Croft Lane

This is a short piece about a short lane!

Starting at the corner where Croft Lane meets Longstanton Road are council houses built in pre-war times. In front of these on the grass, elevated above the road, was one of the village pumps and alongside of this was a ditch for water running off the road.

Next along are two semis and one detached house built in the 60s by Charlie Caulfield, a local builder. At the end is one more recent build by Adrian and Jeremy Cook.

Between the council houses and the semis, the location of a lane that used to run through to the airfield is still visible.

On the corner of Coles Lane and Croft Lane was at one time a pair of old thatched cottages (knocked down in the 30s; shown in photo below). These were replaced with what became the home of Vi and Sydney Brickwood along with

(Photo shows Lenny Misson and Ralph Warboys as a boy!) the Post Office which Vi ran for many years until her retirement. Opposite was the bakery on Coles Lane, now East View, which backed onto Croft Lane. It was run by Bert Smith and his son Eric until he retired in the 50s. In recent times Chas Ashford-Hodges has built an office for his business "Chameleon Studios" at the bottom of his garden, which is side on to Croft Lane.

Last but not least we have the White Horse pub, now the only pub in the village, again side on to Croft Lane. It

From our Parish Council

Pavilion Solar panels – we are pleased to report the successful installation of solar panels on the Pavilion roof, together with back-up battery systems. This project marks a significant step towards sustainability. We thank all involved in this project, particularly Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority for their Net Zero Villages Grant funding and the Climate & Environment Team at South Cambs District Council for their support and guidance.

Speed limit reduction – works will shortly commence to implement the planned reduced limit to 30 mph between Oakington and Girton. We understand that to facilitate the work the road will likely be closed from the **26** – **29 August**, with a diversion route in place. Further details will be shared via social media and our website when we have them.

Solar speed units – thanks to a successful County Council Local Highways Initiative bid we now have two new solar speed monitoring units. These will be positioned in Cambridge Road and Water Lane/ Station Road. Hopefully they will help deter speeding in the village.

Noisy motorbikes – this very annoying antisocial/criminal behaviour continues to be an issue with excessive speeds and noise levels from motorbikes throughout the village and other local roads. Please do continue to report incidents to the Police via 101 or online via cambs.police.uk/ro/report/asb/asb-v3/report-antisocial-behaviour/
Residents are also welcome to speak about this issue at the South Cambs Community Police meetings. These meetings help define local police priorities. The next online meeting is Tuesday 16 September, 7–8pm. Email communitymeeting@cambs.police.uk to be sent an invite.

Village Day – a huge 'thank you' to the Community Association and all other volunteers who helped make the day such a success. There was a great atmosphere, full of community spirit (and cider!)

Local Government Reorganisation

The Local Government Reorganisation currently underway across England is the biggest change to local government since 1974. Rather than separate county, city and district councils, services like bin collections, roads, education and social care will all be under the umbrella of one unitary council.

Although it appears that it is possible to streamline services to save money, many of us are concerned that the government's proposed size for these unitary councils (with populations of at least 500,000 people) threatens to lose the local democratic representation that we hold so dear. Also, apart from its traditional counties, many of which date to Saxon times, England has no stable, historically enduring internal borders, so any reorganisation will only be temporary.

The public consultation closed on 20 July. My group is continuing to meet with officers to ensure we have the



information we need to get the best outcome for residents, with the best possible services and the best possible representation by your local councillors.

All seven of the councils in the ceremonial county of Cambridgeshire, including Peterborough, have been working together to discuss potential options for a new arrangement of councils. Three options based on existing Council boundaries are currently on the table. All of these would unite South Cambs district with Cambridge City Council; in proposal A East Cambs would also be part of the same unitary authority; in proposal C it would be Huntingdonshire instead. www.scambs.gov.uk/news/three-options-announced-for-council-reorganisation-plans.

Ultimately, it will be for central government to decide on any new local council structures. Britain has one of the most centralised national governments in the world, with little if any powers in England residing outside London.

From our County Councillor

Local Government Reorganisation. Three options for new unitary councils are under consideration. The County Council supports Option A, which keeps East Cambridgeshire linked with Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire.

Council Finance & Performance. Cambridgeshire ended the year with a £4.45M overspend (less than forecast).

Health & Wellbeing. The Council has retendered several public health services and endorsed a new strategy prioritising obesity, mental health, and smoking reduction. A dedicated Health Scrutiny committee is being proposed.

Procurement & Transparency. Historical breaches of procurement rules (none involving fraud) have prompted cultural changes and improvements in oversight.

Children & Education. New models for school construction have been approved. A service for children with complex needs will launch in Harston.

Household Support Fund. The fund is open again for 2025–26. Eligible households can apply for a £110 voucher. More info: www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/household-supportfund

Environment & Climate. The Fens reservoir will now be delivered by central government. Cambridgeshire scored second nationally in a climate action review. A new Local Nature Recovery Strategy launched on 18 July.

Other Updates. The Guided Busway will be fully fenced for safety. Please contact me if you would like us to retain places for residents to access nature or for nature to move across the busway. National Highways' A14 work remains under scrutiny.

Environment Action Group

There has again been a frustrating lack of progress on **flood mitigation** from the relevant bodies. David Reeves attended the most recent Northstowe quarterly meeting and raised our concerns about the lack of progress on the long-promised attenuation ponds, but Homes England (the Northstowe developers) did not address his questions and simply fell back on their argument that spending money on the ponds would only be triggered when 2,500 houses on phase 2 of Northstowe are occupied. This is not likely to happen until 2030, and that would be the trigger for starting the design work, not actually starting construction. We are also still awaiting a response from the Environment Agency to the letter that we sent them in January concerning maintenance of the section of Beck Brook downstream of Westwick, as well as a response to a subsequent enquiry regarding the state of maintenance of Oakington Brook alongside the former Tomato Farm.

Our **Nature Recovery** project (joint project with SOW) is continuing with the APollOW survey, and you may have seen our shared display on this at Village Day alongside our American crayfish exhibit (see Nature Notes on page 11). We also attended the Pollination Festival at Oakington Garden Centre, where we promoted the APollOW project which coincided brilliantly with their Chelsea Flower Show display.

John Terry (EAG Chair) and Andrew Dennis (representing our Flood Mitigation Group), also recently met with representatives from the **Histon and Impington Green Spaces** conservation group (HIGS) to discuss ideas for restoring water courses in our area to improve ecology.

Members of Girton and Cottenham conservation groups also attended. Introducing wiggles, berms or dams would bring significant challenges, particularly in our area where the land is relatively flat. Water tends to drop silt when it slows down, which can spoil fish spawning as well as reducing the flow capacity of the stream. Furthermore, slowing down the water flow too much could risk the water backing up and causing flooding upstream. Careful planning would therefore be needed if such a scheme was to be pursued.

Nature Notes & Scouts Reunion

Invasive Species

At Village Day this year, the Environment Action Group (EAG) not only shared a display with SOW on pollinators but also exhibited two dozen

American crayfish. It was an attempt to illustrate an example of an invasive species which now live and thrive in the UK. They were imported as food for restaurant customers, and now live in rivers and streams here, seriously threatening the native White Clawed Crayfish by passing on crayfish

plague, a fungal disease which is 100% lethal to the native species. They also damage river banks through extensive burrowing, and they eat almost everything from detritus, aquatic plants, small invertebrates, fish and even other crayfish. Our native species is in danger of extinction. An EAG member has a licence to move/ trap them, so they were moved legally for this display and have since been eaten.

Kate Spink wrote about ring-necked **parakeets** in the last edition of the Journal. They escaped from London aviaries in the 1960s, and are now in Oakington and elsewhere. Many invasive species have arrived because our climate is now warmer and more attractive to species from Europe and elsewhere. In addition, many were imported here by man for commercial gain, without enough thought about long-term outcomes.

You may be aware that **American mink** were brought here in 1929 so they could be farmed for their fur. In those days, a fur coat was viewed as a very prestigious garment. However, many mink escaped or were released by well-meaning but misguided animal liberationists. Mink are small enough to get into the burrows of water voles, which have suffered massively from predation. Otters are much bigger



than mink, and the invasive species tends to stay away from areas where otters are hunting.

Floating pennywort has become a problem on the River Cam and elsewhere in the UK. This is a South American water plant, imported in 1990 as an ornamental pond weed for sale at garden centres. In summer, the weed can grow at 20cm per day, smothering other plants, depleting light and oxygen levels, raising water temperature and impacting food chains. It has

also made life difficult for those operating boats and punts in rivers and canals. The Cam Valley Forum has worked for six years to try and control the weed and last year claimed total eradication in the upper Cam, an amazing feat, given that the plant can regrow from only small leaf fragments. The control was achieved with help from the Cam Conservators who used machinery and by volunteers using hand tools, nets and canoes. For the future, help could be at hand from a South American weevil that only eats pennywort and nothing else. Trials are being carried out in the Cam to measure the weevil's ability to check the weed.

Fourteen invasive species are considered to be widely spread in the UK. They include: giant hogweed, Himalayan balsam (most local river banks and elsewhere in the UK), muntjac (barking deer, throughout the whole of the UK) and grey squirrel, which spreads a lethal pox to our indigenous red squirrel. Our local black squirrels are grey squirrels with a faulty pigment gene. All these species damage local wildlife, and it is valuable to report sightings to Natural England.


At our June meeting, we welcomed Wayne from Lowland Rescue who gave a fascinating and informative talk on the work of his team of volunteers.

Gardening Notes

August: Encourage tomatoes to ripen by removing the growing tip after four trusses have set. Pick courgettes regularly. Lift onions and dry in the sun for a few days then store somewhere cool and dry. Time to sow late salad crops. You can also start Kohl Rabi for an autumn crop and spring cabbages to plant out while the soil is still warm for harvesting next spring.

Prune summer raspberries by removing this year's growth and tying in strong new stems for fruit next summer.

Harvest herbs by tying in bunches and hanging up indoors to dry or freezing in small quantities to add to winter meals.

Collect seeds from hardy annuals. Put in paper bags and label each one. Take Pelargonium cuttings by inserting a 4-6cm non-flowering shoot into freedraining compost. Keep moist and frost-free.



Summer prune Wisteria, cutting back whippy growth to about four buds of the main stem.

September: Bring houseplants back indoors and stop feeding potted plants. Keep dead-heading dahlias and roses to prolong flowering, adding trimmings to the compost.

Lift maincrop potatoes. Dry in the sun and then store in hessian or strong paper bags. Net brassicas to shield from pigeons. Increase your strawberry plants by pegging down a runner in a small pot of compost and cutting away when roots have formed in the pot.

Pick apples and pears regularly as they ripen, and store unblemished fruit

Leave seed-heads for the birds on sunflowers, teasels and thistles. They will also enjoy some windfall apples.

It has been a challenging season, so enjoy every small success!

Local Archaeology

Romans Next Door

Today the perimeter of Northstowe approaches ever closer to Oakington with its new houses and town centre. But 85 years ago you would have seen the RAF Oakington airfield, and even further back in time, say 1800 years ago during the 3rd century CE, another bustling settlement would have been visible.

This was a settlement of a different character. Not only was it a Romano-British settlement, but it was long and wide: just about ½ mile long and a ¼ mile wide at its maximum width. And with multiple parts, it is what landscape archaeologists call a 'polyfocal settlement' (meaning it has no distinct centre), and what we have called Beck Brook, or more prosaically Site 18.

At the top end there was a northern settlement, enclosed by double ditches and banks, less defensive, and more of a statement on the landscape, with a series of large enclosures.

To the south of this was a large public building, adjacent to a market space, where all kinds of goods were traded and bought. We know this because we found over 400 Roman coins (mostly 2nd to 4th century CE) in this area alone. The core of the settlement was orientated around a crossroads, around which several phases of enclosures and buildings

were located; a space that was built, rebuilt and reorganised multiple times over since the later Iron Age. Also, here, given the dual domestic and working focus, another 300 Roman coins were recovered, probably more to do with inhabitation coin loss rather than a small trading and market focus, though there was no doubt a mercantile element to it.

To the south of the crossroads, there was another part of the settlement, with systematic plots running south along the spine of the settlement, that were also dual domestic and working; the arrangement of plots within the Beck Brook is what we call a 'roadside settlement'.

To the west of the core area, there was a late Roman extension to the settlement, emerging in the late-3rd century CE. This extension, and others, and the parts within Beck Brook, were connected by a series of trackways that ran in a northeast to southwest direction, along the entire length of the settlement, and then also perpendicular to this at the crossroads, and several other places in between Beck Brook's settlement zones. These trackways connected other settlements, such as another small satellite farmstead that lay immediately to the west of the later Roman extension, but also another large complex farmstead ½ mile further to the northwest, and to the south connecting up with the Roman road, the Via Devana.


