From our Parish Council Chair

L et me begin by wishing everyone a very Happy Christmas and a warm New Year!

The single biggest yearly item of expenditure by the Parish Council is on the **Connexions Youth Bus**. This comes every Monday evening to the Recreation Ground and is open to all our young people. I regularly pop along to talk to the youth workers and I am immensely impressed by the services they offer to our youth. Many villages consider the expenditure on a youth service for their young people as a waste of money, but I am proud of what we do to support our young people.

It is therefore particularly upsetting that a small group of young children from this village regularly act in a silly manner, disrupting meetings and activities at the Pavilion. May I appeal to parents living near the Recreation Ground to ensure their children are not involved in this behaviour.

We are installing new **car park lights** to make people feel safer, particularly at the far end of the car park away from the Pavilion. Also, we are replacing four young **trees** planted next to the tennis courts, which unfortunately died in the dry summer, and we are planting the Platinum Jubilee oak tree towards the front of the Pavilion.

We have been heartened by the number of people who picnicked in the village **orchard** at the Recreation Ground. We have therefore replaced the old picnic table with a new one. Do continue to enjoy the orchard.

The tragic death of a teenage cyclist on the Girton-Oakington Road is a powerful reminder of how cars are lethal weapons. Since the introduction of the 20 mph limit in our village, it is pleasing to note that our **speed monitor** shows a significant decline in traffic speed. Sadly not all residents seem to think the limit applies to them. Please note that the 20 mph limit applies throughout the village and we introduced it to make the village a safer place.

The Parish Council was heavily involved in **lobbying Stagecoach** to maintain the half hour Citi6 bus service and to continue running the Citi5 via Oakington at night. Stagecoach replied that it was a commercial company which only ran profitable bus routes. It is not a public service.

This issue of "public" transport brings me to the proposals for a **congestion charge** for Cambridge. This seems to have been turned into quite a political debate, rather than on a discussion on the best way forward for a rapidly expanding "Greater Cambridge" to cope with traffic, congestion and pollution. There seems to be considerable focus on the congestion charge element of the plan and far less on the provision of public transport which the charge would facilitate. I have set out a very brief summary of the facts on page 11. The proposals will have a huge impact on the lives of us all and I urge you to read the full plan before making up your mind.

One of the big issues in Oakington is that of flooding, but in Longstanton the opposite problem of a **drop in the water table** has occurred. It is assumed that this has something to do with the development of Northstowe, though no causal connection has yet been definitively proved. This has led to some concern in villages around Northstowe and, indeed to Northstowe Town Council as well. As a result of this, a group of local villages, including Oakington and Westwick, have linked together to form an "Inter Parish Hydrology Group" to liaise and act together, where it seems appropriate.

Finally, are you a sceptic about climate change? Well, traditionally each

village in this area had its own (horse drawn) **snow plough** to clear the roads each year when the snow came. I think you would agree that it would have got little use in this century. Well, we have kindly been offered our old snow plough back, courtesy of John Missen. The Parish Council will install it near the tennis courts on the Recreation Ground. Thank you, John!

Following the by-election for two District Councillors I would like to thank all those residents of Oakington and Westwick who voted for me and I feel both honoured and privileged to have now signed my acceptance of office.

I would like to extend my gratitude and appreciation to Sarah and Alex, who have fully briefed me following their decision to step down and focus on their families after four years serving this Community. Their hard work has been recognised by many residents and I have been told often while canvassing that 'theirs are big shoes to fill'. I am pleased to remain in contact with them to provide continuity. I also would like to thank Cllr Firouz Thompson for her support and I look forward to working with her as well as with Cllr Bill Handley, Lead Cabinet Member for New Towns and Cllr Tumi Hawkins for Planning at South Cambridgeshire District Council.

I am keen to apply my experience of change, transformation and transition in the public and private sectors to help address local frustrations; and to support progress on housing and amenity development, local transport and related charges and issues with water and environmental factors being experienced across the Ward.

On 14th November I attended the Oakington & Westwick Parish Council Meeting for the first time as a Councillor.

I went along this time to listen only, rather than report, and I have taken on board the discussions regarding the ongoing struggle with flooding. Readers will have seen previous reports by Sarah and Alex with links to documents, including the independent hydrology report and the District Council's Action Plan; I encourage you to continue to refer to these at scambs.gov.uk/community-safety-and-

health/northstowe/northstowe-groundwater-investigations/. As someone already working in the space of Climate Transition, I aim to support the Community to resolve environmental issues and will report on progress made.

I have listened hard to a clear message from residents in this by-election that they trust the LibDem run District Council, but that we need to show progress on local issues including water, the delivery of facilities in Northstowe, as well as about public transport. I'll be working hard with the Ward Councils, community groups, residents, and Senior Delivery Managers at SCDC to make a difference.



I look forward to discussions with the Conservative District Councillor, Tom

Bygott, and I'm confident that we can work together to get the best for our community

BUSES

Citi 6 Bus Route - Oakington - Cambridge

After several conversations with myself and the Parish Council, Stagecoach agreed to add further buses from Cambridge to Oakington – 17:20, 17:50 and 18:20, although this still means no buses in the evening. The frequency is 30 mins peak then hourly. See timetable *tinyurl.com/bdfcb79d*

Combined Authority (CA)

The CA's bus procurement concluded last month; all 18 routes which had been cut along with the five reduced services saw some level of service reinstatement. Part of the Citi 5 bus that was cut beyond Northstowe is now a new route 5A that will loop around Longstanton Park & Ride, Willingham, Over and Swavesey. The CA had set aside £1.7m for subsidies, however currently the total cost is expected to be about £1.25m because the operators were limited in what services they were prepared to provide. The CA will be monitoring how the new services are working. The CA is also working to put in place a sustainable and affordable bus network from April 2023 onwards. Currently, along with 60% of bidding authorities in England, including Cambridgeshire & Peterborough, we receive no Government funding for our Bus Service Improvement Plans (BSIPs). The region does not meet a number of the Department for Transport's criteria including the "deprivation index score". A refreshed Bus Strategy for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough is due to be presented to the CA's Transport & Infrastructure Committee in November, alongside a refreshed BSIP and a case for Government investment. Work is also continuing to further develop the business case for a

franchised bus network in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, but this will need money for the necessary investment in the service. Passengers with questions about bus services can email: passenger.transport @cambridgeshirepeterborough-ca.gov.uk

Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP)

The GCP has now opened its public consultation on its proposals for a significant expansion of bus services in Cambridge and the city's travel to work area, including South Cambridgeshire, to be paid for by the introduction of a congestion charge in Cambridge in 2027/28. It is very important indeed that local residents here in South Cambridgeshire read the proposals, complete the survey, and let the Greater Cambridge Partnership know what the proposals would mean for them.

The survey closes at midday on Friday 23 December. The consultation website, with the survey, brochure, map book, FAQs, public events and webinar dates and contact details are at consultcambs.uk.engagementhq.com/making-connections-2022

Mayoral precept

One idea raised at an informal meeting was whether there might be a case for setting a Mayoral precept to fund bus services beyond March 2023. This suggestion was leaked to the media, with some council leaders taking the opportunity to oppose the idea from the outset. We understand Cambridgeshire County Council and Peterborough City Council would both have a veto over such a proposal. A bus network covering more than just a few key urban routes will need public subsidy, and the money for this will need to come from somewhere. The Government has already refused to fund Cambridgeshire's BSIP once. Will we be more

fortunate this time? The Chancellor is also looking for billions of pounds in spending cuts. How likely are we to see the kind of Government investment we need?

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Transport Consultation & Crossways

Making Connections: Congestion Zone Charge – the Facts

You will probably have heard that there is a proposal to create a "Sustainable Traffic Zone" in and around Cambridge. The context is that something will have to be done about the increase in traffic and pollution which is being caused by the rapid growth of Cambridge and the surrounding areas. There is a lot of misleading information about, so I have gathered the key facts below.

The Proposals

- 1. A charge to be placed on all motor vehicles which "move into, out of or within the Zone, not just those crossing the boundary". So, it is not just those who enter the Zone from outside, but vehicles leaving the Zone or travelling within it.
- 2. The charge would operate 7am to 7pm weekdays. There will be no charge outside these hours and at weekends.
- 3. The charge would be £5 for cars and motorcycles and the charge would increase for vans/lorries etc. A wide range of vehicles would be exempt. Examples include: those used by professional care workers; emergency vehicles; vehicles registered to charities; Blue Badge holders and other registered disabled; people attending A&E at Addenbrookes, plus any other patients diagnosed as unfit to use public transport. This is not a complete list.

Taxis would only be exempt if they are electric powered and able to carry disabled passengers.

4. The Congestion Charge Zone essentially covers the majority of housing developments in Cambridge, stretching as far out as Trumpington to the South and Orchard Park to the North, Cherry Hinton to the East and Eddington to the West. See map on page 16.

Oakington and Girton, Histon and Impington are all outside the proposed Zone.

5. There would be a very significant increase in public transport provision, with an additional £50 million spent each year on public transport, with an increase (a) in the number of buses per hour, (b) in the number and range of bus routes.

Specifically, for Oakington and Westwick, the bus service would run earlier in the morning until late at night (the proposals state that bus services will be available from 5am until 1am.). The Citi 6 would be every 20 minutes and the guided busway would have a bus every 5 minutes.

- 6. Specifically, for Oakington and Westwick, the ticket price would be £1 single. There will be a cap (not specified in the documentation) on the total cost if a person needs to change buses.
- 7. For those further from bus stops, there would be 'demand-responsive transport' to link them to bus routes, similar to the Dial-a-Ride schemes.

Timeline

Improvements to bus services begin 2023/24. In 2024, lower fares on buses. In 2026, congestion charges introduced between 7am and 10am.

In 2027/28 full scheme starts.



Lots of badge work has been carried out, life skills have been developed, independence has been encouraged and a tonne of fun has been had by all.



PC/EAG Open Spaces project

We are delighted! After years of planning, the first turf cutting was on 24 November.

Our Flood Mitigation Group (FMG) continues to see frustratingly slow progress

concerning the



promised attenuation ponds on Oakington Brook. Apparently, the Environment Agency has completed some modelling of the impact of the A14 improvements on flooding, but modelling for Oakington Brook is still awaited. Once it is available the model can be used by Homes England (Northstowe developers) to provide a design for the proposed attenuation pond on land they currently control. Efforts continue to see this information.

Meanwhile, we have been following the recent attempts by Cambridgeshire Highways to carry out a CCTV survey of the tunnel that carries drainage water under Longstanton Road near the post box. The survey could not be completed because of service pipes crossing the channel, and because of an accumulation of silt caused by the downstream ditch not flowing properly. This ditch is the responsibility of South

Cambridgeshire District Council, who have confirmed to us that it was last cleaned out in 2017. They have agreed that some silt removal is needed, and we hope that this work can be completed soon.

We have also been monitoring the condition of drains in areas around the village where large puddles/localised floods form during heavy rain. Following the information that we provided to Cambridgeshire Highways and the efforts of Cllr Firouz Thompson, we understand that work has been scheduled to clear the drains in three areas: Water Lane, Dry Drayton Road and Mill Road.

Very many thanks to the volunteers who helped with **footpath sweeping** in late November. Fallen leaves were removed from footpaths and verges to help make our village tidier and safer. We are always in need of more volunteers to help with the ongoing work of keeping our footways clear and safe for users, so if you feel you might be able to spare an hour or two occasionally, please contact James on *jamesyoud51@icloud.com*. We are aware of the issue of overgrown vegetation on Water Lane, but unfortunately the Cambridgeshire Highways Volunteering scheme under which we operate does not cover us to work on this hedge due to it being private property.

Finally, the Oakington and Westwick in Bloom **flower tubs** have been restocked with bulbs and flowers for a spring display. Two of the tubs have also been moved to provide hopefully better growing conditions. We continue to be grateful to the volunteers who water and look after these tubs.

Transport Action Group

Making Connections 2022 consultation

This is part of the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) City Access programme to improve the way that people and vehicles move around the city, whilst reducing congestion and improving air quality. The text below is from a GCP document:

Transforming the bus network: From as early as mid-2023,

we're proposing to change the bus network through more services to more locations, with cheaper fares set at £1/£2.

Investing in other sustainable travel schemes: Alongside the bus network, we are proposing to invest in new sustainable travel schemes, such as better walking and cycling links.

Creating a Sustainable Travel Zone: We are proposing the

introduction of a Sustainable Travel Zone in the form of a road user charge on behalf of Cambs County Council. Vehicles would be charged for driving within the zone between 7am and 7pm on weekdays, and money raised would fund improvements to the bus network and other sustainable travel schemes. The Zone would be fully operational in 2027/28 but only once the first bus improvements are introduced.



The proposed travel zone extends from Orchard Park and the Science Park in the north and includes Addenbrookes in the south. Eddington is included in the west and it stretches across to include Cherry Hinton and the airport in the east. Girton, Histon and Impington, and Milton are not included. The daily fee that is being discussed is £5.00.

Oakington & Westwick Neighbours

OWN held its AGM in November, reviewing both sides of our activities: practical support and



community events, primarily the free CONNECT 2 events. OWN is in a sound financial position, and the **Hardship Fund** is also healthy. Donations to the latter have included a £400 grant from the District Council and an anonymous gift of £1000. The fund tends to help with small one-off payments to help in a crisis. It does not provide ongoing financial support but signposts where other help is available. Most recipients have been families with young children. The challenge for the team is encouraging people to ask and the Parish Council paid for a leaflet included in the last Journal. All enquiries are treated confidentially.

The **CONNECT 2** initiative arose out of a desire to provide a soft approach to mental health support, and to build community. Anyone is welcome to participate in CONNECT 2 events, which are free of charge. Numbers have ranged from 2 to 130, with one of the most popular being apple pressing in October. Outdoor activities have generally been more successful than indoor.

Di Wisbey and Paul Kershaw are stepping down from the OWN committee and were thanked for their significant contribution to OWN over recent years.

With the conclusion of the AGM, a **Community Workshop** on supporting each other to build local resilience considered which global or national issues are affecting us locally, and what can we do to mitigate that impact?

It was felt that Covid, the cost of living crisis, transport issues, food security, climate change, social media, loneliness and mental health issues have a huge impact. Some matters are so big that, as a small community, there seems little we can do, but we can help by acting locally. Activities can provide a focus, and once people meet up, new ideas can grow. Suggestions included sharing resources via Oaky Folk, pooling garden produce to cook and eat communally, make do and mend skill-share workshops e.g. how to use a sewing machine. We could identify opportunities for village groups to collaborate. A lot of these ideas already exist in the village, so the challenge is to ensure they are more widely known about.

Getting training or behavioural help for your pet

There are a number of different approaches and when faced with a problem behaviour it can be difficult to know where to go to seek advice. Hint: Tiktok and Facebook forums are not always the best sources! So where to start?

The big animal welfare organisations in the UK — RSPCA, Dogs Trust, Blue Cross, and of course our neighbouring Wood Green Animal Charity — give good advice from experts. Wood Green also has a free pet support line which you can ring for advice on training and emergency

behavioural issues — 0300 303 9333 or there is a form on their website. You should always consult your vet over serious behaviour issues including aggressive or reactive behaviour towards other animals or people, or distress when left alone.



If you employ a dog trainer or behaviourist, check their accreditations and experience. Stay clear of anyone using tools such as rattle cans or pet corrector spray. Your dog relies on you to protect them, not to hurt or scare them!

If the problem is medical, but vet costs are a worry, don't forget that if you are on benefits or low income, you may be eligible to register at the RSPCA clinic off Newmarket Road. This provides low cost veterinary care, including an out of hours service for registered clients. 01223 609689.

Don't ignore behavioural, medical or financial difficulties with your pet or struggle in silence: speak to your vet, Wood Green or the local RSPCA. There is help and support out there.

Nature Notes, CA & ORC

The answer lies... under our feet

H ow many names can you think of to describe soil? How about dirt, mud, earth? OK, but some scientists have elevated its reputation by calling it 'the source of all life', 'our saving grace when it comes to climate change' or 'the

solution under our feet.'

There's a lot more interest in soils now because of a realization that there's three to four times more carbon in the soil than in the atmosphere and if we manage it carefully, we can get a lot more carbon sequestered (captured and stored) in the soil. One way of doing this, whether it's soil in our

gardens or on farms, is to reduce the amount of cultivating and digging we do. Cultivation may serve to bury previous crops and plant debris, but it also encourages the loss of water and carbon from the soil as carbon dioxide.

If you want proof of this, travel to Holme Fen, near Yaxley and the lowest point in Britain, and you will see a cast iron pole which was sunk into the fenland soil in 1851. The end of the pole, which was completely buried, is now 4 metres above the surrounding soil level. In 171 years, 4 metres of peaty soil has oxidised because of cultivation and drying out. The same thing happens to a lesser degree in mineral soils (soils lower in organic matter).

This loss, through intensive farming, has happened all over the country. Some soil scientists believe that most arable

fields in East Anglia will be unfarmable in 50 years time because of this loss of organic matter. The United Nations' Food and Agricultural Organisation believe that one third of soils on the planet are highly or moderately degraded.

What can we do about it?

Most important is the need to recognise soil as something better than dirt or mud. Soil is a living entity with more biodiversity than what we have above ground. We all know that soil contains earthworms but don't forget beetles, fungi and microbes, which get their energy from dying plants and other leaf debris. Cultivation kills this biomass so lack of soil disturbance allows these organisms to flourish and encourages carbon sequestration. So, the soil becomes healthier, has more biodiversity, it maintains a better structure so it produces better crops, is more resilient to flooding and drought, and is a significant carbon sink.

Regenerative agriculture delivers carbon sequestration

and other benefits As well as limited cultivation, regenerative agriculture

involves rotations and cover cropping to avoid bare soils. Many Governments are supporting it through research and funding on farms, aiming for soil health but also more biodiversity above and below ground. It is believed that pesticides and artificial fertiliser can damage soil organisms so regenerative farming includes elements of 'organic' farming. You may know that the 'organic' movement grew out of care for the soil rather than healthy eating, but clearly the two go together. So put your spade away and try sowing directly into your top soil.

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

involvement are invaluable. Although keen to try new ideas, she has a clear sense of the Journal's purpose.


