Is there a season as full of hope as spring?

William Wordsworth was certainly moved by spring:

*'Through primrose tufts, in that green bower,
The periwinkle trails its wreaths,
And 'tis my faith that every flower,
Enjoys the air it breathes.'*



Spring is when hibernating animals are waking up; hedgehogs begin their search for earthworms, slugs and snails after sunset, and hazel dormice look for early blossom, often blackthorn, leaving their winter homes in leaf litter and log piles. Pipistrelle bats begin their evening search for moths, midges and beetles and male great crested newts leave log piles and tree roots to return to water to perform their courting dances. We hope they are still in our village pond. Peacock and small tortoiseshell butterflies emerge from sheds where they have been hibernating.



Robins and other birds have worked out where they will nest, and most animals are preparing for courtship.

Spring is when many water birds like swans, geese and duck return north to Iceland, Greenland, Norway and Siberia to mate; and we welcome other migrants from Africa to breed here. The first to arrive are often wheatears (meaning white rump), sand martins and chiffchaffs. House martins, swallows and swifts come later and the bird which traditionally signals spring to us, the cuckoo, waits until May to call to us. Alas, the sound of this male bird, whose partner has very lazy parenting habits, is now quite rare.

Wild plants are starting to raise their flowers, so early bumble bees are attracted by nectar. The first butterflies of the season are also searching for nectar. These include brimstone, often the first to appear. Its yellow colour, similar to butter, is thought to be the reason for the name 'butterfly.' Orangetips are also early, again obviously named, and peacock have large 'eyes' on the wings, which keep predators like birds away. Comma butterflies, with their ragged wings that look as though they have been damaged by brambles, are mysterious about their hibernating habits. It is likely that they spend winter in hollow trees. Red admiral can appear in March. Because of their bright colours, they were called 'admirable' in the 18th century, from which its modern name evolved. The larvae of many of these early butterflies – peacock, small tortoiseshell, comma and red admiral – are dependent on nettles for their food.

Many of the wild plants that flower early are those that grow under trees and must produce their petals and nectar before the tree canopy brings its shade. These include bluebells, primroses and garlic mustard. There's lots of stories connecting fairies with bluebells and primroses. Many bluebells in this country are actually Spanish bluebells. Their heads look up and are a paler blue colour, where the true English flower hangs downwards and is darker blue. English bluebells are protected but there are lots of hybrids about. Wild daffodils are quite rare in our countryside. SOW planted some daffodils into our roadside grass areas last autumn, but these are cultivated daffodils, as are most in our gardens. They are still a magnificent sight at this time of the year (further reference to Wordsworth probably unnecessary).

From our Parish Council

New Parish Councillors. We are pleased to report that May Wheeler and Tom Westcott were co-opted onto the Parish Council at our February meeting. We look forward to working with them both. That leaves us with *no* vacancies for the first time in many years!

Parish Council Elections. Having said the above, all nine seats on the Parish Council will be up for election on 7 May. Nominations need to be hand-delivered to South Cambs District Council between 30 March and 9 April. So, if you are interested in putting yourself forward, you will need to be quick! Further details can be found at *scamb.gov.uk/elections/elections-2026*.

Proposed Cambridge to Rede Pipeline. By now, you should have received a flyer from Anglian Water about a proposed new pipeline which would run from Lolworth to the Rede storage reservoir in Suffolk. This is the second stage of a 70-kilometre Grafham to Rede pipeline that will transfer water from Grafham Water Treatment Works. Further details can be found at: *tinyurl.com/3xjzvxej*

As the pipeline will come through our village (via Cambridge Road and across to Dry Drayton Road) we have invited Anglian Water to attend the Annual Parish Meeting on **Monday 30 March, 7.30pm** to speak about the plans. They will also be holding a public drop-in before the meeting from **6.30pm**, so that individuals can ask questions. Please do consider coming along to speak with the developers.

Cambridge 25 – please see separate report on page 21. The developers will also be attending the Annual Parish Meeting on **30 March**. Please do come along and ask questions of them/share any concerns.

Speed Reduction Measures. Parish Council representatives met with Girton Parish Council and County Highways in February in response to concerns about the new speed cushions. Following on from that, a joint working group has been formed, consisting of councillors and residents from both villages. The group will produce an evidence log (photos, measurements, feedback) and coordinate engagement with CCC Highways. Its purpose is to look at the effectiveness of the current traffic calming measures, explore concerns raised, and consider whether improvements or alternatives could better meet safety aims.

From our District Councillors

Mobile Phone Coverage and the Planned Northstowe Mast. Mobile phone coverage remains uneven across parts of our ward, with Oakington – particularly the area around St Andrew's Church – being a well-known not-spot for some networks. Improving connectivity is important for everyday communication, home working and safety, and progress in this area is therefore welcome.

A new mobile phone mast is planned near the Longstanton Park & Ride site as part of wider infrastructure provision for Northstowe. Because of its location and orientation, some residents in Oakington might see a modest improvement in signal. At that point, feedback from Oakington residents will be helpful. Information about whether reception has improved, and on which networks, can help build a clearer picture of what further steps may be needed to address remaining gaps. This evidence can be valuable when engaging with mobile operators and infrastructure programmes about future improvements.

Local Plan Consultation. During the recent consultation on the draft Greater Cambridge Local Plan, which closed on 30 Jan, I requested that the proposed green separation between Northstowe and the villages of Oakington and Longstanton should be properly marked on the Local Plan maps to prevent ambiguity and the possibility that they could be further reduced in size in the future. I also submitted two objections where I believe the Local Plan, as drafted, to be unsound.

On employment land, I raised a soundness objection to the concentration of large logistics hubs along the A14 corridor in South Cambridgeshire. Our area already suffers from severe shortages of housing and labour. Adding further labour-intensive logistics uses here risks worsening traffic, increasing long-distance commuting, and placing additional strain on infrastructure and local communities.

At Cambridge East, the current airport site, the Plan requires a "contemporary approach to urban design" that "embraces modernity". It is not the place of a Local Plan to enforce one particular architectural ideology, especially one whose mistakes are increasingly evident.

Development Corporation for Greater Cambridge. The Government has been consulting on proposals to establish this body, which could take on significant planning and development responsibilities in the area. There is a real risk that local voices and democratic accountability will be sidelined. Once planning control is lost, it may be very difficult to regain. South Cambridgeshire is a very rural district, and it is vital that those making decisions that will shape our area for decades truly understand where we live, the communities here, and the countryside itself.

Local Government Reorganisation. The Government will make a final decision this summer, and new unitary councils are then due to begin operating in a shadow capacity from May 2027, with full implementation expected in April 2028.

Thank you Oakington & Westwick. Many of you have been particularly active in the last few months asking about environmental preservation and flood management as building continues in Northstowe, about how to report anti-social behaviour, in particular mopeds on walkways and car meets in the area, and the continued asks about District Council Services and how to access them on the new website. Thank you to all the residents and community groups who have been contacting me and working with me.

Here are some updates from SCDC linked to the key concerns you raised with me:

SCDC Corporate Action Plan and budget – Supporting Green Initiatives. In February's Full Council meeting, plans for the next twelve months were signed off, which will see major progress on the Council's Being Green to Our Core priority, including the ongoing roll-out of weekly food waste collections to reduce food waste being sent to landfill. Construction will continue of a solar energy park to help power the Council's growing fleet of electric bin lorries.

Boosting Financial Resilience and Tackling the Cost of Living. With many residents still facing financial pressures, the Council will continue providing its comprehensive cost-of-living support package. A budget of £449,000 is set aside to help residents through the next two years through schemes such as emergency food and energy support, workshops, budgeting and debt advice, white goods and furniture for vulnerable people and laptops with digital training. The Low-Income Family Tracker will continue to proactively identify households at risk of financial hardship and ensure they are claiming the benefits they are entitled to, helping prevent crises before they escalate.

Next Steps for the Greater Cambridge Local Plan. The Council continues to develop the new Greater Cambridge Local Plan through its Greater Cambridge Shared Planning (GCSP) service with Cambridge City Council. It will be the first joint Local Plan for Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire – and more than 4,500 comments were received during a recent eight-week consultation. This marks a major step in planning for the region's future – ensuring new homes, jobs and supporting facilities can come forward sustainably while protecting the region's environment, character and quality of life.

Reporting Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB). As Cabinet member I have been working with councillors across the City and South Cambs on issues with hotspots for ASB. Having in 2025 achieved a Public Service Protection Order (PSPO) for Milton Park and Ride (P&R), in February we consulted on the need for a PSPO for Babraham Road P&R. I would like to encourage residents across our ward to continue to report ASB as it's essential to have reports of disturbance in order for me to work with officers at SCDC on assessments leading to consultation and action. From our County Councillor

Cambridge Biomedical Campus Expansion. The County Council has agreed a partnership with Prologis to enable the next phase of expansion at the Cambridge Biomedical Campus. The plans include investment in transport improvements, green infrastructure, and a community fund. Any future commercial returns (subject to planning consent) will help support the Council's core services.

New Data-Led Poverty Prevention System. The Council will procure a new data-led platform to identify households who could benefit from income-maximisation support. This follows recommendations from the Cambridgeshire Poverty Strategy Commission. Similar systems have shown significant impact.

Safe Disposal of Batteries. RECAP is urging residents to dispose of batteries safely following recent incidents, including a fire at Thalia's Alconbury waste transfer station and thirteen bin-lorry fires in the past year.

Batteries should *never* be placed in general waste. Recycling points are available at Household Recycling Centres, supermarkets, DIY stores, and any shop selling batteries. For more information: tinyurl.com/5e3abbxv

Potholes and Road Defects. The Council is managing a sharp national rise in road defects, which has also affected crew availability. During the week of 9 March, 30 repair crews were deployed – far above the normal seven – including overnight teams. Persistent wet weather and limited opportunities to close roads continue to delay repairs. Despite insufficient Government funding, the Council is increasing its own investment to maintain progress.

Peat Soil Roads – Parliamentary Update. MP Ian Sollom has raised in Parliament the high costs and short lifespan of

works on roads built on peat soil – something affecting routes locally, including the B1050. The Transport Secretary has committed to raising the matter with ministers.

2026/27 Maintenance Programme. This year's programme includes carriageway works on **Water Lane**, from Arcadia Gardens to Cambridge Road (C197). I have requested this be prioritised, as the temporary repair undertaken shortly after I was elected has now reached the end of its lifespan.

Cambridge Road Traffic Calming – Design, Safety and Community Engagement. As I have shared previously, the traffic-calming scheme on Cambridge Road was developed jointly by Oakington & Westwick and Girton Parish Councils to address persistent speeding and a history of collisions along this stretch, including one fatality. The intention was to achieve consistent compliance with a 30mph limit throughout the route.

On 16 February, both Parish Councils met with County Highways officers to review resident feedback. The scheme is now in its formal monitoring phase. A Stage 3 Road Safety Audit will take place, and any recommendations will be reviewed and acted upon where appropriate.

Resident involvement continues to be high, and I receive feedback from those on both sides of the debate. This reflects a shared underlying concern: we all want safer roads. My role is to take an objective, evidence-based approach, listen to all viewpoints and ensure that concerns are properly examined by the Council.

I would encourage everyone engaging in this discussion to recognise the common ground we share and to approach differing views with understanding. Road safety is a responsibility we all hold together.

Environmental Action Group

Members of our **Flood Mitigation Group (FMG)** together with our district councillor Natalie Warren-Green met with the head planners at the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service in February to discuss our concerns relating to potential increased flood risk if the proposed Cambridge 25 business and logistics park goes ahead near Slate Hall Farm. Adequate mitigation of water runoff from the site into Oakington Brook will be essential, but we are also asking for some of the development land to be used for attenuation ponds that could be used to mitigate water flows already in the brook. The planners agreed that this would be a very reasonable addition and confirmed that they would support it if the developers came forward with such a proposal. However, while they are pushing for the development to provide betterment to our village, if none is forthcoming that will not in itself be a reason to refuse the proposed business and logistics park. Similar considerations apply to our request for a cycleway and footpath along Dry Drayton Road to link the development to Oakington.



Separately, Andrew Dennis of our FMG also took part in a webinar with the Cambridge 25 developers in early March. The webinar was part of their additional public consultation following revisions to their original site plan last September. We understand that the developers do not have plans at this stage for additional attenuation on Oakington Brook or for a cycleway/footpath, but are investigating whether they could be added. Meanwhile, we have arranged a meeting with our MP, Ian Sollom, to seek his support for our proposals for flood attenuation and cycle paths if and when a planning application is submitted for Cambridge 25.

In other news, we have continued discussions with **Histon and Impington Green Spaces (HIGS)** on the possibility of monitoring water quality in Beck Brook and its tributaries. So far, funding for the project has not yet been secured. We also continue to work with Sustainable Oakington and Westwick (SOW) on the **APOLLIO** nature recovery project, and this will be the topic of the next SOW meeting on **15 April**. Work on our other projects, including information boards, the "Oakington and Westwick in bloom" flower tubs, and maintenance of the village pond, continues in the background.

We saw 97 items, fixed 87 and saved 184 kg from going to landfill, as well as preventing 1366 kg of CO2 emissions. “Fantastic – very friendly and helpful, repairers super-knowledgeable and patient.” We had a VIP guest in the shape of Ian Sollom MP, who was conducted around the Repair Cafe by some of the younger SOW members.



We've also had some fascinating talks. In February, Paul Kershaw explained how and why to improve indoor air quality – the top tip was “purge ventilation”: open all the windows fully for just 10–15 minutes. In March we welcomed volunteers from Harston Food Hub and Northstowe Community Pantry, describing the amazing work of these projects to prevent both food waste and food poverty by redistributing fresh (and longlife) food.

It's been good to see the bulbs we planted on some of the village verges in flower. Leaving these verges long for wildlife in spring and summer will help pollinators and other insects, at a time when their populations are crashing. Another way to help is to take part in our village monitoring scheme (APollOW) – it takes 15 minutes with an easy phone app.

Old Oakington Recipes

Food rationing in the Second World War produced a creative abundance of recipes adapted to available ingredients. Here's an example – although with uncertainty over the quantities it would be hard to reproduce. You might have better luck with the "show" fruit cake recipe, from 1938 when sugar, eggs and butter were still easy to acquire.

War Pudding

1 tablespoonful sugar. 1 cup flour. 1 tablespoonful?? suet & butter. 1 tablespoonful jam. Little milk. Soda. Warm milk. Mix in teasp. soda. Mix dry ingredients. Put jam at bottom of basin. Steam 1½ hours.

Fruit cake – 1938 Show Receipt

4 ½ oz butter. 6oz brown sugar. 6 oz flour. 6oz sultanas. 3 oz currants. 3 oz peel. ½ teasp baking powder. Pinch salt. Pinch spice. 3 eggs. Almonds for top. Cream butter & sugar. Add eggs. Mix in dry ingredients. Bake at Regulo 4.

Both recipes are from the collection of Doris Nicholas, whose dairy farm was based at Waverley in High Street. Her granddaughters, Lillon and Charlotte, visited her often as children, riding their ponies from their home in St Ives down what is now the A14. In the early 1960s this was an ordinary country road, and the only time Lillon remembers any trouble from "traffic" was when a plane came over the road and its rushing shadow made her and her horse jump.

An alternative route, then as now, was through all the villages, although the airfield gates were only open for local traffic for half an hour each morning and evening. Lillon decided one day she would go home this way, which seemed much longer than the more direct route. She set off really early, imagining it would be an all-day trip, but found herself already at home by half past nine in the morning!

Covid-19 Day of Reflection

In September 2023 the UK Commission on Covid Commemoration recommended an annual UK-wide day of reflection and it was also agreed to find a way to preserve the wonderful tribute wall on London Embankment.



On Sunday 8 March, the 2026 Day of Reflection, we planted a Wild Cherry tree and unveiled a commemorative plaque to recognise the amazing way the community came together to support each other during the pandemic.

At the time it was remarkable how quickly things were set up to support the elderly, and people who were clinically vulnerable and had to remain isolated. The village even started its own COBRA style meetings, the first being six years ago on 16 March 2020.

OWN, Oakington and Westwick Neighbours, coordinated much of the work and had two dedicated phone lines that people could call when in need of assistance. The OWN team at the time were Lynda Fentiman, Jenny Prince, Di Wisbey, Alice Jondorf, Jo Bryant, Paul Kershaw, Julie Grove and Helen Moroney, with a lot of support from Adrienne Chaplin, and Teri Seaber on the phones. They set up “WhatsApp” groups to coordinate the work of the volunteers. And many people did sign up to help. In that way shopping and prescriptions were collected for those who were unable to do it themselves. Kevin Fentiman set up a reimbursement system to avoid handling cash. OWN also organised “safe” activities which brought people together, like the scavenger hunt, the Advent windows, which are now a regular event, and the community patchwork quilt which hangs over the door in the pavilion, along with a telephone tree and virtual cafe.

Ben Phillips quickly initiated a “JustGiving” page to support the food bank and that transitioned into the Hardship Fund as we know it today, which was managed at the time by Ben, Lynne McAulay and Jo Mills. The money raised supported families in need in a range of ways, including home school equipment, and the Hardship Team also distributed Christmas dinners. The local churches also found new ways to support their congregations through the most difficult periods.

The Community Association paid for a Zoom account, a shared resource which anyone could use, and they continued to support the publication of the Journal, which, as always, was a valuable resource for local information and news.

Raj and Kanwal did an amazing job, working all hours in

the village shop, making up people’s grocery orders for collection by the volunteers who did the home deliveries.

And we had a group of seamstresses, Paola Moore, Lynda Neech, Linda Ward, Pauline Marsh and Jane Goodyear making up masks, which they sold locally and raised over three and a half thousand pounds; they also made scrubs for the “Scrubs for Cambridgeshire” campaign. The money raised was used to support local causes, including the Hardship Fund, a new picnic table for the Orchard and a donation to the Age UK day centre in Cambridge. Many people around the village gave them fabrics to keep them going.



When I was fact checking for this article, someone told me they were really proud to be living in the village at that time, when everyone pulled together to help each other.

District Councillor Natalie Warren-Green kindly unveiled the plaque which reads:

This tree stands as a living tribute to the strength and compassion shown by our community during the Covid-19 Pandemic. We honour the volunteers who gave their time and care to support those in need, and we remember all who were impacted, and those who lost their lives. May this tree grow as a symbol of resilience, kindness and hope for generations to come. Planted in reflection and remembrance for the Covid-19 Day of Reflection, 8 March 2026.

Card Game Review

In **Innovation**, your civilisation advances through the ages, from the wheel to social media. Each technology can help your own society or interfere with your neighbours', but often you find other players seem to benefit from your turn more than you did. It is an addictive blend of complexity and simplicity: there is only one type of card, yet the colours, symbols, and the way cards overlap create many strategies. But there's no point in strategising too much: the unrelenting pace of technological progress means you'll have to adapt to stay ahead. As technologies advance, the effects become increasingly absurd, making the endgame a gloriously chaotic back-and-forth. At 30–45 minutes, it is a refreshing break from longer, more predictable strategy games.

Gardening Notes

April: One of the busiest months of the gardening year. Early flowering shrubs like Forsythia and Ribes can be pruned by cutting back to strong, new growth when flowering has finished. Last season's stems on hardy Fuchsias can be cut back when new growth appears at the base and Privet and Photinia hedges can be trimmed to maintain their shape.

Hardy annuals like Marigolds, Nigella, Zinnias and Cornflowers can be started now for a good summer display. Time to put in plant supports for heavy perennials like Paeony, Helenium, Rudbeckia and a tall structure for Sweet Peas to climb.

It's a good time to sow brassicas like broccoli and sprouts for next winter's harvest. Thin out seedlings of carrot, beetroot and parsnip to allow them to plump up. Second early potatoes can be planted now. Remember to ventilate the greenhouse and water well if the weather is warm.

May: Tie in new shoots of Clematis and Honeysuckle regularly. Prune wall trained Pyracantha by removing any shoots growing away from the wall. On a mild day harden off tender plants like Geraniums, Petunias and Begonias in a sheltered spot. Dahlias can be planted out and Sweet Peas planted under their support.

Sow a fast growing crop like lettuce or radish between the rows of slow growing brassicas. Dwarf French beans and runner beans should be started in trays or modules in the greenhouse. Pinch out the growing tips on broad beans when the lowest flowers have made small pods to avoid blackfly.



Finally 'No Mow May'. Leave grass to grow long and provide a habitat for beneficial insects like bees and butterflies. One job less to do!

Parish Council Response

At their meeting on the 9th March the Parish Council agreed their response to the Cambridge 25 Additional Consultation Proposals for the Wider Site Masterplan. Colour leaflets about this development appeared earlier through our letterboxes.

The Parish Council invites everyone to read their response as it highlights several major issues with this plan. It is available on their website tinyurl.com/5n73yhdc, or scan QR code below. Here is a brief summary of the main points.

The True Nature and Scale of the Development

Behind a carefully curated presentation lies a development of a fundamentally different scale and character – one that poses serious and lasting risks to the Oakington community.



This development is, in substance, not primarily an “employment park” as stated in their leaflet but a large 1.33 million square feet road freight terminal, a warehousing and distribution centre, a logistics hub.

This purpose is implicitly acknowledged in the consultation materials, where it refers to: “providing large HGV yards with significant HGV parking bays... and space for drivers to park up/rest in addition to spaces for vehicles delivering/collecting.”

In their response, the Council acknowledged that the success of the Cambridge economy... means more demand from companies for additional logistics and business space. Their objection is specific and principled:

The chosen location is fundamentally unsuitable. It fails on two essential grounds: Inadequate strategic highway access for the volume of HGV traffic proposed, and failure to meet the sustainability imperatives required by national policy.

Inadequate Highways Access

The consultation assertion that the site’s location is key to its connectivity – directly off the A14 – is incorrect and misleading. The site connects to the A14 via two traffic-light-controlled junctions on the A1307 local service road, both requiring significant redesign to accommodate the projected freight volumes – not included in the proposal. Also, without a major redesign of Girton Interchange, there is no suitable HGV access to the A428 and the Oxford–Cambridge Growth Corridor, which represents a nationally significant economic strategy, supported by

investment in East-West Rail and improvements to the A428.

In effect, the site is not properly integrated into the strategic freight network.

Ecologically Flawed

The consultation references the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), which supports sustainable economic growth. The UK has legally binding commitments to achieve a 68% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by 2030, relative to 1990 levels, and reach net zero by 2050. Rail freight produces approximately 75–80% lower CO₂ emissions per tonne-kilometre compared to road haulage, and it reduces congestion, particulate pollution, accident exposure, and long-term infrastructure costs. Given these well-established advantages, it is strategically and environmentally indefensible to locate a major distribution hub solely dependent on road freight when a multi-modal road/rail freight solution would deliver overwhelming ecological, fiscal and social benefits.

The omission of a rail-connected alternative represents a critical flaw in the conception of this project – a long-term decision with ecological consequences extending far beyond Oakington and neighbouring communities.

Cambridge 25, in its current form and location, is not aligned with sustainable planning principles and should not proceed as proposed.

If despite these major objections the project goes ahead, the PC listed several necessary improvements to the plans in respect of landscaping, flood mitigation and cycle and pedestrian connectivity.

Coffee with a Cop

On 10 February the “Tuesday Talk & Tea” kindly hosted “Coffee with a Cop”. This is a scheme run by the Neighbourhood Policing Team, which enables residents to chat informally to their local Neighbourhood Team about issues of concern to them and to learn about some of the current challenges the local team have to deal with. We were joined on the day by Police Constable Bujar Mani and Police Constable Chris Smits.

We were able to discuss a minor incident of anti-social behaviour which they had followed up on and after which the resident affected had taken advantage of the Cambridge & Peterborough Bobby Scheme, to have her home security upgraded. There is a full length article on the Bobby Scheme in the April/May 2025 edition of the Oakington & Westwick Journal which can be accessed on the Parish Council website.

The whole village had an open invitation to the meeting, and a lady from Westwick

called in to tell us about off-road vehicles which were using the footpaths in Westwick. She was concerned about her safety and that of other walkers. The Police Team advised her that they have a dedicated team, the Rural Crime Action Team (RCAT), in the area to stamp out hare coursing, and as the off-roaders could be involved, she should report them if it happens again: by phoning 101 for non-emergency matters but always 999 in an emergency (ie if hare coursing is active).
