You know when you have that awful feeling ... the borders are overgrowing with weeds, it's now the time to plant that stuff you like or take out the stuff that's ready... But you are just too busy and can't get to it... imagine... someone else just walks in and does it for you! It's great!

So I have deadlines at work but because I have to walk Danny (the dog) most days I usually spend 30 mins on the 'lotty letting him free. He loves just sniffing about,

so I'm happy to use the cut-throatploughboy for 30 minutes and that way it's easy to keep the weeds at bay on a good sized plot. I'm not good at the non-routine stuff, planting at the right time, remembering to net etc etc ... Enter Jacqueline:

plants squash (they store for as many as 6 months when grown!), tomatoes, sweetcorn, cucumbers, beans, marigolds (!) Enter Alice: plants Brussels sprouts, garlic. Enter Mina: leeks, broad beans ... I do the potatoes and the onions every year (routine!) Whatever survives the rabbits, droughts and various unknown pests and stealers, we share: golden squash appear on my doorstep as do stems full of Brussels like a happy jester's sceptre, and I take pride in leaving Duke of York and Pink Fir on doorsteps in return. But it doesn't end there... way downstream, jars of blackberry jam (Alice makes the best blackberry jam in the world), lemon curd and relish made from 'lotty crop also appear, and occasionally a pumpkin pie with decorated pastry leaves around the edge. #### From our Parish Council Chair

#### **New Councillor**

It was a real pleasure to welcome a new Councillor, Matthew Davidson, to our January meeting. Matt is in his twenties, so brings the views of younger people to our meetings. Matt also lives in Westwick so now the views of Westwick residents can be adequately represented.

#### **Playgroup Building**

Each time I cycle along Water Lane and pass the former Playgroup building, I feel rather sad that it is no longer being used by the community. Firouz Thompson, our County Councillor, has been told by the County Council, who now own the building, that they are "preparing a soft market test to gauge the level of interest that exists in the building as a potential Early Years setting."

Regrettably it does not look like the idea we proposed of using it as a youth and community centre will be happening.

#### Playground

I would like to re-iterate my thanks to Cllr David Reeves for cleaning the climbing frames and slides on the Recreation Ground. What a fantastic playground we have! My admiration grows for the working group who created the facility. But perhaps it is now time to consider adding new features to the playground? If you have any suggestions, then please email me.

#### Publicity

A large part of the village seems to be unaware of the activities of the Parish Council and how we respond – often behind the scenes – to daily happenings in the village. We have been cautious about going onto the Oaky Folk facebook site, but we will have to be more proactive in using this to show that we really are doing things between our monthly meetings!

#### **Airfield Road**

Despite the closure of the Airfield Road, a number of motorcyclists have continued to use it, with reports of near misses of pedestrians. The Parish Council have raised this matter with the relevant authorities and are pursuing new signing making it very clear that the road is not open to any motorised traffic. The road has become a favourite walk for villagers and the sooner the situation is sorted the better. I have also raised the condition of the road with Homes England, asking them when/if they have plans to make a good quality walking route and cycle track.

#### Traffic

We are continuing our battle to get traffic calming on Cambridge Road, Water Lane, Station Road and in Westwick. Both the Parish Council and the County Council Highways Department have now agreed that we need to proceed urgently. Related to this, a decision on our request for a blanket 20 mph speed limit in the village is imminent.

#### Flooding

Firouz Tompson, County Councillor, arranged a meeting for us to express our frustration at lack of progress on a flood attenuation project for the village. We are now trying to get all relevant authorities, including the Environment Agency, the County Council and Homes England, to explain to us why nothing has yet been achieved.

Now, what good news to finish on? Well, a developer at Northstowe had proposed erecting a couple of large billboards in the field immediately adjacent to the guided busway stop. They would have been a potential eyesore, but after the District Councillors and Parish Council objected, planning permission was refused.

#### From our District Councillors

W e hope that everyone is healthy and safe as we start 2022. As we go into the New Year, Covid restrictions remain in place and infection rates locally are still high, so we encourage everyone to remain vigilant.

#### Northstowe Phase 3A Planning Committee

The meeting that will examine the outline planning application for Northstowe Phase 3A (the part of the development adjacent to Oakington) has unfortunately been postponed on several occasions. At the time of writing this is scheduled to take place at the end of January. All residents who submitted comments on the application should receive an invitation to attend and to speak at the meeting. As District Councillors we will be making objections to the application at committee. We hope to report on the outcome of this in the next edition of the Journal.

#### Northstowe Developments

At time of writing, final work to join the new Southern Access Road West to the B1050 at the Bar Hill junction on the A14 is progressing. This will provide direct access into Northstowe or onward to Longstanton via a new roundabout.

Our previous Northstowe community development officer recently left his role, and we now have two new officers, Mihaela Stan, who will focus on Phase 1 and Kathryn Beck, who will focus on Phase 2. Homes England also now have a Community Development team in place as we welcome the

#### **Gully Maintenance**

We have to date cleaned 50k+ gullies out of some 100k. We have already cleaned Oakington gullies and provided a detailed report with maps and photos to the Parish Council. *Summary*: out of 400 gullies in Oakington, 86.4% of them drained normally when recharged with water; 68.7% required cleaning; 2.7% were inaccessible due to vehicles over them; and 1.8% had broken lids so unable to open them. Please keep on reporting any problems on our ReportIt system. Westwick gully maintenance is planned Jan–March 2022.

#### **Quarterly Highways Meeting**

The next meeting will be held 4 Feb with a County Highway Officer and Parish Clerks from Oakington & Westwick and nearby parishes. Please keep reporting highways issues at: *highwaysreporting.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/* 

#### **Household Support Fund**

A reminder that the County Council's Household Support Fund is open till 31 March. It offers:

a) Support with food, household energy and other essentials for individuals and families: residents are eligible to access this support if they earn less than  $\pounds 17,940$  per year, or are in receipt of certain state benefits

b) Direct food vouchers: supermarket vouchers will be issued to families meeting the low-income criteria for free school meals, funded childcare for two-year-olds, early years pupil premium, or sixth form students eligible for free school meals. For further details: *tinyurl.com/2p97n384* 

first residents to Inholm, the first development on Phase 2. We hope to see these teams working more closely with the existing communities and Parish Councils, as Northstowe grows.

The waterpark in Phase 2, around the education campus, should be opening soon – parts of this waterpark will be available for water sports and open water swimming.

#### Bins and recycling

We thank residents for their patience while the green bin service was suspended over the holiday period. Collections have now been reinstated.

We would like to remind residents that additional blue recycling bins can be provided free of charge to residents who need additional recycling capacity. South Cambs accepts a huge range of materials for recycling, including plastic carrier bags, cling film and other types of plastic. For details, please go to www.scambs.gov.uk/recycling-and-bins/.

Tesco Bar Hill also has facilities for recycling crisp packets, pet food pouches and other soft plastics, as well as clothing and textile recycling.

#### **Climate Change**

The gully maintenance mentioned above is part of a very broad range of activities we are planning to tackle Climate Change. Further action will be taken to protect homes from flooding caused by excess surface water and high levels of rainfall. We have committed to invest more money to support residents who live in areas which are at risk. See *tinyurl.com/32ey577p*

As a low-lying area, flood risk and rising sea levels are real future risks for the county's communities. The Climate Change and Environment Strategy - *tinyurl.com/4j5uk5mm* - will go to the Full Council in February. It sets a new target for a Net Zero Cambridgeshire - 2045, instead of the current 2050 target.

#### **Environment Action Group**

#### **Flood mitigation**

The saga of the promised attenuation ponds on Oakington Brook continues, closely followed by our Flood Mitigation Group (FMG). The excuse given by Homes England (Northstowe developers) for not yet undertaking any work

on the ponds has been that they have not received modelling from the Environment Agency on the effect of the A14 works on water flow. The Flood Risk Business Manager at Cambridgeshire County Council met with the Environment Agency on 20th December to request an update on the timescale for this, and the latest information we have is that the necessary modelling information has now been sent to Homes England. The

Parish Council, with support from the FMG, are now seeking confirmation from the Environment Agency that there is no reason why Homes England cannot now carry out their design work.

Land availability and its cost also remains an issue. It is understood that no additional Section 106 money will be available for flood attenuation beyond that already in the Phase 2 plans; this would likely cover the construction of a reasonably sized reservoir but not if the cost of the land is to be included. Homes England are still reluctant to tell us what they intend to do with the two fields they bought in 2019, some of which could be a suitable reservoir site. Our District and County Councillors continue to pursue these issues with Homes England at their regular meetings.

#### **Transport Action Group**

East West Rail a second public consultation, which many local people responded to, on the route of the new railway between Bedford and Cambridge. EWR have said they will release the results of the consultation winter 2021/22.

EWR plan to hold a third, statutory, consultation about the final route, expected to happen around summer 2022. The government has been reviewing their planned expenditure on major projects to see if Covid-19 has changed the financial viability of these. It is not clear if EWR will be affected or if there will be a delay. If the scheme goes ahead the statutory consultation will be the last major opportunity to influence EWR before they apply for a Development Order for the Bedford to Cambridge section.

EWR have comprehensively discounted any route approaching Cambridge from the north, providing reasons and evidence in their consultation documents. However there are vocal groups around the southern approach route who are pushing for the scheme to be modified with a northern approach that comes through the middle of Oakington. Therefore, we need to have evidence and



#### The Open Spaces project

Progress continues to be slow, with the Environment Agency objecting to the originally proposed play area mound on the basis that it could affect flooding. This is despite the fact that analysis by Prior Associates (consultant engineers) has confirmed that the effect would be negligible. In order to get planning permission, it is now planned to proceed without

the mound and instead to add a group of trees for climbing instead. If it is possible to secure the necessary permission and quotations in time for the next funding application deadline, work could begin in June of this year.

#### **Drains and gullies**

We have been encouraged by the recent drain clearances in the village by Cambridgeshire County Council, who have also sent us a detailed report of all

the drains and in-kerb gullies. We have identified 27 of these that we believe to be most critical in preventing the formation of large puddles in wet weather, and have sent this list to our County Councillor Firouz Thompson. We are grateful for Cllr Thompson's responsiveness on this issue.

#### Footway sweeping

A small group of volunteers carried out leaf sweeping at the start of December, but we were not able to clear as many footways as usual due to a reduced number of helpers being available. We urgently need more volunteers in order to keep our village's footways tidy and safe for users, so if you could spare an occasional hour please contact James on jamesyoud51@icloud.com.

arguments prepared for the statutory consultation in case the northern route through Oakington is part of it. The route accepted in the consultation will be final and proposed to the government to build.

**Motorcycles on Airfield Road** Despite there being new signs showing that the central section of the Airfield Road is closed to all motor vehicles (except emergency vehicles and tractors) there are a number of reports of motorcycles continuing to pass, sometimes at high speed, through the closed section. As well as being illegal, it can be a danger to legitimate users such as walkers, cyclists and horse riders. Width restriction gates are being installed along the route but whilst these will stop cars and vans entering they have to be wide enough to allow horses, cargo bikes and pushchairs to pass. This also means that they are wide enough to be passed by motorcycles. This was discussed at the last Parish Council Meeting and is being referred to the police.

#### Changes to the Citi 6 and Citi 5 bus services

Stagecoach Cambridge announced that they are combining Citi 5 and Citi 6 bus services due the continuing effects of the pandemic. The main bus coming into the village will be the Citi 5. See page 15 for more information.

#### **Bus Changes and Price Reductions**

The route number and times of the main half-hourly bus through Oakington have changed. All but two journeys a day are now run as Citi 5, which goes on to Bar Hill after Oakington, giving residents here a direct service to Bar Hill.

Good news for everyone who pays for their tickets – the price has reduced! A Day Rider has reduced from £4.50 to £4.20. If you buy a "Flexi10" bundle of tickets (which can be used any time in 12 months) using their mobile app, the cost per Day Rider ticket is £2.94! Under 19s and students pay less – £2.80 for a walk-on Day Rider, but only £1.96 a day in a Flexi10 bundle.

There are also reduced prices for families and groups of adults travelling together (five people for the price of two.) The Flexi5 and Flexi10 mobile tickets are valid all along the busway, right up to St Ives, unlike ordinary Day Riders. *Jenny Prince*  **Community Association**

Have you checked or changed your passwords recently? Weak passwords can be hacked in seconds. Three random words is the



recommended way of generating passwords, as it is easier to remember and takes trillions of years for a computer algorithm to crack.

Start with your most important accounts (such as email, then banking and social media) and replace your old passwords with new ones.

The Police Digital Security Centre (PDSC) recommend looking around the room and picking three things you see, for example table, computer, map would become tablecomputermap – *do not* use words that are associated with you, for example animal names or surnames, as these are easy to identify if you are someone who uses social media.

Wise advice from the national Neighbourhood Watch website. But we all have tables, lamps, chairs, so choose the random words more extravagantly.

Some accounts require more than just three words to increase the strength of the password. Some browsers can choose a password, and remember it for the next time you need it.

#### **Richard and Sally Barker**



here was a time, only a generation or so ago, when the smell of freshly baked bread would permeate the air on the children's way to school. And on their return journey, a tray of leftover day cakes would be theirs for the taking. The bakery stood on the corner of High Street and

Coles Lane and belonged to the Barker family.

Richard was born at 1 Station Road to George and Joan Barker in 1946 while George was away in Italy with the army. From there George sent a welcome telegram to his son "Roger", Joan having changed his name from that agreed! His parents bought and moved into the Bakery when Richard was three years old.

Richard (Dick) attended the village school, which in the 50s consisted of only two rooms and two classes. The head, Mrs Carnel, was very strict but well respected because her pupils achieved good grades.



As a youngster Richard would accompany his father on delivery rounds on an old three-wheeler bike with a basket at the front - this was later donated to Snowy Farr. He was a choirboy and in the Boys' Brigade, also playing football and cricket (in Histon).

Another hobby was to dredge old bits of bike from the engine yard pond – now the school playing fields – and do them up at the Bakery granary.

He got half a crown pocket money which he spent on chocolate – never sweets – and his favourite singer was Elvis Presley. Holidays were spent with his uncle Tom and aunt Edna in Sheffield, his parents taking him one Sunday and picking him up the next.



During his school days at Impington Village College, sport was his main interest, but he worked from an early age alongside his parents and decided the bakery was where he wanted to be.

Richard and Sally had known of each other earlier, but met again when Sally returned to Histon after working in Oxford for a few years, and they married in 1973. After their daughters, Liz and Suzie, were born, Sally threw herself into village life. She was heavily involved with the Humpty Dumpty play school, the Parent/Teacher Association, Amateur Dramatics and the Panto group. She helped with a Youth Group which met in the Methodist Chapel in the 80s and for an impressive 13 years volunteered with the Student Support Centre in Cambridgeshire for children with special needs.

For a night out they would frequent the New Inn at Westwick. This was a popular meeting place and much missed when it closed in 1989.

About 20 years ago the bakery business moved to Cottenham, having outgrown its premises in Oakington. Gone was not only the scent of baking, but also the social element around the shop. And many a teenager had had their first Saturday job there.

Richard and Sally still live in the village. The business now is run by Liz's husband Michael who is the director responsible for the bakery and Suzie who is the director responsible for the shops and outside catering. Richard still has a hand in the business, but he and Sally have time for more leisurely pursuits like golf, reading and meeting up with friends. Above all, they delight in their six grandchildren who all live locally.

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#### 2021: A Year of Extremes

It's been a funny old year. What's going on?

A dragonfly was spotted in Oakington in December. The warm damp autumn produced lots of fungi, and the warmer, wetter winters are speeding up the advance of ash dieback. Because of the extreme weather events caused by the Climate Emergency, some UK wildlife is suffering a great deal. This may explain the links between extreme climate and biodiversity loss at the recent COP 26 in Glasgow.

Butterfly numbers were well down this summer, mainly because of the cool spring. In fact, the Butterfly Conservation's Big Butterfly Count recorded the lowest figures since the count began 12 years ago. Small tortoiseshell and peacock numbers were heavily reduced. Many birds also suffered from the cool, wet spring weather and chick numbers were well down.

However, some parts of the planet experienced heat waves. Over 400 weather stations experienced their highest temperature ever in 2021. You may have read that Death Valley reached 54.4°C in July, the highest reliably recorded temperature ever on the Earth's surface. If you've ever wondered why it's called 'Death Valley', you can now stop wondering. This seriously challenges the claim 'there's no bad weather; only inappropriate clothing.'



The heatwaves in the west of the US caused wildfires and massive loss of wildlife. There were also heatwaves in Siberia and Alaska. Greece became the hottest part of Europe where wildfires also killed local wildlife in July and August. Ironically, Texas experienced a big freeze in February that killed over 300 people.

All this mayhem points to extreme weather events anywhere, at any time, and many wildlife species are reacting by moving towards areas more in line with temperature ranges they are used to. More than a quarter of the UK's butterfly species are moving north. The RSPB have concerns that dry weather is reducing water levels and mud for inland wading birds, at the same time as being worried about habitat destruction caused by flooding. They and other conservation charities are leading the way with wetland and woodland restoration aimed at mitigating climate change. To quote Ben McCarthy, Head of Nature Conservation and Restoration Ecology at the National Trust, 'Climate Change is making some forms of extreme weather events the new normal.'

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## The Early Days of RAF Oakington and 218 Squadron

The year 2020 saw the 75th anniversaries of VE Day, marking the end of the Second World War in Europe, and VJ Day, marking the end of the Second World War against Japan. Unfortunately the Covid-19 pandemic restricted events to mark these. Also 2020 saw the 80th anniversaries

of the Dunkirk evacuation and of the Battle of Britain. Locally there was also an important 80th anniversary – the opening of RAF Oakington.

Oakington was one of a number of new airfields commissioned by the government in the late 1930s in the build up before the Second World War. RAF Oakington had the advantage of being

adjacent to the Cambridge to St Ives railway with stations and sidings at Oakington and

Longstanton. These would make re-supply easier. The village mill, originally wind powered but later run by a petrol/diesel engine, was near the edge of the new airfield and was demolished to prevent aircraft crashing into it. RAF Oakington became operational on 1st July 1940 and saw the arrival of 218 Squadron by the middle of the month.

218 Squadron had originally been formed as a light bomber squadron towards the end of the First World War. With the cessation of those hostilities the squadron was disbanded.

In 1936, with the growing threat of war again in Europe, 218 Squadron was reformed as a light bomber force. Initially they were equipped with Hawker Hart biplanes. From January 1938 they re-equipped with Fairey Battle aircraft, a more modern single engine light bomber monoplane with a crew of three. However, the Battle was widely considered as under powered and was lightly armed for its own defence.

On 2<sup>nd</sup> September 1939, the day before war was declared with Germany, 218 Squadron was relocated to France. In the remainder of 1939 and the early months of 1940 there was little confrontation with the Germans who concentrated their effort on the Eastern Front. That radically changed with the German invasion of France which began on 10<sup>th</sup> May 1940.

A number of Fairey Battle equipped squadrons, including 218 Squadron, were deployed on low level bombing missions to slow the advance of the German army. The International Bomber Command Centre (IBCC) database shows that between 10<sup>th</sup> May and 14<sup>th</sup> May 218 Squadron lost 15 aircrew and had nine aircraft either severely damaged or lost completely. A further 13 men were captured and became prisoners of war. (This compares with seven aircrew and three aircraft lost over the previous eight months they had been in France.)





By the end of May they had no serviceable aircraft. The BBC History website states that on 30<sup>th</sup> May 1940 the remains of 218 Squadron were evacuated through Cherbourg as part of the Dunkirk evacuation. They regrouped at RAF Mildenhall in Suffolk, where they received and retrained on Bristol Blenheim aircraft. The Blenheim was a twin engine, slightly faster aircraft. More importantly it was better armed to protect itself and had

better armour around the cockpit and the fuel tanks.

On 14<sup>th</sup> July 1940 they relocated to the new airfield at RAF Oakington. After a few more days training 218 Squadron started operations. Their mission was to carry out low level bombing raids against German troops and barges amassing at the French coast ready to invade Britain. The contribution of bomber

command to the wider Battle of Britain in August and September 1940 is often overshadowed by the battle for air superiority over Britain.

On Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> September 1940 a German Junkers JU-88 bomber was forced to land at RAF Oakington after suffering engine

failure after being attacked by Hawker Hurricanes of 17 Squadron. Some reports say that the plane crashed but it is possible the crew had tried to destroy it. It was the first complete JU88 the British obtained and was soon taken away for technical examination. The crew survived and were taken into custody.

October 1940 saw the start of the arrival at Oakington of 7 Squadron, the first squadron equipped with the new Sterling heavy bomber. In early November 1940 they were joined at Oakington by the Spitfires of Number 3 Photo Reconnaissance unit. In November 1940 218 Squadron started to re-equip with Wellington heavy bombers and on 25<sup>th</sup> November moved out of Oakington to make extra space for 7 Squadron.

When it opened RAF Oakington used a grass runway but the soft ground was soon found to be unsuitable and rapidly deteriorated when the heavier planes, Wellingtons and Sterlings, arrived. Early in 1941 work started on building concrete runways at Oakington.

After their short relationship both 218 Squadron and RAF Oakington continued to serve the country for many more years and achieve further great things. This article has relied on information from a wide range of sources not all of which could be mentioned due to limitation of space, but I am happy to share this information with anybody wishing to follow these up.
