From our Parish Council Chair

As a local authority body, the Parish Councillors completed their four years in office on 5 May when elections took place, and the 'new' Parish Council was formed at our meeting on 9 May. We welcomed a new councillor, Will Bailey - our second councillor from Westwick. The Councillors elected me as Chair for another year and Tony Starling as Vice-Chair. Please see the side panel for the full list of current Parish Councillors. We also have one vacancy!

Our 9 May meeting largely consisted of procedural items, most importantly the budget for the forthcoming year and related to that, our priorities. These remain as before: Northstowe planning issues; flood attenuation; traffic issues; supporting the volunteers of the various action groups in the village (TAG, OWN and EAG); maintaining and improving the Recreation Ground, Cemetery, Community Orchards and Stocks Green.

One small, but interesting, piece of the Parish Council 'estate' is the Telephone **Box** near the Crossroads. When the Post Office decommissioned it, it was bought by the Parish Council and it has been a Mini Library ever since. Thank you, Liz Davis, for looking after it! Recently the Library was vandalised and very kindly Cllrs Tony Starling and David Reeves undertook the task of completing the renovation of it.

Open Spaces. On a rather larger scale, the bid for funding to create a path around the outside of the Rec, seating and additional play facilities, has now been submitted to the potential funding authority. We have planning permission and we have also agreed the contractor, should we receive the funding. So, fingers crossed, we hope to get the project going later this year.

I have had a number of comments about the state of the **fencing** next to the village shop. This was constructed by the previous shopkeepers as a temporary measure. I mentioned the concerns to Raj and she immediately replied that as soon as Kanwal returns from India in late June, the fencing will be replaced.

Flood Attenuation. Through the good offices of our County Councillor, Firouz Thompson, the Parish Council invited representatives of Homes England, the Environment Agency, the District and County Councils and our own Flood Mitigation Group. It was the first time that we had all actually sat down together to discuss the situation in Oakington.

We have identified a key issue in the failure of National Highways to share statistics with the Environment Agency and Homes England on the implications (possibly positive) of the A14 works which included some degree of flood mitigation. Without this information no further flood mitigation work can be undertaken! Philip Harker of Homes England has committed to obtaining the relevant information and bringing it back to the group. We have also agreed to have regular meetings as a full group in order to gain momentum on providing flood attenuation for the village. See a more detailed report on the meeting by Andrew Dennis on page 11.

The **Annual Parish Meeting** took place on 25 April and we had a decent turnout, though I do wish the majority of the village would come! It is the one time in the year in which each organisation in the village, including the Parish Council, has a chance to tell everyone what they are doing. So, groups such as the Community Association, the Environment Action Group, the Transport Action Group, Oakington & Westwick Neightbours, Tuesday Talk & Tea, and others, all spoke about their activities over the year. I have to say that if you attend and hear just what people have achieved for the village, it is quite remarkable. Our guest speaker this year was Dr Oscar Aldred who led the archaeological dig at Northstowe.

It is going to be an interesting and busy year for the reconstituted Parish Council. We are determined to do our part in continuing to make Oakington and Westwick a great place to live and bring up a family.

Finally, our congratulations to our two District Councillors, Sarah Cheung Johnston and Alex Malyon, who were re-elected on 5 May.

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

From the Councils

From our District Councillors

We are extremely pleased and honoured to have been recently re-elected as District Councillors for Longstanton, Oakington and Westwick and Northstowe. Our priorities for the next four years include working with Oakington to try and secure flood mitigation for the village. We have already had a meeting post-election with the Parish Council, Environment Agency, County Council, and developers Homes England to try and progress plans for flood attenuation for the village. We will of course continue to work very closely with our County Councillor, Firouz Thompson, on this and other local issues.

Support for Ukraine. At the time of writing 435 visas for Ukrainians have been issued for South Cambridgeshire as part of the Homes for Ukraine scheme. This is the highest number for any District Council area. A huge thank you to all those locally who have opened their homes to Ukrainian guests.

SCDC has mobilised to provide support for this scheme, including arranging payments for guests and hosts, DBS checks, and in-person visits to confirm properties are suitable and guests are settling in well. Our business team has been working with the local Job Centre Plus to coordinate offers of employment for Ukrainians looking for work. There are further details of the support that is available for both hosts and guests on the council website www.scambs.gov.uk/community-safety-and-health/support-for-ukraine/

Wild Minds Programme. Registrations are now open for South Cambs Wild Minds programme. This eight-week programme for 12–17-year-olds is designed to support mental wellbeing through small group, nature-based activities, working with support from a Clinical Psychologist. The

sessions are for young people experiencing mild to moderate mental ill health - such as anxiety, low mood, or low confidence. Courses are starting on 7, 8 and 12 June. More information can be found via www.scambs.gov.uk/community-safety-and-health/health-and-wellbeing/wild-minds

Urban Splash. You may have seen the news that the consortium delivering the Inholm development in the first parcel of Northstowe Phase 2, Urban Splash, has gone into administration. At the time of writing neither we as councillors nor council officers have further details on what will happen next with this part of the Northstowe development, but we will obviously ensure the wider community is updated on any wider impacts, as well as asking for this to be on the agenda at the next Northstowe Forum.

The next **Northstowe Forum** is being held on 13th July. Oakington residents are very welcome to attend these forums. The issues discussed are often of interest to the wider community surrounding Northstowe and there is an opportunity to ask questions of the developers.

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Community Action Groups

Transport Action Group

Local Highways Initiative – there is good and bad news. The bad news is that our bid for funding to get the 30mph speed zone throughout the village reduced to 20mph was rejected. However, the possible good news is the County Council is planning to set up a separate fund to enable villages throughout the county to apply for funding to create 20mph zones – we will still have to argue our case but having a dedicated fund may make it easier to succeed.

A14 Legacy Fund – improvements and enhancements to existing traffic calming. Detailed planning and design have been agreed and completed and there only remains for the funding identified to be allocated.

Oakington to Girton shared cycle path – the proposed widening and improvements to the Cambridge Road cycle path is on hold as there has been a delay due to costs and supplier issues.

East West Rail Route – the latest spring update from the EWR Co. only contains information regarding the southern approach. The results from the informal consultation carried out last year, promised for the end of April, are still not available. However, another pressure group has appeared on

the scene that wants the whole scheme to be abandoned including the proposed large house building program. Members of TAG are monitoring any developments and are continuing to engage with stakeholders.

Potholes – potholes can be reported on the County Council website using the address

www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/residents/travel-roads-and-parking/roads-and-pathways/roadworks-and-faults and on the same page you can find out how to claim for damage to your car (tyres, suspension etc.) caused by potholes. It is in all our best interests for as many people as possible to report new potholes and keep reporting unrepaired existing ones. Along with the continuing pressure from the parish council during their monthly meeting with the Local Highways Officer, additional complaints from the public on the "Report It" website above may bring about some action.

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
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Community Action Groups & Nature Notes

Flood Mitigation Group (FMG)

The Flood Mitigation Group took part in a meeting on 13 May to discuss the long-awaited proposal to reduce peak flows in Oakington Brook which cause a significant flooding risk to the village. The meeting was arranged by the Parish Council and included representatives from the Environment Agency (EA) and Homes England (HE) (Northstowe Developers) together with our District and County Councillors.

The main objective of the meeting was to find out whether the long-awaited revised flood modelling data from the EA was available yet and could be used by HE to design an attenuation reservoir upstream of the village, a condition of the planning approval for Northstowe Phase 2. It was confirmed that the flood modelling was not yet available, the delay being caused by the slow response to the EA by National Highways who are yet to show any impact on brook flows, either good or bad, caused by the drainage scheme associated with the improved A14. Until this is completed it will not be possible for the EA to complete their modelling and the HE to confirm the siting or size of the attenuation reservoir. Both HE and our County Councillor are in contact with National Highways over other matters and will be requesting a quick resolution to the discussions with the EA over the impact of the A14



Further regular meetings are proposed now that we have the appropriate contacts within the EA, HE and the Cambridgeshire County Council Flood team. It is our intention to pursue the matter as much as possible so as to avoid further delays to the scheme designed to reduce flood risk.

Nature Notes

Spring is happening three weeks earlier than it did in the 1940s.

You may have heard about this conclusion from researchers working with **Great Tits** in Wytham Wood, near Oxford. The birds are laying eggs nearly a month earlier, coinciding with the caterpillars that are food for the fledglings. So, the birds are able to track the other members of their food chain in line with the changes brought about by climate change.

The University of Oxford were given the 1000-acre wood in 1942 and researchers have committed to long-term and continuous ecological research ever since. It is the most researched area of woodland on the planet with bird data going back over 60 years alongside work on badgers and climate change. It is well known for long-term studies of tits and their most important predator, the sparrowhawk. The work underlined that sparrowhawk numbers fell when tit numbers decreased, and helped to blunt the arguments that sparrowhawks should be persecuted to maintain tit numbers. It's all part of the balance of nature.



The other birds in the news at the moment are **Swifts**, which were the subject of a 'Talk and Tea' presentation in Oakington in April. You probably know that they arrive from sub-Saharan Africa in mid-May and make their temporary homes in house rafters and church towers. They have been recorded at St. Andrew's

Church tower here in Oakington. When not nesting, they spend most of their lives flying: feeding, mating, sleeping on

the wing. So, they do not have territories, as such. In fact, swifts cannot stand on the ground but their claws do enable them to crawl up walls.

I recall seeing swift nests under a river bridge in South Africa and marvelled at the 5000-mile journey they make to mate in England. The British Trust for Ornithology have been tracking swift migration because they and others are concerned about a drop in their numbers (57% decline in 22 years). The possible reasons are lack of insects and loss of nest sites. You may like to know that Royal Mail are releasing new first class stamps featuring migratory birds and the swift is included.

Another migratory bird in trouble is the **Cuckoo**. It has announced the arrival of spring in the UK for generations and I recall as a child that when we heard its first call of



the year, we would search our pockets for money which was meant to indicate how we much we would have that year. Alas, the call is rare at present; since the 1980s, numbers have dropped by 65%. Cuckoos also fly from sub-Saharan Africa and as you know they have few social graces. They lay an egg in the nest of a host species, Reed Warbler, Meadow Pipit, Pied Wagtail or Dunnock, and on hatching the young cuckoo pushes the host eggs or hatchlings from the nest. It becomes the sole recipient of the hairy caterpillars brought by its adopted parents and soon grows bigger than them. Research has not yielded a clear reason for their decline. It may be because of a shortage of caterpillars which has certainly affected meadow pipit numbers, but it seems not the other hosts.

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



Seasonal Tip from the OCOP Team

Early Summer Fruit Thinning



In 2020 the community orchards were "blessed" with a lot of blossom that set to form fruit. This was good news and bad news, because if the trees were left to "manage it" for themselves, we would have ended up with a lot of small fruit, or overloaded and broken branches.

Apple trees can "manage" this to a certain extent themselves, with the "June drop" (which usually extends into July!), where the tree will discard some of the small fruit; other trees, like plums (see our picture from 2020), carry on regardless. So once the fruit starts to form, if it looks like your tree will be

overloaded, you can help it out, by thinning some of the fruit yourself.

The RHS recommends that cooking apples are thinned harder than dessert apples to obtain larger fruits; aim for one fruit every 15-23cm (6-9in). Dessert apples can be thinned less severely, with one or two fruits every 10-15cm (4-6in). Pears usually need less thinning; thin clusters to two fruits, 10-15 cm (4-6in) apart. For plums leave one fruit every 5-8cm (2-3in), or a pair of fruits every 15cm (6in). The advantage of doing some thinning is not only larger fruit, but also you can selectively remove diseased, damaged or misshapen fruit.

Book Corner

Atomic Habits by James Clear

Why is it that bad habits are so easy to develop, yet good habits are so difficult to make stick?



Clear explains that there are four stages to behaviour: Cue, Craving, Response, Reward. A cue triggers us to want something (we see a packet of biscuits, or hear a notification on our phone), we start to crave the reward, we respond by diving into the packet or checking out our messages, and the reward is ours, albeit short-lived!

Clear outlines ways we can intervene at any of these stages to make good habits easier, and bad habits harder. The atomic bit refers to the idea that its better to start with small, manageable changes and build on these to develop the habits you want. Don't try for 30 press ups a day – aim for three. I found the book full of useful insights that are applicable to anyone interested in behaviour change. As a dog trainer, it's useful to explain the value of practising small habits with your dog that become automatic for both of you. Like sitting to have the lead put on rather than leaping around.

What I've personally used to good effect is the ten minute delay rule. Instead of immediately reaching for the biscuits after lunch, I tell myself, I'll let myself have one in ten minutes. By that time, quite often I have forgotten I wanted one or the desire has faded.

Sadly my press up habit remains atomic but at least I've made a start!

Local History & Library

Oakington In The 1950s

On 6th February 1952 King George VI died and Princess Elizabeth ascended the throne. This year we are celebrating the 70th year of Queen Elizabeth II's reign. What were Oakington and the lives of its people like in the 1950s? Both our community and the rest of Britain were very different compared with today.

Following World War II a number of items including clothing, petrol and many foodstuffs had continued to be rationed. Although restrictions on many items had been

lifted by the start of the 1950s it was not until 1953 that rationing on sweets, chocolate and sugar was removed, and until 1954 rationing continued on some meat items.

One of the big changes has been in the size of Oakington and Westwick. In 1951 the population was 449, by 1966 it had grown to 890 and today is around 1500. This has meant a corresponding increase in housing. The 1947 Ordinance Survey map

shows farms where both Manor Farm Close and Meadow Farm Close are now. Many other parts of Oakington were also farmland. At sometime before 1953 the site of the Oakington Isolation Hospital, discussed in a previous article, had been reused for a home for children in care.

In the early 1950s the 15 acre site that had been Alan Bloom's horticultural nursery just off Water Lane was taken over by the district council to provide a recreation ground, burial ground and a large part devoted to a depot and store for the council. The recreation ground was dedicated to the memory of all those lost in the Second World War and the original plans included a Memorial hall. A fund was set up to build this hall; however it was not able to raise enough money. In 1952 part of the land originally set aside for the recreation ground facing onto Queens Way was reclassified for housing. The council depot opened in early 1953 and the building was described as being of great architectural merit. Saxon Close was built more recently on the depot site.

In 1952 the railway through Oakington station was still operational. At that time nearly all the trains would have been hauled by coal burning steam locomotives. People alighting at Oakington Station were able to take advantage of the nearby New Inn public house. Passenger trains ceased using this line in 1970, although freight trains and the occasional special passenger train continued for a number of years.

At the start of the 1950s Oakington and Westwick had three public houses, the aforementioned New Inn, the Harvest Home and the White Horse. Only the White Horse survives today. The Harvest Home, at the crossroads, closed in March 1951 and the New Inn closed in 1989. (There have been a number of pubs around the village over the years. These were discussed by Nick and Sarah Harrison in the Journal, Aug/Sep 2020 page 23.)

The airfield had been used as a base for heavy bombers

during the Second World War, but towards the end of hostilities it had become the base for several transport squadrons. In 1950 the transport squadrons were moved out and the airfield became an aircrew training school. This was initially to train aircrew for piston multi-engine aircraft, but soon was upgraded to an Advanced Training School training crew for newer jet aircraft. Crew were primarily trained on Vampire and Meteor jet aircraft. These made more noise and raised a number of complaints from the local villages, especially when there were night training exercises. Unfortunately over the years there were a number of accidents which resulted in crashes. Later Oakington was

used to train pilots on Jet Provost and Varsity aircraft. Training on Vampire jets finished in 1963, and Oakington closed as an airfield in 1975. The site was used for a number of years after for stationing army units and is now being developed as Northstowe.

In October 1952 the Oakington Parish Council withdrew their objection to the building of a

new road replacing the closed road that crossed the airfield. They had felt it would be a waste of money and of little use to Oakington. The airfield road was closed to general traffic in 1979 and has now been severed by a couple of roads going into Northstowe.

So, the local area has seen many changes across the years. What will Oakington and Westwick be like in another 70 years? Only time will tell.
