1930s the fortunes of the hospital seem to have taken a downturn. A 1930 entry in the Scrapbook reports that there were only 7 patients and that both the matron and the porter had retired because of ill health. A later entry, in 1936, reports of plans by the CUDC to expand the hospital and notes that this will disrupt the County Council's plan to use it for smallpox cases. However, in 1938 there is an announcement that the hospital will close.

In 1941 the hospital was sold to the County Council for use as a smallpox hospital. It appears to have been little used.

> There is a 1947 entry in the Scrapbook which states emergency arrangements were being made for smallpox cases until the Oakington Smallpox Hospital could be opened. The Royal Society of Medicine review of the 1947 smallpox outbreak records only 79 cases across England and Wales. The review notes in 1935 there were no cases and there were

very few cases in the years between 1935 and 1947.

It is not clear if the Hospital came back into use in 1947, but was probably out of use by mid-1948. There are mentions in the minutes of the Oakington Memorial Hall Committee in July 1948, when they discussed whether isolation huts being disposed of from the hospital would be available to them, and in October 1948 stating that no suitable huts would be available.

Oakington Isolation Hospital appears might not actually have been in Oakington when operational! In 1953 there were amendments to the parish boundaries with Oakington Parish gaining land in Cambridge Road including the site of the Isolation Hospital. Later the site was used to house children in care and more recently for the Midfield Lodge Care Home. I would like to extend my thanks to Julie Grove for help with sources for this article.
