#### **Baby and Toddler Groups in the Village**



#### From our Parish Council Chair

Before I became a Parish Councillor, I was not really aware of the large number of activities which are quietly undertaken by the PC to improve the amenities of the village and to defend its interests. Much of the work is liaising with District and County Councillors, but also a host of smaller things around the village which most residents take for granted. Well, now is your chance to **get involved**. We are two councillors short. If you are interested please mail me (*chair@oakingtonandwestwick-pc.gov.uk*) I am happy to have a coffee and explain what is involved. Come on!

We were pleased to receive a visit from Bridget Smith, Leader of South Cambs District Council. It seems likely that a full planning application for **Northstowe Phase 3a** will be submitted within the year (so far, they have only outline planning permission) and we can expect an attenuation "pond" as part of the application. Finally, we may see the end of flooding in the village!

We are in the middle of applying for a **20mph speed limit through Westwick** and into Station Road to link with our wider village scheme. We will have to prove that our need for a speed limit is greater than other villages'. We really need the residents of Westwick/Station Road and those who use Busy Bees nursery to email our Parish Clerk (*clerk@oakingtonandwestwick-pc.gov.uk*) to support the application. All other mails of support welcome.

We are purchasing two solar-powered **speed monitors** to place in Cambridge Road and Water Lane/Station Road. We will use our current one as a 'mobile monitor'. The monitors and the 20mph limits have had a significant impact on traffic speeds. Many of you have had 20mph stickers posted through your letterbox, to cover over the old 30mph signs on your bins.

The Greater Cambridge Partnership have proposed a **Greenway** between Cottenham and Oakington, which will comprise a pedestrian/equestrian/cycle path – with appropriate separation. We have engaged in the consultation and have suggested significant changes to the Westwick/Station Road end of the path. The funding is available and I am assured that this time we will see a decent route developed and actually built. I had been pestering the Northstowe developers and the A14 builders, for some considerable time, to build a separate cycleway along Dry Drayton Road, but have had no success. The Cambridge Road cycleway has stuttered to a halt with a lack of funds.

I think we really have to admire the fantastic new seating areas and planting on the **Recreation Ground**. Well done to Geoffrey Butlin! See page 9.

While checking the safety of our Play Area I have noticed **rubbish** there and in one of the seating areas. Please put it in the bins. Abandoned Voi electric hire bikes have also been dumped. We have powerful CCTV on all parts of the Rec/pavilion and car park – just so you know. We have improved the lighting of the Rec car park and we are working with Oakington Vikings to submit a bid for an improved surface for the **MUGA** (Multi Use Games Area). This should allow us to provide a safer and more enjoyable playing surface, but also to earn much-needed money to maintain the Rec.

**Connections Youth Bus.** These fantastic people come every term-time Monday and provide a bit of enjoyment for any young people in the village. Sadly, they have had a number of problems with their double decker bus that they bring to our Rec car park. We have, whenever they have requested it, offered them the use of the Pavilion. Hopefully, they will be returning soon.

Lastly, the roof of the **bus stop** near Mill Road blew off. We realised that the roof was asbestos, so we had specialists remove this and two of the councillors are rebuilding and replacing the roof. You see what I mean about the unnoticed work of councillors?

#### From the Councils

#### **From our District Councillors**

The Greater Cambridge Partnership has developed a strategy to create a network of Greenways to connect South Cambridgeshire villages with Cambridge along a series of corridors. These will extend footpaths, cycleways and in some cases bridleways in order to create more sustainable travel. The St Ives Greenway uses the Guided Busway to St Ives as a backbone to which nearby villages are connected. More information is available at:

The Oakington to Cottenham route starts on the main road along Station Road and Westwick Terrace. Opposite Westwick Farm it comes off the main vehicle carriageway and is then adjacent to the main road until it joins the pedestrian pavement upon reaching Cottenham. Along part of the route, the design provides a narrow strip of grass to separate the bridleway from the main road, while along another section it is immediately adjacent.

I am opposed to this route for the same reason that I opposed the route of the cycleway between Oakington and Girton and the route along Huntingdon Road; the edge of a main road with fast-moving traffic, some of which are heavy vehicles, is an unsuitable location for slower moving and more vulnerable pedestrians, cyclists and horses/riders. I have followed this policy since November 2005, when a student on a bicycle was killed by a truck while riding along a shared bicycle and bus lane on Huntingdon Road. Fatalities of this kind will continue to happen, until our transport planners understand this point.

Thank you to all residents who contact me when they need support regarding issues related to waste, planning, housing, tenancies and groundwater/flooding. It's a pleasure to be able to signpost and support you in resolving situations you need help to manage; please feel free to keep emailing me.

Other than specific individual queries, and questions about the Greenway Plans, covered by Cllr Bygott, people in Oakington have asked about:

**Northstowe Interim Community Centre:** The aim is for the facility to be up and running by the end of May, and use is for residents across the Longstanton Ward. The interim facility includes provision for a Café and Pantry, rooms for baby and toddler groups, private hire for events such as birthday parties, children and youth activities, art workshops and events, meeting spaces for sport and activity groups.

**Rooms for Ukrainians:** Hosts are still needed for Ukrainian families who are already in South Cambridgeshire, with hosts eligible to receive up to £500 a month as a thank you payment. If you are interested, please text ROOM to 88802.

Asylum Seekers in Bar Hill: Some residents in Oakington have asked about the hotel at Bar Hill contracted by the Home Office to provide accommodation for asylum seekers and how they may be able to help people being housed there with support and donations. Once Bar Hill Parish Council understand the level of demand for clothes, and the amount being donated from people in Bar Hill, we will see if further support is required from a wider area and get back in touch. #### **From our County Councillor**

**A14 corridor trees disaster:** After nearly a year of campaigning as LibDem Councillors we have some development and good news. The issue: National Highways have informed us that they planted 800k saplings along the A14 and 70% have died, that is 560k trees! National Highways had committed to replant the trees over five years, but they dragged their feet during planting seasons.

They have now reset the clock to start the five years of work again from Autumn 2023 with a new approach focused on tree success rate rather than number of trees planted.

**Budgets:** Like three quarters of all councils in the country this year, Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) was forced to increase its portion of the council tax by 4.99%, the maximum permitted. As a Joint Administration we faced up to the financial challenge facing the county resulting from a legacy of poor choices by the outgoing administration, along with the failure of the Government for a number of years now to introduce a fair funding formula. Without this, we receive a much worse deal than many other councils and where we have had to make savings, we have done so carefully.

Water industry consultation: Cambridge Water – Draft Water Resources Management Plan 2024 Consultation closes on 19 May. Please do consider responding. cambridge-water.co.uk/about-us/our-strategies-and-plans/our-water-resources-management-plan

Cambridgeshire Music: I have been appointed as a Board Member of Cambridgeshire Music based in Histon at CCC's Children and Young People's Committee. Cambridgeshire Music is referred to as a partnership of school music providers, led by the County Council, to deliver the government's National Plan for School Music.

Local Highways Improvement (LHI): Back in January, I supported Oakington & Westwick and Girton's Parish Councils' joint application to reduce the speed limit from Girton to Oakington to 30mph, I am sure we all agree that the main road linking the two villages needs to be safer for our community of drivers, cyclists, equestrians and pedestrians. The budget would be funded by Northstowe S106 money. LHI panel will meet in May 2023 and, if the scheme does get the go-head, construction would be March to August 2024.

Work on the Parish Council's **Open Spaces project**, supported by the EAG, to develop the recreation ground

has been continuing. The two new seating areas, based around the themes of Anglo-Saxon Oakington and RAF Oakington, have now been installed, and the daffodils are coming into bloom as you can see from the photograph.

We have continued to monitor **drainage** around the village, and were pleased to note that Cambridgeshire County Council cleaned the gullies around the crossroads, along Water Lane and on Mill

Road in February. This cleaning was a lot more thorough than on previous occasions. We have yet to experience higher rainfall for a really rigorous test, but the drainage seems to be a big improvement so far. We are grateful to Cllr Firouz Thompson and her colleagues for including our village in this programme.

We were also pleased to see that the **village pond** has continued to remain relatively clear of duckweed over the winter months, although we do expect the weed to return as temperatures rise.

How can villages maintain their integrity when facing nearby large-scale development? Alan James, Chair of the Cambs & East branch of the CPRE, The Countryside Charity, will be talking about their 'What Gets Built Where' campaign.



#### **Oakington Air Quality**

Oakington Primary School has been the location of the Purple Air pollution monitor which is live and freely available on the internet by going to

www.purpleair.com/maps. The image below is a snapshot of the local Air Quality Index (AQI) taken on Monday 20 March. By zooming out you can find all the operational Purple Air monitors installed in the UK and across the rest of the world. Locally there is one located in Bar Hill and two are in Cambridge in the vicinity of Cambridge Station. Two others are in Great Gransden and Gamlingay. It is interesting to see how our AQI compares with others locally and across the globe.



#### St Ives Greenway

Greater Cambridge Partnership have been implementing a number of Greenway projects for active transport (walking, cycling, horse riding). The St Ives greenway primarily uses the maintenance track that runs beside the guided bus. However, part of the project has direct impact on Oakington and Westwick with a proposal to put a cycleway, separated from the road for most of the route by a hedgerow, between Oakington and Cottenham at a predicted cost of £1M. On one level it is a good thing that new cycleways are being proposed but there are more urgent needs for existing cycleways or shared paths (e.g. Cambridge Road) to be improved for increased safety of both pedestrians and cyclists. TAG considers that a separate cycle path from Oakington down to the A1307 would be a major benefit for cyclists to connect with the new cycleways that were built alongside the upgraded A14 to give safe access to Bar Hill and West Cambridge. TAG supports the responses made by the Parish Council and the more technical response from Camcycle regarding the St Ives Greenway.

#### **Water Lane Traffic Calming**

The Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign (MVAS) had been relocated in Station Road facing traffic approaching from Cottenham. At the time of writing there is one week's worth of data but is showing encouraging signs of speed reduction with only 7.4% exceeding the 30mph speed limit.

#### **Cambridge Water Data Loss**

As I have just been through the experience of having my personal data sold on, I thought it might be useful to recount what happened.

We were paying for our water by direct debit and, like everyone else, we received a letter from Cambridge Water in December 2022, telling us our data had been compromised. They recommended that we register for a subscription to TrueIdentity, which we did almost immediately, adding our bank details for tracking on the dark web. However, we have had no alerts, so either TrueIdentity are not very good or our data has been sold openly, rather than on the dark web.

Cambridge Water also recommended we sign up for Protective Registration using CIFAS; unfortunately I was put off by the £25 fee.

On 8 February, I received letters from insurance brokers to say that car insurance had been taken out in my name, which they believed to be fraudulent. When I checked my bank account, ten direct debits had been set up by various insurance brokers, mainly for motor insurance. I cancelled them all before any money was taken. When cancelling a Direct Debit you are supposed to notify the company involved, but in most cases this was not possible as I had no contact details.


I immediately phoned Action Fraud (0300 123 2040, Mon–Fri 8am–8pm), although it is probably easier to register online (*reporting.actionfraud.police.uk*), and obtained a crime number. Some companies will not cancel fraudulent activity without it, so this is an essential step. I then spent my £25

with CIFAS and that has stopped all further fraudulent activity, so far.

Since cancelling the direct debits, I have had a series of letters from the various brokers, some advising me that they have recognised fraudulent activity, some questioning why I have cancelled the payments and some debt collection letters. I have subsequently been able to email or phone all of them. All have been reasonably helpful, but have required the Crime Number.

When I semi-retired I thought it would be good to try volunteering; aware of so many good causes, ... help people who face difficulties. The planetary situation was worrying me too and I wanted to do something to reduce carbon emissions and silly waste. I searched and quickly came across Cambridge Re-Use. They collect and supply used furniture to help those on low income. If you are on low income, you can buy a good sofa from them for £40–60.



I remembered once as a child when we were going through a rough patch (the North East boom and bust economy and when the pits closed down...). Our sofa was an old red velvet scrap heap ... you hesitated bringing friends home for tea because it was so leprous. I remember we had to put up with it a long time and the feeling when the new sofa arrived ... a surprising but veritable rise in self-respect, pride etc. When delivering sofas as part of the Re-Use van crew I sometimes fancy I see the look on a kid's face as we go through the door... happiness and relief that something nice is coming into the house ... satisfying. And guys who tell you they've been on the street for years and the council have just given them the flat we are delivering a bed, tables and chair to ... really appreciating the help they have received from all parties. Good to be involved in such transactions.

I've been doing between 3 and 4 days' volunteering a week there for the last 6 years now, varying roles, depending on the charity's need (marketing, board of trustees/directors, driver, receptionist, sales assistant). Such a variety of roles are possible, it's not all bucket collections and marathons by any means.

As an older person now I'm glad I've spent some years doing some good, not just profit, and working with lots of nice people, from all walks. A warm feeling.

#### **Cambridge Nature Network**

In February, members of the EAG and SOW convened to listen to a presentation of the 'Cambridge Nature Network', delivered by Cambridge Past Present and Future. Based on a report produced in part by the Wildlife Trusts, five Priority Areas and one Opportunity Area were defined around the city of Cambridge as being of particular importance for the habitats they support, their role as wildlife corridors or both. The point of the network is to provide funding opportunities to groups at any scale who wish to create or enhance habitats for nature. For the most part, they are defined by the presence of so-called 'Priority Habitats', i.e. those habitats that support rare or specialist species and/or those habitats which are in themselves rare or threatened.

To the south-east of Cambridge are the areas of Chalk Grassland, characterised by grazing on chalk or limestone soils and supporting some Nationally Rare species eg. Moon Carrot *Seseli libanotis*, Great Pignut *Bunium bulbocastanum* and Grape Hyacinth *Muscari neglectum*. All of these have small isolated populations in and around the Cherry Hinton Chalk pits, so the opportunity to provide more suitable habitat will greatly reduce the risk of local extinction.

Similarly, to the west is the so-called 'Boulder Clay and Woodlands' area around Madingley. Woodland ground flora are some of the earliest species to come into flower, taking



advantage of the early spring warmth before the trees above come into full leaf. Viewers of the latest landmark BBC series 'Wild Isles' will have seen the intricate methods used by a familiar woodland plant, Lords and Ladies *Arum maculatum*, also known as Cuckoo Pint, to entice a pollinating insect into its 'dungeon' at the base, douse it with pollen, only to be released to the

next plant. Lords and Ladies are abundant on the paths in and around Mansells Wood – next time you are there and they are in flower, try giving them a sniff!

So to the area of most relevance to us, the 'Fen Edge Orchards and Droves' Opportunity Area. Lying to the north of the City, it has the potential to provide a stepping stone for wildlife from the River Cam corridor to the south to the River Ouse catchment to the north. But why Orchards? Firstly, fruit growing was a regular part of our local economy - the Chivers Factory in Histon is testament to that. Readers of this column will already be well aware of the great benefits orchards can have. But you may be less aware that Traditional Orchards too are considered as Priority Habitats alongside reedbeds, broadleaf woodland and chalk grassland. What makes a traditional orchard so special? The key is in its management. Traditional orchards typically are managed in a low intensity fashion — the ground vegetation

is often a species-rich grassland, perhaps with pockets of scrub, all of which are great for invertebrates. The oldest traditional orchards also tend to have some very old trees, and with that comes lots of deadwood, again great for beetles and others that specialise on feeding on this much reduced resource. And then there are their predators: lesser spotted woodpecker, one of



Britain's rarest and fastest declining breeding birds, thrives in habitats rich in deadwood for feeding and nest building.

We plan to take this work forward locally by using the Nature Recovery Toolkit developed by Natural Cambridgeshire. We welcome the help and support of local people who could help us develop plans, maps following surveys and activities to help nature recovery in Oakington and Westwick. We only look for interest in nature; you don't have to be an ecologist and you can put in as much time as you choose. Please contact James Heywood, John Terry or Sustainable Oakington & Westwick.

#### **Emergency Alert Trial on all Mobiles**

A siren-like alert will be sent to mobile phone users across the UK next month to test a new government public warning system. It allows the government and emergency services to send urgent messages warning the public of life-threatening situations like flooding or wildfires. The test is expected to take place in the early evening of **23 April.** 

Phone users will have to acknowledge the alert before they can use other features on their devices. A message will appear on the home screens of people's devices during the test, with vibration and a loud warning sound that will ring for about 10 seconds, even if the phone is set to silent. Messages would only ever come from the government or emergency services and will initially focus on the most serious weather-related events, with the ability to get a message to 90% of mobile users within the relevant area.

#### **Changes to Battery Recycling Collections**

Adjustments to bin lorries mean that small plastic bags containing used batteries can now simply be left (tied up) on top of green, black or blue bins for collection by crews on their usual rounds.

Most small common household portable batteries can be placed out for collection at the kerbside, including AAA, AA, C, D and button cells. Please do not include mobile phone, laptop batteries or those that are attached to a device.

Search online for 'recycle small electrical items' instead.

Residents of flats with shared bins should not leave batteries on these but can take them to the Co-ops in Histon, Girton, Longstanton and Cottenham and Tesco at Bar Hill.



#### **Dog Training**

Don't complain: Manage and Train!

While many of us enjoy sharing our lives with dogs, it's fair to say not everyone feels the same way about our pooches. And even dog lovers might sometimes feel tested by the behaviour of their own, or other people's dogs. Although serious injuries caused by them are thankfully rare, vets and groomers are reporting an increase in dogs that are difficult to handle and trainers are seeing many we'd describe as 'unruly'.

There are two key measures to keep our dogs under control and everyone safe: Management and Training.

**Management** means avoiding putting your dog in situations where their behaviour is problematic or they could develop expectations or habits that will be a problem in future. Do you want your dog to expect strangers in the park to give them a fuss or treats? Do you want your dog to expect to play with every other dog they see? Possibly not!

Keeping the lead on, doors shut and thinking carefully about where you take your dog are examples of good management.

**Training** for the longer term; it is important to teach your dog the life skills to live compatibly around humans. Good manners include paying attention and coming when called, being able to settle when alone or when you take them to places, walking calmly on the lead past distractions rather than pulling. Training makes life easier and more enjoyable for you and your dog!

The Blue Cross (bluecross.org.uk) and other organisations have many good training guides online, or speak to your vet about training options.

#### Mill Road

Mill Road is one of the shortest (and steepest) roads in Oakington. There are just four houses, numbered confusingly 1, 2, 7 and 15, although social events are usually extended to our neighbours on the corners, and ex-

Mill Road residents living locally – we're a friendly street! Bob and Linda have been here the longest (30 years). Hannah Angel, now in Cottenham, moved to Mill Road back in the early 70s and lived at number 1 until 2012.

Hillcroft Cottage (number 15) is the oldest house, the earliest part of which dates from 1919 - probably the

first house to be built in Oakington after the first world war. The Radfords who lived there had an orchard and a market garden on the west side of the road. Hannah says that asparagus was grown and sent off on an early train at the village station. Their daughter Ruby was nanny for many years at Westwick Hall.

The Radfords' land was divided into three building plots around the 1960s. The one at the top of the road was bought by Mrs Olive Doggett, who lived in Myrtle Cottage

(80 High Street), to prevent anyone building a house next door to her. In the middle plot and lower plots, Ruby had her bungalow built (number 7), and then in the late sixties, number 1. She lived in the bungalow in her old age, with Hannah keeping an eye on her. At the turn of the present century the bungalow was extended.

By the 1970s Mrs Barrett and her son, a university academic, lived at Hillcroft Cottage. Hannah recalls that she accidentally set fire to it! A plot on the other side of the road, formerly owned by Queens College, had been sold in 1926 to the Doggetts at Myrtle Cottage, and Mrs Doggett kept chickens there which used to get out onto the road. Nick Harrison's sister

Susan bought this land and had the road's fourth house built there in the early nineties.

Until the second world war, Mill Road was actually one of the longest lanes in the village – it

led past where Church View is now to a windmill, and a path continued beyond. Another road, Drift Road, branched right to a sand or gravel quarry. This all disappeared when the airfield was built, but plans for Northstowe include a footpath/cycle track along the old Mill Road route. Northstowe will press very close up to Oakington here, but we hope the taller trees beyond the community orchard will provide a visual barrier.


Did you know we offer a monthly service of a Friday morning trip to Tescos?




