#### From our Parish Council Chair

The planning application for temporary boundary fencing and **replacement hedge planting in Dry Drayton Road** was refused recently. The conifers which were felled on this site were originally sanctioned by a planning inspector in 1986 and not, as I previously thought, because of an oversight by the then Parish Council. It transpires that the inspector specified Cupressus because MAFF (later to become Defra) said that Hawthorn would be unsuitable! Hopefully there will be a satisfactory outcome to all of this in the near future.

We've seen and heard **noisy motorbikes** on the local roads for many months. Latterly the Business Park off Dry Drayton Road has been the target for such activity. This is of course private land but it is hard to imagine that permission will have been granted for such use.

Happily, the amount of motorbike misuse of the new Northstowe Avenue and roundabouts seems to have diminished. But please do keep reporting this anti-social behaviour. Mansell Wood is a favourite cutthrough to Histon. The police do act when they are informed.

On a happier and more positive note now! Parish Council and Environment Action Group/Sustainable Oakington & Westwick reps recently met with members of Histon & Impington Green Spaces group who are keen to establish wildlife and conservation areas, particularly **wildlife corridors between the villages** and hopefully Girton too. Beck Brook, the main river, would seem to be a unifying factor in this endeavour as its course takes it through the three parishes. Wildlife might well have its own ideas about what constitutes a wildlife haven.

Whilst writing on environmental issues, I'd like to take the opportunity to consider the contribution made to the parish by the **Environment Action Group**. James Youd's leadership has made the group of volunteers a constant and positive force for environmental good for years now. We can thank them for cleaning the pond near the crossroads, the annual leaf collection from the paths, making pedestrians' life just that bit safer. Not to be forgotten is the regular litter picking that has to be done relentlessly on the parish's behalf.

They could all be at home doing something else, but instead voluntarily turn out in all weathers. Many, many thanks to such a dedicated group. EAG volunteers are covered for their work along paths by the County Council's insurance via the Community Highways Volunteering scheme.

I know I go on in this column about volunteering, but it just is a fact of life that so much that happens in the Parish simply wouldn't happen without the spirit of voluntarism. The list of clubs and societies is a very long one indeed. The Council has been **short of two councillors** for ages, and Oakington and Westwick Neighbours needs help. Contact the Clerk for more information, or just come to the next PC meeting to see what goes on.

Finally, the Parish Council has recently celebrated some good news – see page 17. And there's even more cause for celebration: Laura Lawrence has worked for our community as **Parish Council Clerk** for no less than 25 years! I send our heartfelt thanks to you Laura for all the work you have done and for going the extra mile so many times.

#### **From our District Councillor**

#### Save the Winter Fuel Payment

My group colleagues and I are fighting to save the Winter Fuel Payment for vulnerable pensioners that is currently under threat from the new government. In October's council meeting, all councillors unanimously supported our joint motion to sign Age UK's petition at *tinyurl.com/4c3aw675* to save the payment and to raise awareness of pension credit.

Age UK research suggests that 2 million pensioners who badly need the support to stay warm this winter will no longer receive the Winter Fuel Payment. With the recent Energy Price Cap rise, the physical and mental health of elderly people in the UK is threatened.

We are continuing to work to raise awareness of this issue, including signing a joint letter to the Chancellor of the Exchequer to urge a review of this decision and to protect pensioners at risk of fuel poverty.

#### Awaiting planning policy from Government

We are still awaiting the new National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) from the new national government. It is frustrating and challenging that this has not yet been decided, particularly as this plan will have a significant impact on South Cambridgeshire.

My group will ensure that residents are updated when the new NPPF is issued. We understand that many residents will be concerned about the new government's housebuilding plans, especially in our area, and we encourage you to get in touch if you have any concerns.

#### Water authorities attend council Scrutiny meeting

We were grateful for the opportunity to welcome flood management representatives from Anglian Water, the Environment Agency, and from Cambridgeshire County and South Cambridgeshire District Councils to the council's October Scrutiny and Overview committee meeting chaired by Cllr Graham Cone, Deputy Leader of my group.

The meeting provided a useful forum for councillors to raise

residents' specific concerns, including recent flooding in South Cambridgeshire, the impact of new housing developments on water supply and management, and improving communication between communities and the water authorities.

#### From our County Councillor

December and January often inspire us to reflect on the past months and look forward to the year ahead. Here are some key updates for our village community.

#### **Busway Services Update: Addressing the Challenges**

November brought further adjustments to the Busway B service to tackle the challenges arising from the 4 September updates. Stagecoach's review revealed a significant 20% year-over-year increase in passenger numbers, with peak times experiencing a surge of up to 58%. This unexpected demand has led to overcrowding and frustration for many commuters.

To alleviate these issues, Stagecoach has implemented the following measures:

- Additional Peak-Time Journeys: Two extra morning peak services from St Ives Park & Ride to Drummer Street and two evening return journeys. This is on top of the three extra buses added in September.
- Route Adjustments: With Hills Road traffic delays of up to 29 minutes during peak times, morning services to Addenbrooke's have been reduced from nine to five to improve punctuality and reliability.

These changes highlight a growing demand for public transport when investments are made. However, challenges lie ahead, including the government's recent announcement to raise the bus fare cap from £2 to £3 in 2025. I will continue working with Stagecoach and the Combined Authority to advocate for enhanced services that meet the needs of our community.

#### **Bus Survey: A Push for Better Services**

The recent bus survey, which closed on 1 December, aims to

gather sufficient data from Oakington & Westwick and Girton villages, to make a compelling case for service improvements. The goal includes advocating for a more efficient bus network and the addition of a night bus service to the village.

#### **O&W Parish Council Wins Prestigious Award**

I am delighted to share that Oakington & Westwick Parish Council has been named Council of the Year – a fantastic and well-deserved recognition! Having had the privilege of nominating them, I am incredibly proud to collaborate with such a dedicated team. #### From our MP

On 18 November, Anti-Social Behaviour Awareness Week launched at a reception in Parliament. I have heard many residents' concerns surrounding **anti-social behaviour** near unadopted roads and the guided busway towards Oakington and Westwick. I know that County Councillor Firouz Thompson has been successful in ensuring that Homes England follow through on their promise to install CCTV that will now record the licence plate details of motorcyclists and cars.

I continue to be concerned about the **lack of capacity on busway** buses, and I have raised this with the Mayor of the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA). I highlighted that while bus franchising may help in the long term, it isn't a solution to the problems local communities face right now. Nevertheless, I hope that many residents took the opportunity to share their view in the CPCA's recent consultation period on franchising.

Another recent focus has been on **London Luton Airport expansion**, and the related change in airspace that has caused noise nuisance to many residents. Last month, I wrote to the Transport Secretary, voicing these concerns and urging her not to approve plans without first giving the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) appropriate powers to enforce the original plans for the AD6 flightpath that has caused disturbance to so many. I also pressed the CAA to provide a detailed response to community issues raised in their feedback window – which they now have agreed to do by the end of March 2025.

In amongst parliamentary business, I have enjoyed attending **community events** across the constituency. As I write this, I am looking forward during the coming months to dropping into a Girlguiding group for UK Parliament Week, visiting the Cambridgeshire FA in Histon, and attending local Christmas school fairs and festive light switch-on events. If you have an event you would like me to attend, please do reach out.

Finally, I now have regular **weekly surgeries** happening both in person across the constituency and online for those who prefer that option. To make an appointment, please contact me on *ian.sollom.mp@parliament.uk* and a member of my team will get in touch.

#### **Environment Action Group**

Our **Flood Mitigation Group**, led by Andrew Dennis, continues to monitor possible flood risks to the village. The group has examined the plans for the proposed East–West rail line, for which the company's currently preferred route is alongside the

A428 between Caxton Gibbet and Caldecote, and is satisfied that any water runoff from this development would flow towards either Elsworth or Bourn and not towards Oakington. Water runoff from the new development at Bourn airfield will likewise drain towards Bourn and so should not increase the flood risk in Oakington. We do, however, have ongoing concerns about the levels of silt and the general condition of Beck

general condition of Beck Brook downstream of Westwick and, together with our local councillors, continue our discussions over maintenance responsibilities for this important watercourse. We also continue to be frustrated by the lack of progress towards the promised attenuation ponds upstream of the village associated with the Northstowe development.

**Recreation ground weeding**: Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> October brought a mix of showers and sunshine. This was the day when volunteers from a local company came to our recreation ground to work wonders on the two historic seating areas. The beech hedges at the Anglo-Saxon and RAF areas were fast being swamped by weeds until twelve of the EAG. Geoffrey was delighted to explain that his own company used to occupy 5 Coles Lane, where Optimum Patient care now operate from, and that he had been much involved in the recent upgrade of the Rec, with help from the EAG. John, on behalf of the EAG, expressed their gratitude to Kelly and her team and to Tony Leadley for opening the pavilion for some welcome refreshments.

You may have noticed that the **Oakington and Westwick in Bloom** flower tubs have been restocked with winter plants. We are very grateful to the volunteers who look after the tubs, as well as to the Parish Council for funding them and the Garden Centre for doing the restocking.



Finally, we will be selling **Oakington-grown Christmas trees** again this year, on 7<sup>th</sup> **December**, 12 noon till 3pm at 9 Longstanton Road. Please note that these trees are for local residents of Oakington and Westwick only and are not for reselling.

#### Hardship Fund Update

All our income during the last year has come from donations from the

village, and we are very grateful. We have received five donations including from the Monday Café and from someone who had previously received help from the Fund. Our individual donors have asked to remain anonymous.

We have made 13 grants to 8 households ranging from £50 to £250 per grant. The majority of the people who contact us are families with children. We also made a payment to the school to enable them to purchase items of school uniform to 'top up' their stock of uniforms used to help families in financial need. Altogether we have responded to more requests for help this year. We think this reflects the cost of living crisis and high rate of inflation leading in particular to increased costs for food and heating.

The type of circumstances where we have helped include:

- Small grants to cope until payday
- Benefit deductions without warning, and delay in making decisions on benefits claims which cause short term budgeting issues. In these instances, the requests


Helping households to cope with costs arising from funeral of close family member or travelling to visit seriously ill close relatives.

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

#### **Gardening Notes**

**December:** A good time to prune apples and pears, cutting out any dead, diseased or damaged wood and opening up the centre of the tree.

Start forcing rhubarb by covering emerging shoots with a terracotta pot or an old dustbin, to exclude light and give tender young stems in early spring.

Regularly check any stored produce for signs of rot which can easily spread. Remove and destroy any affected items.

Allow fallen leaves to stay on the borders and act as a mulch to protect the soil from weathering. They will add valuable organic matter as they decompose.

**January:** Prune gooseberries now by removing about onethird of the old stems and any which are close to the ground.

Plant out Christmas Hyacinths, after flowering, for a scented but smaller display next spring. Christmas trees can be shredded and used as mulch on the borders.

Ventilate the greenhouse on warm days to prevent diseases developing in warm damp conditions, and check and water any overwintering plants in there that have dried out.

Keep dead-heading outdoor displays of pansies, violas and cyclamen to encourage more flowers.

Go through old seed packets and throw away any past their sell-by date. Then decide on the New Year's planting plan for beautiful borders and tasty veg. Happy Gardening! *Ann and Peter Rayner*

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

Roger Goodden, who is - among his many other roles - the guardian angel of the fabric of the church, and I share the same enthusiasm for old churches, and we started to research and write together. The starting point was an old folder that contained the research of the Vicar's father, the late Rev Hugh Crighton Alexander, about the history of the church building. The guide is richly illustrated with old photos of the church, conserved by the Cambridgeshire Collection and the Cambridge Antiquarian Society, together with several ancient documents and artwork by Roger. It takes you around St Andrew's and calls your attention to the stories that we managed to find out about the church building. For example – did you know that there are two fragments of a stone cross built into the walls of the church that were parts of the one blown off from the roof in the gales in c.1978?



#### **Nature Notes**

#### Where have all the butterflies gone?

The Big Butterfly Count 2024 has revealed the lowest numbers in the 14 years the survey has been held, and has called a Butterfly Emergency. The wet, cold spring has contributed; in addition, there are longer term reasons: the intensification of agriculture, poor woodland management,

fragmentation and loss of habitat because of building, pollution, tidying of parks and gardens and changes in climate. But even without all these reasons, butterflies have always been under pressure because of their complicated life-cycles.



Most people remember from school the four stages of a butterfly's life-cycle: egg, caterpillar (larva), chrysalis (pupa) from which the adult butterfly emerges. The main eating stage is the caterpillar, most eating plant leaves. This stage is very vulnerable to predation by birds, wasps and others as its external skeleton grows and expands. The later stage chrysalis is also easily damaged or eaten.

You may know the larva of the Peacock butterfly eats nettle leaves and the adult seeks nectar from thistles, dandelions, teasels and buddleia. So, this species requires nettles and a range of nectar sources for it to complete its life-cycle.

The Holly Blue has two broods. In the spring the larval food are the leaves of holly and dogwood, and the summer broods favour ivy and a range of other shrubs. The adult is not interested in nectar, preferring to feed on honeydew, which is a sweet secretion from aphids. In a similar complicated way, woodland butterflies are dependent on grassland and wild flowers for nectar.

So, butterfly habitats have to provide leaves for larvae, nectar for adults or sweet alternatives like honeydew or sap.

This complicated arrangement does put butterflies under pressure, because they need a mosaic of habitats, all within a reasonable distance.

As a result of complicated lifestyles and the reasons above, some butterflies are close to extinction. The large Tortoiseshell has probably gone, last being recorded at Knapwell in 2003 (the small Tortoiseshell is still quite common). The Large Blue was extinct, but has been successfully reintroduced. However the Large Copper is extinct in spite of some serious conservation work and the Swallowtail is under threat. Three of our most common butterflies, the Red Admiral, Painted Lady and Clouded Yellow are all migrants, so depend on conditions elsewhere.

So it is important as well as rewarding to make our gardens more butterfly friendly. Lots of wild flowers help, as do a range of shrubs like dogwood, holly, ivy, buddleia, and various trees. Grass management is also important. Different species of butterfly benefit from a range of cutting heights and some parts left uncut until September provide lots of leaf area, which is vital food for larvae, and if wild flowers survive cutting they provide nectar for adults.




